THE INDIANS.—The Friends appointed by the President as Indian Agents have made their reports, and aside from the accounts given of their work, done with a view of bettering the condition of their proteges, the reports contain some interesting facts and incidents which throw light upon the habits, character and superstitions of the "Noble Savage." His mistrust of white men is thus illustrated by an incident: "An Indian chief brought a young Indian; we are told, before a white commissioner to give evidence, and the commissioner hesitated a little in receiving part of the testimony, when the chief spoke up with great emphasis: "Oh, you may believe what he says; he tells the truth; he has never seen a white man before!" Bishop Whipple relates an anecdote of one of their great braves which shows their indifference to death. One of them who had been concerned in the Minnesota massacre, on being visited in prison and told that his hope of pardon was vain, said: "Well, I don't care, I am not afraid to die; when I go to the spirit world, I will go to the Great Spirit, and look Him right in the face, and tell Him of the multiplied wrongs and cruelties inflicted on His red children by the white man, and He won't scold me much." When the eclipse in August took place, they were very anxious about its occurring when informed that it would disappear in the evening, but as it began to grow dark they ran to their lodges, brought out their guns and commenced firing at the sun, to kill the monster they declared was eating the sun. After the eclipse they attributed the sun's shining again to their having killed the monster, although they still thought the sun was "sick." Indians regard it as unnatural that the whole family should be hungry at once. They never set a table, but each one, when hungry, helps himself. And some little time ago, it seems, a child died, and they buried its grandfather alive, with the child in his arms, at the grandfather's request, in order that he might take care of it in the spirit land. [These facts were given by Berj. Hollowell in his recent lecture.]

THE DRAGON FLY.—But just now, on swift wing, they fly past us troops of most beautiful insects. The elegance of their shape and the gracefulness of their movements excite our admiration. If we superstitious I would call them the spirits of beauty who had chosen to display their rich dress in sportive gambols in this lovely spot.
Now I recognize them, and feel as I think and speak of the uncounted, reproachful name by which they are generally known—the "Dragon Fly." This name is given them on account of its long and slender body, by rude observers who had no eye for symmetry of form or for the rainbow colors reflected from its clear and graceful wing. For the same reason, fishermen call it the "Flying Adder." In England, from an erroneous belief that it stings horses, it is called "Horse stinger." The French, attracted by the beauty and grace they see in its form and movements, compare it to a young lady of rank clad in her robes of richest silk, and call it "Demoiselle." The naturalist, more truthful to fact, as if to embrace in its name its tastes and habits, calls it "Dragon Fly." One of the most remarkable features in the Dragon Fly is its eyes. They stand out on both sides of the head prominently, and are in some species bright emerald green, in others brown, or dark blue. Each eye is composed of twelve thousand distinct lenses, so that the insect has twenty-four thousand eyes, and it is no wonder they are so prominent and give to the head such a remarkable appearance? I can never look upon the wonderful workmanship displayed in the construction of this organ, without being filled with admiration of the skill and wisdom of the Divine Architect. Each one of these single eyes is a perfect organ, having all the parts necessary to correct vision. Here are the cornea, lens, humors and retina. And they are so set together that they make the most accurate and beautiful mosaic, such as no skill of man can imitate.

A WONDERFUL PLANT.—The Victoria Regina in the Botanic Garden at Ghent, has thriven to an unprecedented degree during the past summer. Several leaves have attained a diameter of nine feet, and have supported a weight of two hundred and fifty pounds, and one even the enormous weight of five hundred pounds. Seven of the leaves completely cover the basin of 164 feet square. Every four or five days a fresh flower appeared, which lasted only two days, or rather two nights, opening in the morning of a perfectly white color, diffusing about five or six p. m., a very powerful odor of vanilla, closing the next morning at eight or nine a. m., opening the same day towards evening, this time of a beautiful carmine, and finally closing the next morning. The magnificent leaves last through summer, the plant begins to dwindle in October, and dies towards December. About this time the seeds, which have been obtained by artificial fecundation, arrive at maturity. They are sown in January, and appear above the ground in about six weeks. Their infancy is very critical; but once past this period, the young plants grow with astonishing rapidity. The plant in the Ghent Botanic Gardens, unquestionably the finest that has ever been cultivated, arrived at its development in five months.
