**The Silence of the Arctic Night.**  
In his new work, "The Open Polar Sea," Dr. Hayes thus describes the fearful solitude and stillness of the Arctic night:

"I have gone out in the Arctic night, and viewed nature under varied aspects. I have rejoiced with her in her strength and commended with her in her repose. I have seen the wild burst of her anger, have watched her sportive play, and have beheld her robed in silence. I have walked abroad in the darkness when the winds were roaring through the hills and crashing over the plain. I have strolled along the beach when the only sound that broke the stillness was the dull creaking of ice tables, as they rose and fell lazily with the tide. I have wandered far out on the frozen sea, and listened to the voice of the icebergs bewailing their imprisonment; along the glacier, where forms and falls the avalanche; upon the hill-top, where the drifting snow, coursing over the rocks sang its plaintive song, and again I have wandered away to some distant valley where all these sounds were hushed, and the air was still and solemn as the tomb.

And it is here that the Arctic night is most impressive, where its wonders are unimagined to sport and play with the mind's vain imaginings. The heavens above and the earth beneath reveal only an endless and fathomless quiet. There is no where around me an evidence of life or motion. I stand alone in the midst of the mighty hills. The tall cliffs climb upward, and are lost in the gray vaults of the sky. The dark cliffs standing against their slopes of white, are the steps of a vast amphitheatre.

The mind finding no rest on their bold summits wanders into space. The moon weary with her long vigils, sinks to her repose. The Pleiades no longer breathe their sweet influence. Cassiopea, and Andromeda and Orion, and all the infinite hosts of unnumbered constellations, fall to infuse one spark of joy into this dead atmosphere. They have lost their tenderness, and are cold and pulseless. The eye leaves them and returns to the earth, and the trembling ear awaits something that will break the oppressive silence. But no foothold of living thing reaches it. No wild beast howls through the solitude. There is no cry of birds to enliven the scene; no tree among whose branches the wind can sigh and moan. The pulsations of my own heart are alone heard in the great void; and as the blood courses through the sensitive organization of the ear, I am oppressed as with discordant sounds. Silence has ceased to be negative. It has become endowed with positive attributes. I seem to hear and see and feel it. It stands forth as a frightful spectre, filling the mind with overpowering consciousness of universal death—proclaiming the end of all things and heralding the everlasting future. Its presence is unendurable. I spring from the rock upon which I have been seated, I plant my feet heavily on the snow to banish its awful presence, and the sound rolls through the night and drives away the phantom.

I have seen no expression on the face of nature so filled with terror as the silence of the Arctic night."

**POWER OF SCENT IN HORSES.** A writer in *Tait's Magazine* passes a high encomium on the acuteness of scent possessed by the horse, by which the animal is enabled to make his way over the roughest road during the profoundest darkness of night. In view of this fact he says: "Never check your horse at night, but give him free head, and you may rest assured that he will never get off the road." The "scent" part is all right, but the expedition progress depends upon circumstances. As an instance: An eccentric man residing in the backwoods some miles south of Erie, Pa., left that village, now city, on horseback at about ten o'clock of a very dark night. Getting fairly upon the road, the horse was given his head, and to make the time seem as short as possible, the party thought it would close his eyes and recite the "Bride of Abydos," as a means of whileing away the time, which, with many other pieces, he knew perfectly well. It was his impression that the piece would occupy most of the time to reach home. He closed his eyes accordingly, and commenced aloud the recitation. He felt the motion of the horse for a time, but, warming with his subject, all else was forgotten till the piece was concluded. He then opened his eyes which were not of much use, owing to the profound darkness; nevertheless, by the aid of his horse's other organs, he discovered that the horse had come to a halt by the road side, and was quietly feeding from a cask of hay which lay within reach of a low fence. Instead of his homeward course, it detected the hay as well as the road, and, as appetite preferred the former, the consequence was that a mile had been gained toward home while the "Bride of Abydos" was being expounded on the desert air! In this case a "free head" to the horse was not synonymous with progress, because the scent of the hay was more inviting than that of the road homeward.

In a recent speech before the Chesapeake Union Association, of Brooklyn, Mayor Hoffman, the Democratic candidate for Governor of New York, said:—
