Fruit Trees along Fences.
"F. G." thus writes to the New York Evening Post, and it seems to us that what he says is something worth the serious attention of those most interested:

"I once met a man who had 'strange freaks' about planting trees. Along his fences, in every direction, he planted trees of all kinds. Along the road were apples of winter varieties, so that the boys could not pick them. They were 'handsome,' the owner said, and he was quite right. Such red and fair cheeks were seldom seen, for these trees, as well as the rest along the fences, had the benefit of field culture, tearing up the roots more or less; but the grass immediately around the trees remained, and was never disturbed.

"It was interesting to see this farm, fenced in and cross fenced with trees of all kinds, but each kind by itself on its own line. Thus there were 'fences' of peaches, pears, plums and cherries, interspersed with currants, forming a fine bowery range. One fence had a variety of all kinds, not promiscuously scattered, but put together by divisions.

"From a distance this had a fine effect; nothing could well exceed it. You could see the fences come running down a hill, or sweeping around it, and standing thicker and more established on the plain; and fruit trees of largest of all, surrounded and were scattered in among the buildings—all fruit trees. The only pain to the eye was the grass at the roots of the trees. I mentioned this. 'Pooh! they'll do all the better.' Look at the fruit; you want to treat them as you do some women, treat them rough and they'll do all the better for you.' This philosophy was questionable, but then he had the fruit to show—and I said no more.

"Here was a large yield, a great income, and without interfering the least with the cultivation of the farm. And there was all the change for sun and air, with low tops generally. There was cultivation of the soil, and the grass to restrain exuberance of growth, if there is any force in that. There was, however, no protection, which a multitude of trees grouped will afford.

"There was no pruning, each tree was left to itself; and when one died another was put in. Early ripening seemed to be a result of this scattering, and a better quality of fruit, I thought, especially when it is considered that there was no pruning.

"The soil in the valley or plain was a dark sandy loam; on the hills yellow, with more or less clay; and these trees (on the upland) were bent down most of them with fruit, with less growth of wood, as is to be expected.

"Here were beauty and profit combined. No special orchard was grown. It was not needed; all was given to grain and grass. And these trees afforded ample shade for the herds. They also affected the grain some along the fence, but not much.

"Here is a lesson certainly. Our uncultivated fence-land can thus be made to yield, and yield more largely than the regular average orchard itself. It will supply all the fruit needed, with considerable to sell, with no interference with the regular business of the farm, save only the gathering of the fruit—fruit grown to hand as though the wildwood had given it to you. Pruned and taken care of, the crop of course would improve, as well as the beauty of the landscape.
