

LOCAL NEWS.

MONDAY EVENING, OCTOBER 14.

COUNTY COURT—SATURDAY.—Com. vs. Julia Booth—on an indictment for petit larceny—jury returned a verdict of guilty and the Court being of opinion that the confinement in the jail has been sufficient, the prisoner was discharged.

Commonwealth vs. Randall Rainey—on an indictment for assault and battery—jury returned a verdict of guilty, and assessed the fine at \$50, and the Court awarded a capias ad audiendum iudicium, returnable to day, commanding the Sheriff of this county to bring the said Randall Rainey before the Court that judgment may be passed upon him. A scire facias was awarded against the said Randall Rainey and George Steunagel, his surety, returnable to the next January term, to show cause why execution should not be issued against them for the amount of said Rainey's recognizance in this cause.

Hannon Burns vs. Wm. Alexander—on a removal—judgment against defendant for \$5.54 and costs.

Commonwealth vs. Norval Robinson—charged with assault and battery—jury returned a verdict of guilty, and assessed the fine at \$5, and judgment accordingly, and for costs.

The Court then adjourned till eleven o'clock to-day.

To-day.—Commonwealth vs. Lewis Trisler, charged with petit larceny. The Court ordered the accused to be discharged.

Com. vs. Samuel Proctor, charged with robbery. The prisoner was brought into Court, and the Court sentenced him to five years imprisonment in the Penitentiary of this State.

The Court will doubtless adjourn this evening till Court in course.

PUBLIC MEETING AT VIENNA.—Col. M. D. Ball, the Conservative candidate for Fairfax County, addressed an assemblage at Vienna on Saturday evening, explaining his position.—The audience was not very large, but unusually intelligent and attentive. More than one-half were colored, and to them Col. Ball particularly addressed himself, reminding them of the friendship which the Southern people had shown them, both before and since their emancipation, and assuring that they had not the power nor desire to deprive them of their rights. He assured them that he favored their perfect protection in all the rights, necessary to their safety and prosperity, and warned them of the danger of arraying themselves in hostility to the Southern people. He advised them of the danger of going to extremes, and denying and opposing their friends, as it was sure to be remembered against them, when parties changed power. He also exploded the idea of freedom from taxation, (promised them by the Radicals) and showed that class taxation would injure them as well as the whites, and that if the military expenses, and political stealings were done away with, taxes would be light enough to bear. The speech was calm, argumentative, conciliatory and able, and was very well received.

In this connection it is not amiss to state that it is understood that Mr. Munsey will shortly lecture for the benefit of the choir above named, on which occasion an overflowing audience is confidently predicted.

DISGRACEFUL.—On Saturday night last, a party of men and women from this place, went across the river to "Possum Hall," for the purpose of having a dance, but all hands getting drunk, a row ensued, in which the females took a conspicuous part, and as a consequence, black eyes, torn clothes, scarred faces, knots and bruises were numerous. The party retired about daybreak yesterday, in such a condition that they had to be taken to their places of abode in wagons, carts, &c.

CHRIST CHURCH.—It is generally understood that the Rev. R. M. McKim, of Portsmouth, Va., has received a call to the vacant rectory of Christ Church, and his acceptance is confidently anticipated. Mr. McKim filled the pulpit of the venerated edifice yesterday morning and night, very acceptably to the congregation.

THE WEATHER.—We are having the most delightful Fall weather. The days are bright, but cool—and the moon lights up the earth with her beams, as soon as the "evening's shades prevail."

RADICAL MEETING TO-NIGHT.—A mass meeting of the Radical party of this place is to be held at Liberty Hall to-night. Quite a lively time is anticipated.

DIFFICULTY AT FAIRFAX C. H.—Chas. W. Turley and Richard F. Turley were arrested, examined and sent on for trial yesterday, at Fairfax C. H., on the charge of feloniously assaulting Dr. J. P. Scanland, and Wm. Trammell, on the evening of the 12th inst. Mr. Scanland was shot in the hand, in attempting to wrench a pistol from one of the assailants.

ACCESSIONS TO THE NEW (VILLAGE) CHURCH.—On yesterday morning, fourteen persons, principally the fruit of the revival, were admitted into membership at the Village Chapel. This church organization, started two weeks ago, numbers at present between thirty and forty members, and bids fair to steadily increase. The revival is still in progress.

NEW STEAMER.—We learn that the Potomac Ferry Company has contracted for a new and elegant Ferry Steamer, to ply between this city and Washington, to be finished and put on the route by the 1st of next March. The steamer is to be called the "City of Alexandria," in honor of our good old town.

SALT IN KEROSENE LAMPS.—A number of persons in this town have found by experience that the light of coal oil lamps is greatly improved, by adding to the oil one-fourth its weight of common salt. It makes the light much more brilliant and clear, keeps the wick clean, and prevents smoking.

PREACHING TO COLORED PEOPLE.—Rev. Mr. Munsey, of the M. E. Church, South, preached yesterday afternoon, in the colored peoples' Baptist Church, on Princess street, to a very large congregation. He was listened to with great attention and delight, by the crowded audience.

BASE BALL.—A well contested game of Base Ball was played on Saturday evening, between the 1st nines of the Monticello and Young America Clubs, on the grounds of the Pioneer, near Colross, resulting in the following score: Monticello 36; Young America 26.

DISORDER.—We regret to say that several cases of disorder and drunkenness occurred yesterday—intoxicated persons whooping and yelling in some of the streets. In Petersburg, in a row, a woman cut off one of the fingers of another woman.
