LE JARDIN MABLE.

There's drinking and gambling at many a stand; There's feasting and flirting on every hand; The Paphian queen it was easy to tell, Is the abess to-night of your anchorite cell; And the marvellous Turk (for the Sultan is here) Cries, "Allah! Meshallah!—these Christians are queer; Such orgies as these very plainly reveal Why they don't take their wives to the *Jardin Mable*."

"A pity!" you sigh, and a pity it is Such revels should shame such a garden as this; Where all that is charming in nature and art Serves only to sully and harden the heart. "The Devil's own hot-house," you musingly say, While turning in sadness and sorrow away, Reflecting that sin, as you potentially feel Is the thrickest plant in the *Jardin Mable*.
