**THE BATTLE OF FREDERICKSBURG.**—[From the  
London Telegraph, December 13.]—Upon  
this day, seven years ago, was fought a mighty  
battle, which laid the great Transatlantic Re-  
public prostrate and bleeding in the dust. As,  
on the 13th of December, 1862, the sun set  
behind the low Virginia hills which skirt the  
river Rappahannock and stand like sentinels  
around the little town of Fredericksburg, its  
declining rays glided across a plain upon which  
to quote the words of an eye witness of the  
bloody scene, "lay acres of the Federal dead."  
It was said by many who had participated in  
every great battle which Virginia had previ-  
ously witnessed, that upon no other field had  
the dead lain so thick and close. I am directed  
in front of Mary's heights, against which the  
fierce onslaughts of General Meagher and his  
gallant Irishmen, were directed, there lay, cold  
and still, some fifteen hundred corpses. With-  
out sustaining any material loss, the Confed-  
erates inflicted upon the attacking Federals at  
Fredericksburg the most crushing defeat of the  
American war. At no other moment, during  
those four fatal years of fratricidal strife, was  
the confidence of the Confederates, or the de-  
pression of the Federals, so great as at the close  
of 1862. To this hour, in the "eye-brook"  
of Alabama, or in the "ever glades" of Florida  
may be found rebel privateers who fought at Fred-  
ericksburg, and who will bitterly tell you that  
if "Uncle Robert" for this is General Lee  
still affectionately styled by the soldiers whom  
he led—had followed Stonewall Jackson's ad-  
vice, and consented to a night attack upon the  
Federals, he would literally have annihilated  
their army. Never was the demoralization of any  
Northern host during the American war so ab-  
solute as upon the night which followed the battle  
of Fredericksburg. It will be remembered that  
a few weeks before that battle, General Mc-  
Clellan, who had gained at Sharpsburg the  
principal victory won by the Federals in 1862,  
was deprived of his command, and ordered by  
the Washington Government to trust his  
army to the incompetent hands of General  
Burnside. Whatever may have been General  
McClellan's title to the affection of his soldiers,  
he was always a favorite with the Federal  
armies. His successor, on the contrary, in-  
spired no confidence, and weakened an enor-  
mous force. Stronger positions have before now  
been carried by attacking armies than that  
which General Lee and the Confederates occu-  
ped at Fredericksburg. In 1812 Napoleon  
boldly threw his forces across the Spree, and  
launched them against the allied armies of  
Russia and Prussia, as they lay, strongly en-  
trenched behind the river, at Bautzen. Riving  
forward at the head of his troops, and cheer-  
ing them onward with his oft-repeated cry  
of "Ehavaud, nos couleurs!" the little  
Corporal taught General Burnside how armies  
occupying a strong defensive position might  
be attacked and routed. But, even before the  
battle of Fredericksburg was fought, it was  
sufficiently apparent that Burnside was no  
Napoleon, and that the Federal armies which  
battled in 1862 had little of the dash or fire of  
the men who fought at Lutzen or Bautzen.
