EXPENSES OF THE FREEDMEN'S BUREAU.
General O. O. Howard, Commissioner of the Freedmen's Bureau, in a letter just addressed to Gen. O. Brown, Assistant Comm. of the Bureau for Virginia, states that there has been expended from the appropriations made by Congress for the support of this Bureau since its organization to January 1, \$4,397,864.39. From the amounts received from what has been termed "Refugees" and Freedmen's Fund, which accrued since and before the organization of this Bureau, from the rent of abandoned lands, sales of crops, taxes, and tuition, sale of Confederate State property, and every source whatsoever, to January 1, 1868, \$1,568,034.10. Total expenditure to January 1, 1868, \$5,965,898.49.

Of this amount \$500,000 was set apart for the relief of the then pressing destitution in the Southern States, by act of Congress of March, 1867. Fifty thousand dollars was transferred to the Agricultural Bureau for the purpose of furnishing seed to indigent farmers in the South, "without distinction of color."
All subsistence, medical supplies and quartermaster stores issued to refugees and freedmen prior to July 1, 1866, were not charged to or paid for by this Bureau, but were furnished by the Commissary, Medical and Quartermaster Departments, and accounted for in the current expenses of those several departments, and included in the expenses of the War Department for those years. They amounted to \$2,330,788.72. Since that time all supplies of that kind have been furnished and paid for by this Bureau from the Congressional appropriation, and are included in the expenditures as stated above.

The expenditures from January 1, 1868, to August 1, 1868, were \$2,029,397.39, which makes the total cost of the Bureau from its organization to August 1, 1868, \$7,995,295.88. By an act of Congress passed in July last, the operations of this Bureau are to be withdrawn from all the States on the 1st day of January next.

WHAT IT COSTS TO KEEP A HOTEL.—The New York correspondent of the Cincinnati Gazette writes:

"Speaking of hotels, do you know how extensively the accounts of a first-class establishment foot up in the course of a year? The bills of a first-class hotel for supplies are enough to support a good many small families, especially if they practice economy, and don't keep dogs and horses and Saratoga trunks. For example, I will give you some items from the balance sheet of the Astor House, the oldest first-class hotel in the city. The Astor House pays seventy-five thousand dollars a year for groceries, including \$6,000 for flour and \$22,000 for butter. (Who would suppose that its butter would cost nearly three times as much as its flour? but so they tell me.) The marketing bill is about \$150,000—they pay one man from fifty-five to sixty thousand dollars for beef alone and the rest of the one hundred and fifty goes for mutton, veal, pork, poultry, vegetables, fish, &c. The milk and cream for the Astor costs \$14,000, about two-thirds of it being for milk, and one third for cream. Eggs cost about \$12,000, the average use being one hundred dozen daily, or thirty six thousand annually. The gas bill is \$14,000, and the coal bill pretty much the same; friction matches cost a dollar and a half a day, or about \$500 a year; and good many of these are not used in the house but find their way into the pockets of the patrons. Who would think of paying for wooden toothpicks when anybody can get white ones with little trouble? A million are used every year in the Astor House, and a box of something paper, cut to about the size of common note sheets, costs about twenty hundred dollars, and sometimes a great deal more, according to the patronage the house has received. The bill for liquors for the bar room is a heavy one, but fortunately for the proprietors, the amount received from patrons is a great deal more. With all these figures staring him in the face, a man who can keep a hotel is entitled to all the praise of his fellow citizens, and can be set down in the list of philanthropists and practical benefactors of his race."

HOW OUR ANCESTORS LIVED.—The improvement in social comfort and refinement over past ages is strictly shown in the following paragraph:

Erasmus, who visited England in the early part of the sixteenth century, gives a curious description of an English interior of the better class. The furniture was rough, the walls unplastered, but sometimes wainscoted or hung with tapestry, and the floors covered with rushes, which were not changed for months. The dogs and cats had free access to the eating rooms, and fragments of meat and bones were thrown to them which they devoured among the rushes, leaving what they could not eat to rot there, with the draining of beer vessels and all manner of unmentionable abominations. This was nothing, like refinement or elegance in the luxury of the higher ranks; the indulgences in which their wealth permitted, consisted in rough and wasteful profusion. Salt beef and strong ale constituted the chief part of Queen Elizabeth's breakfast, and similar refreshments were served to her in bed for supper. At a series of entertainments given by the nobility in 1660, where each exhausted his invention to outdo the others, it was universally admitted that Lord Goring won the palm for the magnificence of his fancy. The description of this supper will give you an idea of what was then thought magnificent. It consisted of four huge brassy pigs, piping hot, bitted and harassed, with ropes of sausages to a huge pudding bag, which served for a chariot.
