

LOCAL NEWS.

FRIDAY EVENING, MARCH 6.

THE SECOND WARD RADICALS "RAMPAGERS."—The Radicals of the Second Ward of this city, "united," "having awakened to the importance of the occasion," met in solemn convocation, on Wednesday night last, and with malice prepense perpetrated the following, which will doubtless have the designed effect. Here it is:

Whereas, Andrew Johnson, President of the United States, has conspired to subvert the army, to overthrow the Government of the United States, and by his traitorous designs and schemes has retarded the Reconstruction of the Southern States and the admission of said States into the Union, and is a stumbling block on the road to peace, an usurper of power, a violator of the Constitution, and a conspirator against the rights and liberties of a free and independent people; therefore,

Resolved, That we most heartily endorse the action of the Senate of the Fortieth Congress in sustaining the Hon. E. M. Stanton against the lawless usurpations of a miscreant President; and we earnestly pray that Andrew Johnson be speedily removed from the Presidential chair, as the welfare of the American people demands such action.

Resolved, That the thanks and support of the Republicans of Alexandria is hereby tendered to the members of the House of Representatives who voted for the impeachment of Andrew Johnson; and, also, to the Honorable Senators, who may sustain such action, for traitors ought to take a back seat in the work of Reconstruction, and treason ought to be made odious.

It may be important to state that the ostensible author of the above, who has thus obtained for himself a lasting fame, is named A. P. Breen, and further that C. W. DeWitt presided at the meeting, and C. J. Burton acted as Secretary—further, that after the unanimous passage of the astounding and overwhelming "whereas" and "resolved," that "addresses" were delivered by A. P. Breen, John Brooks, George Graham, C. W. DeWitt and A. L. White, white and colored, and that the meeting after its herculean labors, adjourned at a late hour!

THE RIVER.—There is still a great deal of ice in the river, and navigation is much hindered. The Aquia Creek steamers are making but one trip a day, and the Washington ferry boats are not yet able to resume their trips. The steamer Valley City arrived last night from New York, having followed in the wake of the Keyport. The tugs Katie Wice and Potomac left again this morning, to tow up several vessels, ice bound below; among them two coal schooners, and a schooner loaded with salt, from Turk's Island, which have been in the river since the first freeze, unable to get up.—The ice is fast breaking up and disappearing, and should the thaw continue, navigation may be resumed next week. If possible, the steamer Wawaset is to resume her trips to Mt. Vernon on Monday next.

ARRESTED AND COMMITTED.—One S. Miller, who it is charged had in his possession the money stolen from Mr. Lee of Fairfax county, on Wednesday night, while in the house of Frances Miller, on West street, was arrested in Washington yesterday, on Pennsylvania avenue, by Detective McDevitt and brought to this city last night by officer Sipple. He had in his possession \$86.80 in money, a new pistol and a new overcoat. The coat he is charged with having stolen from a clothing store in Washington. On his arrival here he was at once committed to await an examination.

AN EXAMINATION OF THE CASE WAS HELD AT THE JAIL THIS MORNING, before Justice Moore, when Miller was recommitted for trial at the April term of the County Court.

Alexandria Market, March 6, 1868.

REMARKS.—The market closes with some animation, except for Flour, which continues quiet—prices firm. For Wheat there was a better enquiry, and we note sales of 600 bushels red at 240, 250, 260 and 265, according to quality from fair to good. Corn continues in active request, but the offerings have fallen off, only reaching about 8000 bushels, with sales of white and mixed at 107 1/2 to 111 1/2. Rye in fair demand, with sales at 100. Oats steady and unchanged. Butter in active demand for good. Dressed Poultry in very active demand. Eggs in fair supply. Lard firm.

BALTIMORE MARKET, March 5.—Flour.—The market has ruled again steady, receipts continue light, and the demand, though not active, prevents any accumulation of stock in receivers' or millers' hands.

BALTIMORE CATTLE MARKET, March 5.—Beef Cattle.—Prices to-day ranged as follows: Old Cows and Steers, at 45 to 55; ordinary thin Steers, Oxen and Cows 5 to 6; common to fair Stock Cattle 5 25 to 6; fair quality Beves 6 to 7; and the very best Beves 8 to 10 per 100 lbs, the average price being about \$6 87 1/2 gross. On common and medium Cattle there was a slight decline, while good and extra qualities were unchanged.
