PROGRESS OF SETTLEMENT IN VIRGINIA.—The Abington Virginian says:—“There is a large and growing Northern immigration coming into the Lower Valley of Virginia. They are bringing much wealth and population into the counties of Frederick, Shenandoah, Rockingham and Augusta. A good many sales to Northern men have been made also in Albemarle, and the movement into the country stretching thence to the Potomac is considerable. Under the influence of this Northern demand, lands are beginning to be ready for sale in all the country thus named. Large land holders are dividing up their estates, selling one part to get out of the country, and the other in high cultivation. The wave is extending in our own direction. There are many estates and sales in Bedford, Botetourt and Shenandoah. Much of this activity in real estate is due to the enterprise of the land agents.”

TAKING THE CENSUS.—The officers engaged in taking the new census of the District are meeting with many hindrances in their work, and instead of completing it in one day as had been hoped, it will apparently take some days to finish the task. In many instances the officers meet the most childish opposition to answering the questions. Many seem to think that the questioning is designed as the basis of some new tax, and refuse pertinaciously to answer. Others, in Government employ, seem to think there is some terrible political plot under the questions whether they design a permanent residence here, and refuse to answer lest their privilege of voting at home in the States where they claim a residence, should be questioned hereafter. The ladies at the top in arms against the question as to age, and denounce the officers as a prying inquisitorial set of fellows.—Wash. Star.
