### WORKING FOR NOTHING

The following article, which we copy from an exchange, contains much sound logic and many incontestable facts, in regard to the courtesies due the press, and the ungrateful manner in which they are generally extended:

"The free tickets given to the press for places of public amusement, etc., are always paid for very liberally. As a rule, those who issue—not those who receive—these free tickets, are the dead-heads—usually giving fifty cents for that which a five dollar bill would adequately pay for. So long as the newspaper editor is expected to give liberal notices of entertainments before they occur, and then follow these with a general puff after the show is over, he certainly has no place in the dead-head classification. Indeed, in nine cases out of ten, the editors would be glad to receive half pay for their work, and pay two prices for the free ticket. They certainly would make money by the operation. We may add a few words on the general subject of advertising. The publication of a newspaper as the publication of the news, and an editorial notice which is designed to supply the place of or add value to a regular advertisement, has even less claim to a gratuitous insertion than would such an advertisement. Yet there are those who ask just such gratuitous notices, and this almost as matter of right. If these same persons should be asked to make a present of a dozen yards of muslin to each purchaser of a merino dress, or a pound of tea, or half a dozen free tickets, to whoever engaged twenty seats at a concert, they would demand an insult. Yet why should not the demand be given away as freely as should and are the products of the editor's and publisher's labor and capital? The merchant makes his profit and living by selling his goods. The publisher of a newspaper makes his by selling his advertising columns, not by giving them away, and when he does this give them in aid of a public library or other benevolent object, he deserves thanks as a public benefactor, and not insults as a 'dead head.'"

### ARRIVAL OF MORE IMMIGRANTS.

We are pleased to announce the arrival of another party of English immigrants, under the auspices of the Virginia Immigration Society. They can be communicated with through the officers of that Society in this city. They are suitable for farm hands, gardeners, &c. We hope that prompt employment and good homes will be found by all who may come to cast their fortunes among us. Let them be encouraged to come in numbers. We need their labor and need them for political and social reasons. After the scenes of Tuesday, who is not ready to cut loose from the faithless colored man, and look elsewhere for his labor. He has turned against us—against the hand that sustains him and the home that protects him; he has basely conspired with our enemies for our destruction, and now let him seek for his self-interest. The Old World is teeming with industrious, intelligent, skillful laborers, who will gladly come where their labor will be better rewarded and where their circumstances, in every respect, will be bettered. Then let them come; let them be encouraged to do so; let farmers, contractors, housekeepers and others send their orders to the Virginia Immigration Society, and they will be supplied with the best laborers, and servants who will not fail to give satisfaction. A gentleman who recently supplied himself with white labor from Europe, remarked with pride that he was much pleased with the result of his experiment. We hope many will follow his example.—Lynch. ### THE EXTRAORDINARY BUNCH OF GRAPES.

A gentleman named W. H. Rogers, writes as follows to the Glasgow Herald from Southampton:—"With reference to a paragraph which lately appeared in the Glasgow Herald respecting an extraordinary bunch of grapes, weighing 17 lbs. 2 1/2 oz., exhibited by Mr. Archibald Fowler, gardener to the Earl of Stair, I beg to state that my grandfather, John Rogers, author of the 'Fruit Cultivator,' &c., who died in 1842, aged 92, often spoke of the enormous bunch grown at Welbeck, in the year 1781, by his friend Speechley, the then head gardener there, and in a sketch of the life and reminiscences of John Rogers, written by himself in 1840, is the following memorandum:—'While I was in the noble bunch of the Syrian grapes, weighing exactly 19 lbs. 3 oz., which I mentioned in the 'Fruit Cultivator,' was cut in the Duke of Portland's garden at Welbeck, in Nottinghamshire. It was made up of the Duke to Earl Fitzwilliam, Wentworth Hall, in Yorkshire, and was carried all the way (more than twenty miles) in a basket made for the purpose, and suspended from a long pole supported by two men.—While on a visit to Mr. Speechley, by two men afterwards I tasted some berries from the same vine, but it never afterwards produced so enormous a bunch—such as I saw and tasted were about 8 lbs. and 10 lbs. weight—so there can be no doubt about the fact.'"
