VIRGINIA STATE CONVENTION.—Gen. Schofield has issued an order for an election for the State Convention, on October 22d. There are 105 delegates of which Richmond has five, and Norfolk and Petersburg two each.

Mr. Schuyler Colfax, speaker of the House of Representatives, has written a letter defending the right of Congress to inquire "whether a State has a Republican form of Government" — pointing his remarks particularly to Maryland, which he thinks is not a Republican State.

It seems it was Gen. Grant who very properly abolished the office of Superintendent of the Confederate archives, and placed the papers in charge of a clerk. The Radicals who were so much concerned at the dismissal of Dr. Leiber, and so indignant at his treatment by the President, will have to "right about face," and applaud Gen. Grant for doing what they condemned in the President.

To-day is the anniversary of the battle of Antietam—the turning point of the late war. It was a bloody struggle. We have not at hand the losses of the then Confederate army, but Gen. McClellan in his bulletin, two days after the fight, stated the Federal loss to be 2,010 killed, 9,416 wounded, and 1,043 missing, making a total loss of 12,069.

If one half of what is said about Dickens's Readings, be correct, those who will have the opportunity of listening to him, may expect a great treat. We should, indeed like to hear him read some chapters of the Pickwick Papers. He is said to be a good actor, as well as a good reader, and, of course, enters into the humor of his own writings.

Mr. Forney has recommenced his "Occasional" letters. His last is highly sensational—accusing the President of designs against Congress, &c., &c., and declaring that "the destiny of the Republic has never been more completely in the hands of Gen. Grant, than it is at the present moment."

Gen. Mower, temporarily in command in New Orleans, has issued an order, directing the arrest of all armed men in Louisiana, found posted as sentinels, pickets, or videttes, or pretending to be on guard duty for any purpose or by any authority, not duly authorized by law.

The London papers are filled with specific claims of damages of Americans citizens, inflicted by the Confederate cruisers. The London Daily News admits England to be liable for a million and a quarter sterling, but British citizens have also large claims against the United States.

It is expected that Santa Anna's trial will take place shortly in Mexico. It is thought, generally, that he will not be executed; but that his property will be confiscated. The old fellow, is said, still, to be very rich.

The Radical journals exult whenever they have an opportunity to record that the registration of the colored vote exceeds that of the white vote in any portion of the South.

The commissioners of the Antietam monument have accepted the design of J. G. Patterson, of Hartford, for a colossal statue and pedestal, to cost \$30,000.

Capt. Dewey says he has discovered petroleum, in Montgomery county, Md., near the shore of the Potomac, in the vicinity of the Great Falls.

John C. Mulford has been appointed Collector of Internal Revenue for the third district, Richmond, Va., vice James, suspended.

The vote on the adoption or rejection of the proposed new Constitution of Maryland, is to be taken to-morrow.

FOREIGN NEWS.—A dispatch from the Hague, Holland, states that a man named Gardensier has been arrested there and a large number of counterfeit one thousand dollar U. S. notes seized. The Liverpool house of Jas. Hewitt & Co., largely engaged in the American trade, has failed. Admiral Farragut is at Copenhagen, and is receiving there the same marked honors that have been extended to him at all the ports which he has visited with his fleet. The U. S. Mediterranean Squadron has sailed from Cadiz for Greece.

WASHINGTON ITEMS.—An English Opera Troupe is now performing to good houses. The city council conference committee report upon the annual tax bill was submitted to the board of aldermen last night, together with the minority report, showing that the emoluments of the city collector under the bill would exceed \$9,000 per annum. The bill was disagreed to by a vote of 7 to 5 by the board.

The U. S. steamer Penobscot arrived at the navy yard on Sunday. Very rapid progress is being made on the Treasury extension, and yesterday the last one of the heavy monolithic columns was hoisted into its proper place.

NEWS OF THE DAY.

"To show the very age and body of the Times." A new and dangerous counterfeit on the \$5 note, National currency, has lately made its appearance. In the sentence at the top of the note "This secured by bonds," the letters "b" and "y" are too far apart, and the "o" in bonds is under the "y," but the "b" in the same words is immediately under the "y" in the genuine. At the left of the note the left arm of Columbus is scarcely visible, but in the genuine it is very distinct.

Rev. Jas. Gibbons, now officiating in the Roman Catholic Cathedral parish, Baltimore, has been confirmed, by the Head of the Church at Rome, Bishop of the Diocese of North Carolina, and will probably have his episcopal mansion in Raleigh. He will be consecrated by Archbishop Spalding when that gentleman returns from Europe, which will be at the latter end of October.

In anticipation that the yellow fever, now raging in the South, may reach the city of Mobile and cause an abandonment of that place by the Government officials, Gen. Spinney, U. S. treasurer, has thought best to withdraw all Government funds deposited there, and deposit them in some city further north.

Advices from Mexico are to the 20th ult.—Considerable canvassing and excitement followed the command by President Juarez for a general election. Factions were active. President Juarez is in favor of amending the Mexican constitution so as to make it like that of the United States.

Gen. Griffin, who was in command of the Fifth Military District temporarily, having died with yellow fever at Galveston, the command of the District falls upon the next officer in rank, Gen. Joseph A. Mower, who will be in command until the arrival of Gen. Hancock.

The dwelling house of Jarvis Keene, at East Abington, Mass., was burned last night. Mr. Keene's two daughters, his only children, aged 19 and 21 years, were burned to death. Mr. Keene is in New Orleans, and his wife and daughters were alone in the house.

One of the crew of the steamer Europe was lost overboard on her last trip from Havre, two days out. An entertainment was subsequently arranged for the benefit of the man's family, at which Madame Ristori gave dramatic readings and Madame Lagrange sang.

A man named John White, of St. John, N. B., and two boys, who have committed a number of robberies lately in Portland, and even as far east as Bangor, have been arrested. A considerable portion of the stolen property has been recovered.

The cholera has disappeared from Governor's Island, N. Y., there having been no case of the disease for the last ten days. In all thirty-one private, mostly recruits, have been attacked, of whom fourteen died.

The proprietor of the Chestnut-street Theatre, in Philadelphia, has given the Young Men's Christian Association of that city permission to use that building for a series of religious meetings.

The yellow fever is rapidly spreading throughout Texas. A large number of Government officials and officers of the army and navy have died. Aid is urgently appealed for.

Judge Bryan, of the U. S. District Court, sitting at Greenville, S. C., directed the names of colored men, as well as other citizens, to be put upon the jury lists.

Theresa Wiermon was murdered yesterday, at Yonkers, N. Y., by Frederick Schraffenhaus, who subsequently committed suicide. Cause, disappointed affection.

The deaths from yellow fever in New Orleans on Saturday and Sunday are officially reported to have been one hundred and three.

Gen. Grant will be unable to attend the ceremonies at Antietam, owing to the pressure of official duties. So it is said.

The late Gen. Griffin's order, removing the Judges of the Supreme Court of Texas has been revoked.

VIRGINIA NEWS.

Gen. Schofield ordered that all registered voters and none others should vote on the Richmond subscription to the Chesapeake and Ohio Railroad. The vote of the city was in favor of subscribing two millions to the stocks of the Railroad, by 2,000 majority. The colored people voted for it en masse. Its opponents intend contesting the legality of the vote on the ground that the colored people, under the supplemental bill, have no right to vote, except in case of elections for office. Also, that the registration is not completed till a final revision of the lists, and therefore the colored people were not registered voters.

The cost of bringing the Nelson and Lewis statues, (for the Washington Monument at Richmond) from Europe to the Capitol Square in Richmond, was \$2,500. The items are as follows: From Bremen to New York, \$1,600 in gold; from New York to Richmond, \$200; wharfage at Rocketts, \$20; hauling them from the wharf to the Square, \$100.

The County Court of Shenandoah, has recommended to Gen. Schofield, the appointment of Nathaniel Barton, to fill the vacancy occasioned by the death of James G. Fravel, the late clerk of the Court. Mr. B. is a worthy gentleman, and as well qualified as any other in the county, who can take the prescribed oath.

A horse, belonging to Robinson's Circus, was stolen from Richmond two or three weeks ago. The thief left him at a stable in Petersburg, and there the animal has been detained. The thief has not come for him.

Col. Burnham, detailed as Judge of the Hustings Court, of Gen. Schofield's staff, charged the Grand Jury in Richmond yesterday. He said no distinction on account of color or caste would be allowed in Court.

The contract for carrying the mail (tri-weekly) from Norfolk to Richmond, has been awarded to Captain John A. Post, at \$2,000 per annum.

William B. Prichard, of Petersburg, has been elected assistant professor of civil and military engineering at the Virginia Military Institute.

Sales of 402 bushels white at 225 and 235 for prime, and 600 bushels red were offered, with sales at 200, 210, 220 and 227 for good to prime. 700 bushels of mixed Corn changed hands at 112, and 30 bushels white at same figures. 64 bushels Rye sold at 126, and 1430 bushels Oats brought 54 and 55c. 150 bushels Corn Meal sold at 103. There was considerable activity on the part of buyers this morning, all offerings having been disposed of. Butter firm. Eggs in demand at yesterday's quotations.

BALTIMORE MARKET, Sept. 16.—The Flour and Grain markets quiet, and comparatively dull, at Saturday's rates.

NEW YORK, Sept. 16.—Flour steady. Wheat firm, with a fair demand. Corn 1c better. Rye quiet. Oats a shade firmer.

The large and somewhat sudden fluctuations in gold last week continue to employ attention, and have not been traced clearly to speculation in New York, in an attempt to effect a corner in the old 5-20's, which are limited in amount and chiefly held abroad.
