A MYSTERY EXPLAINED.—If startling phenomena were promptly investigated (says the Watchman and Reflector) by minds free from superstition and fear, occurrences that appear to have a supernatural origin would often find an easy solution. Judge Parsons used to tell with great zest of an incident in his travels which would have furnished food for a whole company of village gossips.

His wife, who seemed much agitated, waked him one night at a village inn, and told him there was a woman sitting at the foot of the bed knitting. The Judge saw the figure as distinctly as his wife, but having no thought of a supernatural origin of vision, began to speculate on its real cause. After looking sharply for some minutes, while the woman knitted on with untroubled composure, he was convinced that he could see the wall through her, and that she could not, therefore, be substantial flesh and blood. This discovery, which might have frightened weaker men, only aroused his curiosity. He at once rose from the bed, and walking to the foot, saw that no one was there—the form had vanished.

Putting his head as nearly as possible in the position where he had seen the woman, the mystery was at once explained. He saw a circular hole in the shutter behind the bed, through which rays of light were streaming, and going to this hole to look through, saw a woman in a room on the other side of the street knitting. The nerves of the wife were shortly soothed by this discovery, and the inquisitive spirit of the Judge was gratified by so simple an explanation of the apparition. Many ghost stories could be easily shorn of their apparently supernatural character by a cool and careful investigation.

THE PRESIDENT AND THE CONSTITUTION.—“8. Before he enter on the execution of his office, he shall take the following oath or affirmation: “I do solemnly swear (or affirm) that I will faithfully execute the office of president of the United States, and will, to the best of my ability, preserve, protect and defend the Constitution of the United States.”

The President is thus by the supreme authority and his oath of office, made the champion and defender of the Constitution to the best of his ability. To say that his opinion about the constitutionality of a law is of no more account than that of a private citizen, and that he must execute the will of Congress, although he knows it violates the charter of liberty which he has sworn to uphold and defend, is such folly as could only come from an extreme partisan drunk with passion.

We are not saying that the President's view of the law is right or wrong. He holds, we believe, that the law, as it stands, does not forbid the removal of Stanton; and that if it did, the act would be in conflict with the Constitution. He has sought, without violence, to test this question in the courts, and the people, however much they may dislike Mr. Johnson personally, can see little to object against such a course. We believe that Congress has made a great mistake in joining issue upon this case, and making it the basis of extreme action, because no great moral principle is involved in the retention of the disagreeable Secretary, and the object is not worth a serious contest.—*N. Y. Jour. of Com.*

ANTS.—We published, a few issues back, a recipe for keeping the troublesome ants from the larder, the cupboard, safe, &c., which was recommended as being highly effective. It consisted of a judicious application of salt. A correspondent writing from Warrenton, N. C., suggests another remedy against these pests, which is not only simple, but he says efficacious. He has tried it and knows whereof he speaks. He says: “Place the vessels or stands, or whatever the ants may attack, on a piece of walnut plank, and you will see no more of them. Try it and you will not be disappointed. I presume the odor of the wood drives them off.”

GEN. Lee.—The London “Quarterly Review,” replying to an essay by Goldwin Smith, who cites Lincoln, Grant, Sherman and Stanton (!) as examples of American great men, says: “We admit that Mr. Stanton and his colleagues have done great things on a great scale, but they lack the stamp of individual greatness. If that is to be found anywhere in America, it is under the modest form of Gen. Lee, the champion of the lost cause, whom prosperity never intoxicated, nor adversity depressed, and who exceeded his opponent as much in reliability and greatness of character as he did in military skill and daring.”

LANGUAGES.—The extended use for different languages in the same country at this day, called for by the facilities of communication and convenience between nations, necessitates their study to a larger extent than ever before. Not only is a knowledge of English, French, German, Spanish, &c., deemed a desideratum, but the announcement is made that classes for instruction in the Russian language are to be opened in the Mercantile Library building in New York city. The reasons assigned for this experiment are the increasing intercourse between this country and Russia, and the acquisition of Russian America.
