CIRCUMSTANCES ALTER CASES.—When the colored delegates from Washington city and from Delaware demanded to be admitted to seats in the quadrennial Conference at Chicago, and to share in the deliberations of that body, the majority of the proposal seems to have struck many of the white clericals with surprise. On the spur of the moment, some of the members of the Conference were disposed to admit the black brethren. Others, however, were determined they should not be recognized. For two whole days the debate on this subject was pressed and at last it was left to the nine Bishops to decide what ought to be done in a case where no less than two hundred and fifty white ministers had agreed to disagree. So far then as the great body of the Conference is concerned, the question of negro equality has been for the present evaded.

There still remained one other troublesome point. It was by no means difficult in a hospitable city like Chicago to assign the white ministers to comfortable quarters; but the difficulty was to dispose of the two colored delegates, unassigned, but who could not be turned off without food or lodging. Nobody seemed willing to take them, and it must be confessed it was a piece of downright pertinence in these brethren to trust themselves not only where they were wanted, but where they disturbed the consciences of two hundred and fifty white ministers of whom it was intended the Conference should be exclusively composed. In this dilemma, a certain Brother Hatfield, with a spirit worthy of an ancient martyr, rose and said, "the colored brethren would be very welcome to the hospitality of his bed and board during the session of the Conference." This heroic act of self-abnegation was greeted with immense applause, and the perplexing affair seemed finally to have settled itself very pleasantly. But Brother Hatfield is a married man, and there are such things as "curtain lectures." Now, mark the sequel. "On the following morning," says the Chicago Times, "Brother Hatfield put in an early appearance. His countenance wore a look of discomposure; and he looked very like a man who had not slept well. Getting the floor, he proceeded to state that, upon reflection, he had decided that it would not be convenient for him to entertain the colored brethren, and therefore he begged permission to withdraw his proffer of the day before." It was a painful matter, he said, to dwell upon; but the fact was, that it was not exactly convenient. At last accounts, the two colored brethren were assigned to a cheap boarding house, on Fourth avenue, and peace like a dove, had lighted upon the walls of the block. — *Baltimore Gazette.*

HORACE GREELEY says, "for young men who are worth \$1,000 each, we regard Virginia, Tennessee, and the Carolinas, as very inviting. Twenty such may buy for \$10,000 an estate large enough to put up into twenty good farms, and then have half of their money left for improvements, &c." By setting together and cherishing a fraternal spirit, they may diminish by one-half the amount they must otherwise invest in teams, implements, &c. We advise no poor young man to migrate South alone; but let twenty to forty go together, buy an estate judiciously located, cut it up, start a store, a blacksmith shop, a common school, &c. and they will double the value of their purchase in one year, and be in good circumstances within ten years. There are as cheap lands and as good chances to-day in the South as in the West; but a man worth \$100 may squat in the West on a quarter-section in some section remote from present settlements, and grow into a competence, whereas we could advise no one to migrate Southward with less than \$500; while if he goes alone and settles among utter strangers, he will need far more than that. — *Idem.*

THE JAFFA COLONY.—A correspondent of the New York Tribune, writing from Beirut, Syria, says: "The famous, or rather infamous, colony at Jaffa, under President Adams' solony laws, although reduced to about 25 persons. It is not so small, however, that it is not still divided by intestine feuds. Adams and wife are about to proceed to England to find recruits and funds. No doubt they will succeed. They have already some English members of the colony, and the English are far more insouciant on the subject of the Holy Land than Americans. You meet here at every turn some half-crazed man or woman from England, who has come out here to help fulfil the prophecies of Scripture, as he or she interprets them. These deluded, and often wretched, enthusiasts are legitimate game for such rogues as Adams." As far as one can see, the colony now depends for existence upon such means, or no means have been sown, and there are no apparent means of subsistence. The few travellers who have been fortunate enough to land at Jaffa this year seem to have all taken the time to see the colony, and judge for themselves of Adams' claims.

A story is told by Chandler, of New York, which shows that a great English novelist now on a visit here is taking notes. A gentleman on horseback passed Mr. Trollope and by accident the horse hesitated, the Englishman with him. The gentleman reined up and apologized. "No matter, sir," said Trollope, "but I would like to inquire if your horse has a name, and if not I would name him." "Certainly," responded the gentleman, "you can name him." "The name, sir," said Trollope, "I name him 'Donkey.'" "No," said the other, "the name of the animal had evidently been an attendant upon the late sessions of the House of Representatives."
