

LOCAL NEWS.

CITY SERGEANT.—The following bill in relation to a Sergeant for this city has passed both branches of the General Assembly, and as soon as it receives the signature of the Governor (of which we are informed there is no doubt) will become a law.

AN ACT concerning the City Sergeant of Alexandria. Be it enacted, etc., That the Judge of the City Court of the city of Alexandria, be, and he is hereby authorized and empowered, to appoint a Sergeant of the city of Alexandria, who shall, until his successor be regularly elected, and shall have qualified, be vested with all the powers, and discharge all the duties of the Sergeants of other cities of the Commonwealth, as prescribed by the 3rd section of chapter 49 of the Code of 1860.

2. That the jail in the said city of Alexandria may be used, in common, as the jail of the city and county; and that the Sergeant of Alexandria city discharge the duties of the jailor of both city and county of Alexandria.

3. That the said Sergeant shall receive the same fees as are allowed by law to the sheriffs of counties for similar services, and, in addition thereto, such compensation for attendance upon the city court of Alexandria as the judge of said court may allow him. Provided, such additional compensation shall not exceed six hundred dollars per annum, and shall be payable quarterly out of the city treasury.

4. That the Judge of the said city of Alexandria shall take to the Sergeant appointed under the first section of this act, a bond in a penalty of not less than twenty thousand dollars, and not more than sixty thousand dollars, conditioned for the faithful performance of the duties of his office.

5. This act shall be in force from its passage.

JUSTICES OF THE PEACE AND CONSTABLES.—To the State Senate, yesterday, Mr. Snowden introduced the following bill, which under a suspension of the rules, was passed and sent to the House of Delegates where its passage will be pressed, and in all probability it will become a law in a few days.

AN ACT providing for the election of Justices of the Peace and Constables in the city of Alexandria. Sec. 1. Be it enacted, etc., That at the election to be held in the city of Alexandria, on the fourth Thursday in May 1870, there shall be elected by the qualified voters, in each ward of said city, three justices of the peace for every ward, respectively, whose term of office shall be one, two, and three years, respectively, to be determined by lot in the presence of the judge of the corporation court of said city, and whose powers, duties, and compensation shall be the same as those of justices of the peace for the counties of the Commonwealth. Provided, that at every subsequent annual election there shall be elected but one such justice.

2. There shall be elected at the same time, until otherwise provided, one constable in each ward, by the qualified voters thereof, who shall have all the powers and emoluments of county constables, shall hold their office for two years, and shall give bond in like manner as county constables.

3. This act shall be in force from its passage.

TELEGRAPH NEWS.

(SPECIAL DISPATCHES TO THE GAZETTE.) FROM WASHINGTON.

WASHINGTON, May 19—3 p. m. CONGRESS.

In the Senate Mr. Pomeroy introduced the following resolution: Resolved, That the President be requested, in his judgment not inconsistent with the public service, to open negotiations with a view to the withdrawal of Great Britain from the North American provinces with the United States can be accomplished upon terms equally honorable to the government of Great Britain, the British North American provinces and the United States—referred to the Committee on Foreign Relations.

The Senate then took up the bill to enforce the 15th amendment, and Mr. Hamilton, of Md., spoke at length in opposition.

In the House of Representatives Mr. Conner, of Texas, introduced a resolution looking to using military force to prevent American outlaws and Indians seeking refuge in Mexico—referred to Committee on Military Affairs.

The report of the committee on the decline of American commerce was then taken up.

MISCELLANEOUS. Seventeen radical representatives and Senator Harris attended the wedding of Downing's daughter. The entire absence of a black element was remarked. The prevailing tint of the occasion was light yellow.

From London. LONDON, May 19.—The Times this morning has a remarkably bitter editorial article on the alleged mismanagement of Erie Railway affairs and the course pursued in relation to shares in the stock market. The writer asserts that the standard of commercial morality is lower in the city of New York than anywhere else in the world. What here, in England, would be deemed crimes, are there regarded masterpieces of financing. It concerns the American people to purge themselves of this reproach, though it will be a task equal in difficulty to the abolition of slavery.

The Times also has an article on the yacht race. It says there is no schooner in England, probably, that can sail with the American schooner Sappho, which throughout the match was handled by an English Captain, and a crew under his personal direction.
