NEWS OF THE DAY.

To show the very age and body of the Time... The President yesterday made an order remitting the sentence of a court-martial in the case of sixteen soldiers members of the first and fourth artillery, United States army, tried in Buffalo, New York, last summer, for conduct prejudicial to good order and military discipline.

The application for pardon of Jas. A. Seddon, formerly Secretary of War of the late Southern Confederacy, was under consideration at the meeting of the Cabinet on Tuesday last. Mr. Seddon's petition is well supported by influential endorsements, but by the advice of the members of the Cabinet, the President has decided to postpone action in the case for the present.

The Chicago correspondent of the St. Louis Democrat states that the late President Lincoln invested during his lifetime seventy-five thousand dollars—the proceeds of his salary—in Government bonds, and that his estate at his death was worth over one hundred thousand dollars.

Gen. Ord has ordered that when a Union man is arrested he "may have his trial by military commission, instead of a Rebel court, on his oath that he fears injustice on account of his Unionism." The Memphis Appeal says a Star Chamber and Inquisition in this arrangement.

The U. S. steamer Tuscarora arrived at Honolulu on September 16. Captain Stanley urged the payment of the claims held by the United States, and the King being in funds, has mortgaged three islands to secure the payment. One of the islands has a good harbor.

A new process has been discovered, by which paper can, by chemical and mechanical influences, be rendered as hard as hickory wood, and may be manufactured into a variety of articles hitherto made of wood, tin, copper and iron.

The stock and machinery of C. H. Speaks & Co., in New Haven, was burned yesterday. The loss on the building is \$25,000, which is insured for \$20,000. The loss on the stock and machinery is \$40,000, which is insured for \$23,000.

Four hundred and fifty barrels of Western high wines, shipped from Chicago to a firm in New York, were seized at Buffalo on an alleged violation of the Revenue laws. Fifty barrels of alcohol were also seized.

The President has, upon the recommendation of Governor Peirpoint and Attorney General Stanbery, pardoned Samuel Barron, of Virginia, ex-commodore of the Confederate navy. Gov. Orr has addressed a letter to President Johnson praying that an order of General Canby permitting only registered voters to serve on juries, be revoked.

The Legislature of Kentucky has passed a law taxing for State purposes the interest derived from United States bonds, five per cent. Gen. McClellan writes to a friend that he will probably arrive home on the 25th inst.

Letters from Norfolk county show a serious state of affairs among the negro squatters there. Besides resisting the United States officers, they have held meetings, which they attend armed; and at one of these meetings the chief speaker urged the idea that the negroes were more powerful than the whites in the South, and would hold the lands they were on at all hazards.

The telegraphic report of the refusal of the negroes who had settled on the farms of Mr. W. E. Taylor, at Willowby's Point, to leave when requested by the officers of the Freedmen's Bureau to do so, was investigated yesterday by General Brown, and found to be incorrect.

CULPEPER CO., CONSERVATIVE CONVENTION.

At a Convention of the Delegates from the different precincts of the County of Culpeper, held on Saturday, September 28th, 1867, on motion of Maj. John W. Bell, Dr. R. S. Lewis was appointed Chairman, and Col. C. T. Crittenden, Secretary.

On motion of Maj. John W. Bell the Chair appointed a Committee of five to examine the credentials of Delegates. The following Committee was appointed:—Maj. J. W. Bell, Col. Wager, Martin Stringfellow, Smith H. Rixey, and Alfred L. Ashby.

On motion of Maj. Bell, the meeting took a recess until half past one o'clock. Pursuant to adjournment the meeting assembled promptly at 1 1/2 o'clock, when Maj. J. W. Bell submitted the following report:

The Committee appointed to examine credentials of Delegates to the Convention, beg leave to report that forty-four Delegates are present, duly accredited.

On motion of Maj. J. W. Bell, the Chair appointed a Committee of five on permanent organization. Viz:—Maj. J. W. Bell, Capt. Alfred Thomas, Col. C. H. Wager, Thomas D. Haysbrough and J. G. B. Simms, who after hearing for a few moments reported that Dr. R. S. Lewis be appointed President, Col. E. A. Freeman, Vice President, and Col. C. T. Crittenden and A. J. Stoffer Secretaries. Their report was accepted.

On motion of Maj. John W. Bell, the Committee agreed that all persons attending this Convention from the different precincts of the County, be allowed to vote as Delegates.

Maj. J. W. Bell offered the following resolutions: Resolved, That the Convention will not now make a nomination, but will adjourn to the 1st Saturday in October, to which an amendment was offered by Dr. R. S. Lewis and accepted by Major Bell to the effect that the President of this Convention notify the Chairman of each precinct Committee of the time to which this Convention will adjourn, with the request that they notify their nominating Delegates.

Rejected by the Convention. The Convention then went in to nominations. Mr. A. J. Stoffer nominated Maj. A. M. Grimsley, which was warmly sustained by Dr. R. S. Lewis, Dr. Alex. Payne nominated Fayette Maury, Esq., who was warmly and at length advocated by Maj. Bell and Col. Freeman. Maj. Bell offered the following Resolution:

Resolved, That the whole vote of each Magisterial District shall first be ascertained, based upon the last county election, and the division of the votes before this Convention shall be made, to be ascertained by dividing the numerical vote of the District by the number of Delegates present.

Rejected, as not offered in time. (The being no other nomination the vote was taken, and resulted as follows: Maury, 12; Grimsley, 10. On motion, the nomination was made unanimous. Whereupon Fayette Maury was declared the unanimous choice of the Convention.

On motion of Maj. Bell, a committee of three was appointed to inform Mr. Maury of his nomination. The Chair appointed Maj. Bell, E. R. Gaines and— as said Committee, who waited on Mr. Maury, who came into the Convention, and in very appropriate remarks accepted the nomination, amidst great satisfaction and applause.

On motion, the Culpeper Observer, Alexandria Gazette and Richmond Enquirer & Examiner were requested to publish the proceedings. On motion, the Convention adjourned.
