AGUE—CHILLS AND FEVERS.—An annual visitant of Tidewater Virginia, though by no means confined to that region, the above is a scourge almost as fervently hated, if not so much dreaded, as the famous "yellow jack" of the Gulf States.

RIVER NEWS.—A very heavy fog prevailed this morning on the river, and for a few hours navigation was obstructed. The Washington Ferry boats did not commence running until nearly nine o'clock.

THE "CITY OF ALEXANDRIA."—This new steamboat, built for the Alexandria and Maryland Steam Ferry Company, to ply between this city and the Maryland Shore, opposite, is nearly completed, and it is the intention of the President of the Company, to make a trial trip down the river in her this evening, at 3 o'clock.

POINT OF ALEXANDRIA.—From statistical tables, No. 9, just issued from the Treasury Department, and received at this office, it is observed that during the month ending July 31, 1867, there arrived here from coastwise ports thirty-two vessels, the tonnage of which amounted to 15,074, and with crews numbering 489 men.

REVIEW.—The troops in and around Washington, consisting of the 12th United States Infantry, the Veteran Reserve Corps, and the 5th United States Cavalry, on duty at the Headquarters of the Armies of the United States, will be reviewed to-morrow, at eleven o'clock, by the President, and General Grant, and other distinguished officials, on the grounds south of the Executive Mansion.

THE VIRGINIA LAND ASSOCIATION.—At meeting of the Directors of this Association was held to-day, at which its affairs and prospects were discussed, it was determined to hold meetings at Calvert's Station and Brentsville, at an early day, of which due notice will be given to promote the objects of the Association by interesting the land owners in the subject of emigration.

A NUISANCE.—The rooms over the old market house have become a nuisance not only from the dilapidated condition into which they have been allowed to fall, but from the use to which they are now continually subjected.

COMPLAINT.—Considerable complaint has been made of the manner in which the Ferry House, on the opposite side of the river, is conducted, and hopes are expressed that the proprietor will see to it that decency and propriety are maintained, or the ferry will be much injured, should the present state of affairs be continued.

GOVERNMENT BARGE INJURED.—On Tuesday evening last, as the government barge D. Megan, in tow of the steaming Fisher, was coming through the draw in the Long Bridge, she ran aground on one of the piers, and sustained considerable damage.
