**MORE ABOUT THIEVES.**  
[From the Baltimore Episcopal Methodist.]  
We have often heard veteran burglars excuse their partial appropriations of the goods of others by contrasting in their own favor the supposed predatory lives of the rest of the community. In this argument the burglar, like other partisans, is extreme in his assumptions. He does not admit any honesty at all. He assumes, as the black philosopher did to Mr. Baker, that everybody steals as much as he can. This is not true. There are many, very many, honest men. We know them in all kinds of business, but the burglars have, nevertheless, abundant fair cases for comparison. They say that though dangerous to society, they are as pikes to sharks, compared to many unconvicted consumers of their kind. The burglar is only a possible accident to a man's property, and his depredations are necessarily limited to a small portion of the victim's possessions. The poor escape him altogether. But the rascal who debases drugs, or who sells inefficient nostrums, steals from the sick, his time, his relief, his cure, perhaps his life, and robs his family, his creditors, his country, of the man's health and usefulness, and it may be, of his existence—here is a thief who breaks into the secret treasure of a man, and takes more than all his property is worth. Many of this class of robbers cheat a man out of his life for a dollar. Then there is the dishonest broker, who cheats all day and always, in all kinds of goods, and cheats almost exclusively the poor. What an undying worm in the means of an humble household is he! What a permanent rascal he is! So of all the rest of dishonest traders. Who would not rather have a robber in his house once or twice in his lifetime, than be daily sucked by leeches like these? Then there is a class of great caterpillars—officials—dishonesty getting money out of the public and out of individuals, who do business with public bodies. How much robbery is perpetrated in this way none can tell. But now people look upon this sort of thing as normal. If a bill is to be passed, money is to be provided. Some illegitimate means must be used. If one has a just claim on Congress, he would not think of recovering it merely by honest statements. Sensible people abandon claims that are not worth spending money on. Officials known to be poor when appointed to small salaries, live far above those salaries, and get rich. Nobody inquires how. Everybody knows they have robbed somebody; yet they are treated as gentlemen, and not sent to the penitentiary at all.

So the penitentiary class of burglars talk; and truth to say, we could put our hand upon several wealthy gentlemen, who, by sharpness and unprincipled selfishness; may be by scandalous lying and miscellaneous roguery not indictable by statute, have reduced more men to poverty, wrought more ruin to families, and poured into cups of life more intense bitterness than has been accomplished of this devil's work, by all the thieves and robbers at present leading reluctantly honest lives in all the prisons of the country. It is becoming of prime importance to ascertain how much true, honest principle is left among us. Certainly, the public gives itself credit for very little. We do not teach our children to trust those they shall deal with. We call a man "green," until he loses faith in the honesty of the public. And, oh! what a revelation of the state of society it is, that it is a reproach to be "green"; that the innocent truthfulness of youth should be another name for unfitness for life. All of us old ones, feel it a paternal duty to destroy all the natural human confidence that opens the hearts of our boys and girls to the hearts of older people; because we know that the world is full of traps and pitfalls, with ferocious man-eaters watching every step of them, and that the generation coming upon the stage would be eaten like young trout by the old ones, if it were not for their guard against the voracity that is waiting for them. This is the fact—the plain, melancholy, shameful truth. What is to be done? That very many people have very lax notions about honesty, and are very careless about the character of being honest, and yet have a strange dislike to be called thieves, is certain. We think it will be well to begin the reform by calling them thieves. When we have reduced the various forms of roguery to a common denomination we can deal easier with it. The Scripture says nothing about "defaulters" and "operators," but classes only as thieves and robbers, all who get property unjustly. We think one reason of our declining from Bible morality is, our shying from Bible words.

**THE RADICAL PROGRAMME.**—We call the attention of the Conservatives of the North, particularly those of Pennsylvania and Ohio, to the following extract from an article in the New Nation on Saturday—a paper which is the Radical organ in this State, and edited by a man who aspires to the highest office in the gift of the colored people. If this proposition does not damage Radicalism in those States, we shall be surprised.—*Rich. Dispatch.*

[From the New Nation, September 21.]  
And it necessary the fugitives in Canada who escaped from slavery, and the suffering emigrants now in Hayti and Liberia, will help to make this domination of Republican principles. Yes, we would overturn Africa right into America, if necessary, and these thick-lipped, flat-nosed, woolly-haired people that now swarm those sunny shores brought here as Irishmen from Ireland, and in the same time be fitted just as well for the responsibilities of citizenship. All these instrumentalities we would repudiate under contribution willingly and without reserve, before we would see the old times of slavery return. There are to be established emigration societies to induce foreign emigration here; and for political purposes we must concede these societies to be established. Therefore, claiming "what is sauce for the goose should be for the gander," we shall have the same instrumentalities at work, importing Africans at Savannah while Irishmen are at New York.
