Loudoun County, Va.
A series of interesting letters lately appeared in the Loudoun Mirror, written by Fenton M. Henderson, esq., giving a description of the social and agricultural advantages of Loudoun county, which, we are glad to see, have been collected and published in pamphlet form.—From these letters we make the following extract, and will, in subsequent numbers of the Gazette, copy other portions:
The county is bounded for forty miles on the north by the Potomac river, or within one mile of Harper's Ferry to Seneca Dam, a little above the Great Falls of the Potomac.

Along the banks of this river the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal, and the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad run, on the Maryland side, for thirteen miles, to the Point of Rocks, and the canal follows the river to Seneca above mentioned. Ferries at Berlin, Point of Rocks, Noland's, Hawling's, White's, Edwards', covering a distance of thirty miles, allow of access, (the first two to the railroad and canal, and the others) to the canal, while a light lock at Edward's Ferry, lets boats out into the river, which at the usual stages of water, come up nearly to Hawling's Ferry. There is a fine reach of the river between Edward's and Seneca, where there is a feeder lock.

Harper's Ferry is eighty-one miles from Baltimore, and the Point of Rocks sixty-nine, while they are respectively sixty-one and forty-nine from Georgetown by the canal, which is usually closed from December 1st to March 1st every year by ice or for repairs. The locks on the canal admit of the passage of boats one hundred feet long and fourteen wide, and drawing five to six feet water, (the latter being the intended depth of water in the canal,) and allowing a load of one hundred and thirty tons of coal, or eleven hundred barrels of flour.

Before the war, there was a bridge at Berlin, four miles below Harper's Ferry, and another at the Point of Rocks, thirteen miles below.—These were burnt during the war, but the abutments and piers of substantial masonry are only awaiting a little capital, or the awakening of energy, to have again put upon them structures that will add greatly to the value of the lands in that fine section of our county.

But last June the track of the Alexandria, Loudoun and Hampshire Railroad was relaid to Leesburg, the county seat, and the road is graded and the ties are ready for the iron to Mercer's depot, and a little money will carry it to Wheatland Station, the crossing of the Loudoun and Berlin turnpike.

Leesburg is thirty-seven, Mercer's forty-three, and Wheatland forty-six miles from Alexandria.

The people of the District of Columbia are now agitating the question of a branch road connecting, probably, by way of the Little Falls, with the Loudoun & Hampshire road about eight or ten miles from Alexandria.

Thus the markets of Baltimore, Georgetown, Washington and Alexandria, all shipping ports, will meet nearly in the heart of Loudoun county about forty-five miles from the last three.

In addition to the public improvements above named there is a turnpike from Snickersville to Georgetown, with a branch to Alexandria; another from Alexandria to Aldie, and, branching there, to Paris in the southwest corner of the county, and to Snickersville in the western part, and thence continued to Winchester twenty miles distant, and lastly a graded road from Parcellville (nine miles above Leesburg) to Berlin on the Baltimore & Ohio Road.

The Eastern line of the country is twenty-two miles from Washington City, the Southern boundary from thirteen to twenty-five miles from Leesburg, and the Loudoun & Hampshire road, and from eight to twelve miles from the Manassas Gap Railroad, at points varying from thirty to sixty from Alexandria. When the railroad shall have been completed to Wheatland Station no farm in the county will be more than twelve miles from a railroad station, and none more than sixty from tide water at Alexandria or Washington city, or more than three miles from a mill. The Blue Ridge Mountains bound it on the West, the Eastern line of the county being thirty-two miles from that range and the Fauquier line about twenty-six miles from the Potomac river at Berlin.
