A DYING WIFE TO HER HUSBAND.—The following beautiful and touching extracts are taken from a letter written by a dying wife to her husband, which was found by him, some months after her death, between the leaves of a religious volume, which she was very fond of perusing. The letter, which was literally dim with tear marks, was written long before the husband was aware that the grasp of a fatal disease had fastened upon the lovely form of his devoted wife, who died, it is stated, at the early age of nineteen. It shows how faithful is the depth of a true woman's affections:—

"When this shall reach your eye, dear G, some day when you are turning over the leaves of the past, I shall have passed away forever, and the cold, white stone be keeping its lonely watch over the lips you have so often pressed, and the sod will be growing that shall hide forever from your sight the dust of one who has so often nestled close to your warm heart. For many long and sleepless nights, when all my thoughts were at rest, I have wrestled with the consciousness of approaching death, until at last it has forced itself upon my mind; and although to you and to others it might seem but the narrow imagination of a girl, yet dear G, it is not so. Many weary, weary hours have I passed in the endeavor to reconcile myself to leaving you, whom I love so well, and this bright world of sunshine and beauty; and hard indeed it is to struggle so silently alone, with the sure conviction that I am about to leave you forever and go down alone in the dark valley! But I know in whom I have trusted, and leaning upon His arm, I fear no evil. Don't blame me for keeping all this even from you. How could I subject you, of all others, to such sorrows as I feel at parting, when time will soon make it appear to you I could have wished to live, if only to be at your side when your time shall come, and pillow your head upon my breast, wipe the death damps from your brow, and usher your departing spirit into the Maker's presence, embalmed in woman's holiest prayer. But it is not to be so—and I submit.

Yours is the privilege of watching through long and dreary nights for the spirit's final flight, and transferring my sinking head from your breast to the Savior's bosom! And you shall share my last thought; the last faint pressure of this hand, and the last feeble kiss shall be yours; and even when flesh and heart shall have failed me my eye shall rest on yours until glazed by death—and our spirits shall hold one last communion, until gently fading from my view—the last of earth—you shall mingle with the first bright glimpses of the unfolding glories of that better world, where partings are unknown. Well do I know the spot, dear G, where you will lay me; often have we stood by the place, and, as we watched the mellow sunset as it glanced in quivering flashes through the leaves and brightened the grassy meadows around us with stripes of burnished gold, each has thought of our future home, some alone; and, whichever it might be, your name would be on the stone. But you loved the spot; and I know you'll love me none the less when you see the same quiet sunlight linger and play among the grass that covers your Mary's grave. I know you will go often alone, when I am laid there, and my spirit will be with you then, and whisper among the waving branches: "I am not lost, but gone before."

Only let us believe this—let a calm faith recognize the gracious providence which shapes all our ways, and we can then endure until the dawn shall bring light and joy.
