RECEIVING AND CONCEALING FIFTY POUNDS OF LEAD AND BRASS, TWO SOLDIERS' OVERCOATS, AND OTHER ARTICLES, THE GOODS AND CHATTLES OF ABRAHAM DRISUE, was held in the sum of \$500 security to appear at the January term of the court.

INTERNAL REVENUE DECISIONS.—When a person who has entered into contract to convey certain lands upon payment of a certain sum, makes a written endorsement of a partial payment upon the copy of the contract held by the party making the payment, and signs it, he should affix a two cent stamp if the amount received exceeds twenty dollars.

DEATH OF DR. BROWN.—We regret to learn that Dr. J. CONWAY BROWN, died on Saturday last, in New York, whether he had gone to consult some eminent physician as to his health. His remains will be brought to Berryville, Clarke county, his late residence, for interment.

WHARF CHANGED.—It was stated in the Gazette a week or two since that it was proposed to change the landing place of the Aquia Creek steamers at this city. The arrangements for the contemplated change were to day definitely settled, and on and after Friday, the 15th instant, the boats on the Aquia Creek line will stop at the wharf of Messrs. Hoce & Wedderburn, foot of Prince street, for the use of the steamboat company have agreed to pay \$240 per annum.

PUBLIC LECTURES.—At a meeting of the Friendship Fire Company, held in the hall of their Engine House on Monday evening last, it was determined to inaugurate a course of lectures during the approaching winter, the proceeds resulting from which to be appropriated to the benefit of the Company. Several distinguished gentlemen have been invited to deliver addresses before the Company, among whom are mentioned the Rev. Messrs. Munsey, Lettwich and Jones.

JUDICIAL DECREE.—During the session of the Circuit Court of Loudoun county, which adjourned on Saturday last, a final decree was entered in the Chancery cause of Lersner against Bently and others, decreeing to complainant a fee simple title to the tracts of land, containing 1,750 acres, purchased by said Lersner of Smart & Bently during the war.—The decree entered was a compromised decree.

Moses is one of the most respectable colored men in the city, and was one of the ninety-nine who voted the conservative ticket at the late election.

BURIAL OF A CONFEDERATE.—The remains of Samuel A. Ashford, of Fairfax county, a member of the 1st Va. Regt. of infantry, who died while a prisoner at Point Lookout, during the war, was brought to this city and reinterred.

ALEXANDRIA CANAL AQUEDUCT.—It is confidently expected by the lessees of the Alexandria Canal, that two spans of the new aqueduct at Georgetown will be completed and erected during the current week.
