A WHOLE FAMILY FROZEN TO DEATH.—We have learned the particulars of one of the harrowing among the many cases of suffering by the recent snow storm. The facts are about as follows: "A man named Dowd, with his family, lately took a homestead on the Vermilion River, about four miles north of Vermilion City, D. T. On last Sunday, while the snow storm was at its height, the shanty in which the settler and his family lived was so open as to expose its occupants to the fury of the storm. There being no signs of an abatement of the storm, Mr. Dowd, accompanied by his wife and three children, the latter aged respectively 18, 8, and 4, and started for a neighbor's house, about forty rods distant. Mr. Dowd, with the six year old child in his arms, started in advance, his wife and the two other children following. On the way the father, with one of the children in his arms, got separated from his wife and the other children. After Mr. Dowd reached the house of his neighbor, he looked around, and not seeing his wife and children, immediately gave the alarm. The occupants of the house started out in search of the missing members. Every effort was used to discover the whereabouts of the lost ones, but proved unavailing. The next morning (Monday) the frozen bodies of mother and two children were found about 75 rods from the house. They had lost their way, and the density of the flying snow kept the unfortunate mother and children from being able to find the house.—Sionia City Times.

NITRO GLYCERINE.—It is reported that within one mile of the village of Ridgeway, N. J., there exists a manufactory of nitro-glycerine, wherethousands of tons of the treacherous substance, already ready for use, is awaiting transportation to various parts of the country. A slight concussion in the immediate vicinity of this manufactory of death would explode the whole mass with an effect not less appalling than that of a first class earthquake. It is stated that an open car, laden with 500 gallons of nitro-glycerine in barrels, was driven through this city for shipment to Connecticut. An attempt was made to convey it by another route which was thickly settled, but the inhabitants discovering the character of the load, peremptorily turned it back and compelled the driver to find another avenue of passage, where upon the stuff was carted to this city and through its crowded streets. As nitro-glycerine is liable to explode at any moment, and from an unseen cause, the chances were very much in favor of an appalling disaster. Since the people of Ridgeway, N. J., have learned of the existence of the factory in their neighborhood there is an unusual nervousness manifested, and every report of gun, pistol or firecrackers send a thrill of horrible apprehension throughout the entire community.—N. Y. News.
