SCENE AT A RAILROAD MEETING.
The Stockholders of the Virginia & Tennessee Railroad were holding a meeting in Lynchburg on Thursday, and the following scene occurred when the subject of the election of the President of the company came up.
Gen. Jas. H. Walker nominated Gen. Wm. Mahone, and sustained his nomination by a few eulogistic remarks. He stated further that it had not been found expedient to carry out the Consolidation bill passed at the last session of the Legislature, because of the want of the necessary means. But all the benefits of a consolidated and associated management might be realized by the election of one President for all the common roads.
Mr. Wm. Radford nominated Dr. Joseph L. Kent, of Wythe county. He was unalterably opposed to Gen. Mahone, who had so long been attempting to force himself on the company, in opposition to the will and wish of the private Stockholders. He was backed up in his scheme to become possessed of the road by that corrupt creature, Gov. Pierpont. He had been told by a reliable gentleman that Pierpont had been bought up by the New York and Virginia Steamship Navigation Company.

There were loud cries of "author," "author." Mr. Radford gave the name of Mr. Ro. W. Hughes.
Mr. Hughes arose and protested against the public disclosure of words used in private and confidential conversation.
Mr. Radford proceeded with his remarks. If Gen. Mahone was elected, he would owe his election to the friends of Pierpont. Dr. Kent was as gallant and true a soldier as Gen. Mahone. He had not sought the position. He was a modest and unassuming man. He was without fear and reproach.

Mr. McMullin seconded the nomination of Mr. Kent, and was proceeding with his remarks, sustaining the nomination when an envelope was brought in and handed to the Chair. After the Chair had opened it and read the paper enclosed he interrupted the remarks of Col. McMullin, and read the document, of which the following is a copy:
HEADQUARTERS SUB DIST. LYNCHBURG,
October 10, 1867.

To the Chairman of the Stockholders' Meeting of the Va. & Tenn. Railroad Company:
I have the honor to inform you that, according to instructions received from the War Department, the United States will not allow a change in the Presidency of the Virginia & Tennessee Railroad, until the Government claims are satisfied, or until further orders.
Your obedient servant,
O. B. WILCOX,
Brev't Maj. Gen. Commanding.

The reading of this document was the occasion of a scene of the wildest excitement and confusion. When first read it was received with applause and cheering, but the feeling of indignation manifested itself in a manner most unmistakable and emphatic. Gov. McMullin vainly attempted to make himself heard. Mr. Slaughter, Mr. Johnson, and several others, attempted simultaneously to address the meeting. Col. Withers finally obtained the floor, and expressed his entire detestation of the order, and moved the appointment of a committee of five to confer with Gen. Wilcox, and ascertain whether or not, and upon what terms, the meeting would be allowed to proceed with the discharge of its usual business.

The motion was received with loud and enthusiastic cheering.
Mr. C. M. Blackford rose and said, in behalf of the Proxies of the City of Lynchburg, that they knew nothing of the move, and held it in utter disapproval and contempt.
Mr. J. F. Slaughter pledged himself to procure within the next twenty-four hours whatever amount might be necessary to liquidate the claims of the government.
At this time the hall presented a scene of indescribable tumult, and the chair being wholly unable to preserve order. Expressions of scorn and indignation were heard on every side.

Mr. Branch, of Petersburg, addressed the meeting. He fully concurred in the motion of Col. Withers. We were under a military despotism, and could do nothing, except submit to the violence used against us.
Some gentlemen suggested that the meeting proceed with its usual business, elect a President and other officers, and let the government do what it chose.
The meeting continued the scene of the most violent excitement. After it had in some degree subsided, the motion of Col. Withers was put to the house and unanimously passed. The following gentlemen were appointed to constitute the committee: Col. R. E. Withers, J. F. Slaughter, J. C. Taylor, J. W. Sheffey and J. F. Johnson.

It was moved that the meeting adjourn, when it adjourns until 7 o'clock, to receive the report of the committee.
On motion the meeting adjourned.
The members excitedly gathered together on the street, in front of the hall, discussing earnestly the promulgation of the order. The universal sentiment among the stockholders, so far as we could hear, was one of the deepest reprobation of the government's interference.
NIGHT SESSION.—The meeting was called to order at 7 o'clock.
Col. Withers, in behalf of the committee submitted the following report to the Stockholders:
"The committee appointed under your resolution beg leave to report that they have waited upon Gen. Wilcox, and ascertained that he is not authorized to make any arrangement with the election of a new President can be permitted. Such authority can only emanate from the War Department."

Col. Withers stated further that he had been assured by Gen. Wilcox that the interference of the War Department had not been instigated by any parties to Lynchburg. The application came from parties entirely disconnected with the community of Lynchburg.
This announcement was received with cheers. Gov. McMullin being entitled to the floor, moved the adoption of the report, and addressed the meeting in an elaborate effort, after which the motion to adopt was submitted to the meeting and passed.

Gov. McMullin moved that the further consideration of the election be postponed at present.
Mr. Trigg stated that he was authorized to withdraw the name of Mr. Joseph F. Kent. Mr. Kent nor his friends knew nothing of the intention of the military to interfere, and since it had been done they would have nothing more to do with the election.
The vote on Gov. McMullin's motion was taken and the motion lost.
Mr. Hoyle, of Montgomery, urged a quiet course, and moved that the election be postponed till the order of the War Department be rescinded.
Mr. Johnson, of Bedford, thought the meeting had better adjourn until some specified day, and that a committee be appointed to confer with the War Department, and secure an accommodation.
Mr. Goode, of Norfolk, concurred with the views of Mr. Johnson.

On motion of Mr. Sheffey, the meeting resolved to suspend the election of all officers for the present.
Mr. Goode moved that a committee of five be appointed to confer with the War Department in relation to the order prohibiting the election of a President, to report to an adjourned meeting of the stockholders, to convene on the second Tuesday in November.
The Chair announced the committee as follows: J. F. Johnson, Charles M. Blackford, John F. Slaughter, G. C. Walker and R. W. Hughes.
A motion was made and passed that if the committee find that the company will be permitted to proceed with their business and elect their officers, they publish the fact in the papers.
Mr. Branch moved that the fiscal year of the company commence on the 1st of September, and on the 31st of August. Passed.
Col. Owen, President of the road, stated that he had not desired to be re-elected, and that he would occupy the place only till the difficulty with the government could be adjusted.

Mr. Wallace moved that the meeting, when it adjourns, adjourn till the second Tuesday of November. Adopted.
Col. Withers submitted the following resolution:
Resolved, That this meeting hereby enter its earnest protest against the interference of the military authorities of the United States in preventing by their order to-day the election of a President of the company.
After a long discussion the motion was submitted to the meeting, and passed only with one dissenting voice, to-wit, Col. McMullin.
On motion, the meeting then adjourned.
