**JUDGE CHASE.**  
Chief Justice Chase visited Ohio just before the election and made a speech in favor of the party advocating that universal colored suffrage of which he has always been understood to be a potential advocate. But his trust friend, the Cincinnati Commercial, now makes proclamation that "notwithstanding the great reputation as a radical that Judge Chase has, he is in temperament and convictions one of the most truly conservative men in the country!" Not only does he discountenance entirely the confiscation of the lands of Southern white men and their division among the colored people, and is also opposed to the impeachment of the President, but as to colored suffrage the Commercial says:  
"He never urged it. He recognized the fact that while in the Southern States, where the great body of loyalists were black, colored suffrage was demanded by considerations of the public safety, no such demand was made in the North, and that the Southern whites might, in a great degree, have their prejudices conquered by coupling suffrage with amnesty, which there was no such inducement in the North to make application of the golden rule." Accepting in good faith this statement in behalf of the Chief Justice, it can only be said that the emotion produced by the results of the Ohio election appears to have turned his head nearly to a rebel grey in a single night. It New York and one or two other States should happen to go in the same direction, we should not be surprised if some of his confidential agents discover that he is not only opposed to colored suffrage in the North, but that his fine moral sense and innate love of justice have always revolted at the idea of compelling the South to make that her daily bread which the North will not touch even in infinitesimal doses.—*Baltimore Sun.*

**THE SITUATION.**  
It is the instinct of human nature—indeed, of all animated nature of whatever grade, from the lowest to the highest forms of life—to seek its own protraction and its own advancement. Generally we know what to do to avoid danger and secure safety and comfort, but the uncertainties of our present situation and the numerous contingencies to which we are subject, are such as to leave us in doubt and confusion of mind. Of course, we all naturally desire to do the best that we can under the trying circumstances in which we are placed. How to do it, is the question. If, when authorized to vote, we exercise suffrage in accordance with our best reflections, and with the best intentions, we know not that we may not be doing what will bring down upon our heads and upon our people and State some new punishment, some new thunderbolt, "red with uncommon wrath." We are invested with a sort of spectral, shadowy, unreal free-agency; authorized and advised to vote, and yet threatened if we vote as our instincts and interests require, that we will do it at our peril. We say, therefore, that we would rather have no suffrage than a conditional suffrage, no elections than sham elections. If we are not to govern ourselves we would rather have no part or lot, no merely nominal and unreal connection with agency in elections. This, we believe, is the feeling of all our people. Nor does it spring from any contumacious or rebellious disposition. It arises from and out of the doubts, difficulties and distraction incident to our present anomalous situation.—*Rich. Whig.*

**A SINGULAR CLAIM.**—It will be remembered that Secretary Mculloch, some weeks ago, received a package containing \$19,000, a greater portion of which was in 7-30 bonds, with the numbers cut out, and the remainder in national currency. No letter or signature accompanied the money, but the envelope was post marked Urbana, Ohio. The money was placed to the credit of the conscience fund, there being nothing to show from whom it came, and the fact that the numbers were cut out of the bonds proved that the former owner of them did not want to be known. On Wednesday last a letter was received from a party in Wisconsin, the postmark being Honey Creek. The writer claimed that he sent the money to be converted into other securities, such as the Secretary might think proper to send, and gave as his reason for sending no communication or signature with the money, that he was very sick at the time, and not able to write. The officers of the Treasury are of the opinion that the letter is from some party who saw the publication that \$19,000 had been received, and thinks he can claim the same. Detectives of the Treasury will look into the matter.—*Washington Star.*

**OUT OF WORK.**—One may see whole hordes of colored people on the streets, thronging the pavements and corners, sunning themselves in perfect indolence. A great many of them have lately been thrown out of employment. We know of several gentlemen who have dispensed with the labor of these people, and will at once take steps to substitute them with a number of other laborers to provide. Quite a number of orders have been left with the "Immigration Society" within the past few days, and the demand for white labor will continue to increase till the shelves are crowded with profitable occupations. This course has been forced upon us in our own defence.—*Lynch. Rep.*

**ANTI-RADICAL MOVEMENT.**—We understand that the young men in the stores of the city contemplate holding a meeting with reference to coming to a mutual understanding in regard to taking upon themselves certain light duties heretofore performed by colored men, so that their employers may dispense with the services of the latter. This is in consequence of the spirit manifested. This plan if carried out will cause quite a number of them to have to look elsewhere for their bread and meat. What else can they expect after the hostile and offensive attitude they have assumed towards the people of the South?—*Lynch. Vr.*
