**CAN'T SUPPORT THE RADICAL PARTY.**  
The Abingdon Virginian says: "A friend for whom we have the utmost respect, and in whose honesty and candor we have the fullest confidence, asked us the other day, why it was we could not support the Radical policy, as the only hope of reconstruction and eventual peace and prosperity? We have no doubt he honestly believed what he said, but we cannot see things in the same light in which he sees them and hence we are compelled to differ with him. For instance, the Radical party, from the moment of its birth to the present, merely for the purpose of keeping itself in power, has, in our view, shown an utter disregard for the true interests of the country. This is one reason why we cannot support its policy.

Again, its corruptions and conspiracies, its more or less patent and of such a character, as to deter the man who loves his country and his race—seeing it in the light we see it, without the use of our friend's spectacles—from association with it. This is another reason why we cannot support its policy.

Again, its slaughter upon, and total disregard of the rights of the States, and its vindictive and capricious rejection of the representatives chosen by the people themselves, have marked every day of its history, and proved it to be a usurper and tyrant in the fullest sense of those terms. This is another reason why we cannot endorse its policy.

Again, during the war and since, even down to the present hour, it has labored continually, both day and night, to initiate a war between the races, and has succeeded, in some of the Southern States, in arraying the blacks against the whites, in solid column. This is another reason why we cannot support its policy.

We have numerous other reasons, equally potent, why we cannot support Radical policy, but we have not space to illustrate them now. We hope these will satisfy our friend, who we should not have taken the trouble to satisfy, but for his private view as a citizen, and his honest but mistaken views of patriotism."

**GEN. BRECKINRIDGE'S LAST OFFICIAL ACT.**  
—Major T. P. Ochiltree, of the Houston Telegraph, tells the following in a late letter from Paris:  
"John C. Breckinridge at a dejeuner yesterday told of his last act of authority as Secretary of War. It was on the coast of Florida; they were beating the country in every direction; a 'friend in need' came to his rescue—he was one of Brevard's gallant old regiment of the Army of Northern Virginia. He said: 'General, I have an old boat here that must carry us to Kurby; anyhow, we'll try it on. So he worked away all that night raising the boat from where he had sunk it to conceal it from the enemy; he worked faithfully and energetically in patching it up and baling it, artificially finishing it up and putting in a few provisions. Gen. Breckinridge grasped the noble fellow by the hand and said to him: 'I will have but a few more hours of authority; but such services as you have rendered your country deserve reward. You shall be a major. I will make out your commission now.' He was exceedingly thoughtful, but remained scratching his head in a thoughtful attitude. 'Well, my friend,' said the General. 'Well, you see, General, that's a feller in our regiment what ain't done nothing, and he is a major and a quartermaster, and it's all the same to you, I would just like to rank him for onst.' It is needless to say that the 'going out' Secretary of War instantly wrote the battle-scarred but humble hero a commission as lieutenant colonel. A fact."

**"THE WAR OF THE RACES."**—We are informed that an affair occurred at Cumberland Court-house, a few days since, which came near culminating in bloody results. It appears that on the day named, two colored candidates for the Convention addressed a crowd of about 500 colored people and half as many whites, and one of the speakers made remarks of such a personally offensive and abusive character towards Mr. Trent, a former sheriff of the county, that that gentleman felt himself compelled to interrupt the speaker and reply to his offensive tirade. This so enraged the man that he drew his pistol, and Mr. Trent also drew his. A scene of the most intense excitement ensued, the negroes, who all appeared to be armed, ranging themselves with drawn weapons by the side of their black comrade, and the whites backing up Mr. Trent. Most fortunately, at this juncture, when a bloody conflict appeared inevitable, several gentlemen who were near by, and had influence, interposed, and by earnest entreaties and persuasion, prevailed upon the antagonistic parties to separate. No shot was fired by either party; had there been, a terrible scene of slaughter would have followed.—Lynch. News.

**RARE BIRDS AND ANIMALS.**—Some time ago we stated the fact that it had been announced that Mr. Samuel T.
