A SEVERE CHASTISEMENT.—The New Orleans Republican of the 19th tells of the following amusing occurrence:

One of the depositors in the late First National Bank of New Orleans was Mr. F. Bauer, dealer in trunks, musical instruments, etc. No. 38 Camp street. It is stated that the amount of his deposit was about \$18,000, and that it was made about twenty-four hours before the bank failed. Yesterday, at about twelve o'clock, Mr. Bauer, while walking along Carondelet street, with a brush and pot of marking ink in his hand, met Mr. D. B. Forbes, the late President of the First National Bank, and immediately saluted him thus: "You rascal! you have ruined me and my daughter!" Bauer immediately grasped Forbes, the marking ink flew over his face and clothing, and the sidewalk was bespattered with it. The spectators who heard the exclamation opened the way for Bauer to punish Forbes, presuming that it was an affair of criminal intrigue. Bauer for a while had his own way, with one hand twisting the financiers neck tie, and choking him so that his tongue protruded, and with the other laying the cowhide over his head and shoulders in no gentle blows. Forbes at length broke his cane over Bauer's shoulders, but was still wincing under the terrible strokes of the hide and the disgrace of the punishment inflicted on him, when Bauer, having satisfied his anger, released the financier from the unpleasant position which he was forced into. By this time several hundred people were collected around the antagonists, and the ex-president of the bank, whose complexion could not be distinguished in consequence of the profusion of marking ink upon his person, rushed into a cab, and went up Carondelet street. Bauer, who remained master of the field, deliberately walked along Carondelet street amid the congratulations of those who witnessed his punishment of the party who controlled his deposits, many still being under the impression that another wrong had been added to the loss of deposits by a disgraceful criminal intrigue, resulting in the degradation and ruin of the daughter.

STONEWALL JACKSON.—In the Religious Herald for this week we find the following interesting incident in the life of Jackson, which gives us an insight into some of the thoughts that occupied his mind the day after the great battle in which he won his immortal sobriquet of "Stonewall."

A few days after the first battle of Manassas an eager, anxious crowd was assembled at the postoffice in Lexington, Va., on the arrival of the mail. The greatest excitement prevailed, and tidings "from the front" were eagerly sought after. The venerable Dr. White (pastor of the Presbyterian Church) took a letter from the postoffice, and recognizing it as in the handwriting of Brigadier General (afterwards "Stonewall") Jackson, he said to the crowd, "Here is a letter from General Jackson—now we will have full and authentic particulars of the battle." The crowd eagerly asked him to read aloud, and pressed round to hear the expected stirring news from the field of conflict. He broke the seal and, to the great disappointment of all, found only these few lines:

"MANASSAS JUNCTION, July 22, '61.
"MY DEAR PASTOR—I remember that my subscription to Domestic Missions is about due. Please find enclosed \$30.
"Yours, very truly,
"T. J. JACKSON."

No word about the great battle in which he had played so conspicuous a part—no time or inclination to tell of those heroic deeds which rendered famous, forever, "Stonewall Jackson and the Stonewall Brigade"—but he could afford the time to send to his pastor money which he had promised to the treasury of the Lord!

The example of this great and good man teaches a lesson which many would do well to heed.

AN IMPROVED HYDRAULIC ENGINE.—We have been much interested in a new machine for the application of water power, the invention of Major Luther M. Sabin, of St. Louis. By this contrivance the pressure of a column of water is used somewhat as the expansive pressure of steam is used; to produce a piston and shaft motion. From a vat or strong square box a tube rises to the height of forty or fifty feet, according to the power required, and at the top of the tube is a small vat, sufficient to receive the water supply and transmit it to the tube and vat below. Entering the latter at the side and near the bottom are two cylinders, with pistons and valves. The water pressure drives each piston alternately, with slight exhaustion of water, and with a force proportioned to the height of the tube. Machinery may be applied to a lever attached to the pistons, or directly to the pistons. The water can be raised by the hydraulic ram or supplied from a reservoir when convenient.

Any reflecting person will see that here is an invention of astonishing simplicity and great value. The original cost, complexity, expense of working, and danger of a steam engine, can by this plan be dispensed with in multitudes of cases. The matter is eminently worthy of the attention of machinists.—St. Louis Democrat.

THE WORD "NEGRO."—"Colored persons" will see that Hon. Gerrit Smith, who has done more for that race than any living man, does not hesitate to use the word "negro" in speaking of them. There is no disrespect implied in the use of the only word in the English language which describes the race. In the Italian, Spanish, and Portuguese languages "negro" means black; in Latin, niger; and in French, negro. We should be ashamed to apply the term to them if it were an opprobrious one, or employed merely to mortify them. But as it means nothing worse than "black," and is as innocent as the word "white," they should learn to look upon its use without dislike. Langston, the mulatto orator from Ohio, always calls negroes negroes.—Rich. Dis.
