BUSINESS.—The rapidly with which North-ena freight is pouring into the South is positively marvelous. From the mouth of the Potomac to the western verge of Missouri, every longitudinal thoroughfare is literally choked with freight crossing the long border from North to South. Every railroad leading southward is taxed to its utmost capacity to carry the immense tonnage that is required to be shipped to the Southern States, while "freight blockades" at various important points of con-vergence, such as Raleigh, Chattanooga and Nashville, show that some of these roads are taxed beyond their capacity. But this is not all. The telegraph reports that the coasting trade from New York to Charleston and other Southern ports, feels the same general impulse, and is kindled into new activity by the pres-ure of Southern bound freight. On the other hand, the Mississippi is carrying down its bosom a mass of products greater than at any time since the war. The steamboat business there is remarkably good; and most significant of all, such is the freight pressure from the southward, that rate from that point to New Orleans are as high as from Pittsburgh to New Orleans.

A ROYAL SCANDAL.—Rumors of two or three domestic and social storms in the atmosphere of the British peerage have already reached our readers. One of the most interest-ing cases was that of a suit for divorce between Sir Charles and Lady Mordaunt, the latter being charged with conduct unbecoming a countess of aristocracy, or any other woman. A special despatch from London per cable, dated 18th instant, brings news of the further progress of the suit. Lady Mordaunt has, it seems, made full confession of her frailty, and implicates the Prince of Wales, Viscount Cole, and Sir Frederick Johnson. The Queen is said to be much disturbed by these revelations.
