TERRIBLE CATASTROPHE.—A terrible and
extraordinary catastrophe occurred on the 24th
April, on the Concho river, in Texas. Col.
Merriam, of the Twenty-fourth Infantry, was
travelling from El Paso to the Texas coast.
They camped for the night at the head of the
Concho, which is formed by the junction of the
rills of water from several large springs,
which have been dammed into ponds by the
wild bear.

The stream at this point is so small that a
man can step across it anywhere. The banks
were ten feet above the bed of the water.
Early in the evening Col. Merriam was roused
by the signs of an approaching storm. The
tent was fastened and made secure as possible,
and about 9 o'clock a hail storm burst upon
them, accompanied by some rain and a strong
wind. The fall of hail was unprecedented,
lasting until nearly 11, the stones being of the
size of hen eggs, and striking the tent and
prairie with a noise like near and incessant
musketry.

The Colonel, who was not ignorant of the
sudden and extreme overflows to which the
mountain streams of Texas are liable, went out
into the darkness, as soon as the storm had
ceased, to note what effect had been produced
on this rivulet. To his amazement, he found
in the formerly almost dry bed of the creek, a
resistless torrent loaded and filled with hail,
rolling nearly bankfull, white as milk, and silent
as a river of oil!

He at once saw the danger, and ran back to
the tent, shouting to his escort and servants to
turn out. He placed Mrs. M., the child and
nurse in the carriage, and with the aid of three
men started to run with it to the higher ground
a distance of not more than sixty yards. Scarce-
ly a minute had elapsed from the time the
alarm had been given, but already the water
had surged over the bank in waves of such
volume and force as to sweep the party from
their feet before they had traversed thirty
yards.

The Colonel called for assistance on some
cavalry soldiers who had just escaped from the
United States mail station near by, but they
were too terrified to heed or to help.

Colonel Merriam then abandoned the hope
of saving his family in the carriage, and tried
to enter it in order to swim out with them, but
he was swept down the ice-cold torrent like a
bubble. Being an expert swimmer, he suc-
ceeded in reaching the bank about two hun-
dred yards below, and ran back to renew the
effort, when he found after he was swept down,
that the moment after he was swept down, had
turned over and gone rolling down the flood,
his wife saying, as she disappeared, "My dar-
ling husband, good-bye." The little rill of a
few hours before, which a child might step
across, had become a raging river, covered
with masses of drift wood, of great width, and
from thirty to forty feet deep.

The bereaved husband procured a horse from
one of the cavalry, and rode far down the tor-
rent, but could see nothing in the darkness,
and heard naught but the wild sounds of the
waves. So passed the long and wretched night.
Before day the strange and momentary flood
had passed by, and the small stream struck to
its usual size and ran in its wonted bed. The
sad search began. The drowned soldiers and
servants, four in number, were found, and the
body of the wife taken from the water about
three-fourths of a mile below.

Not till three days after was the body of the
child found, four miles down the stream, and
a long distance from its bed.
The carriage was drifted by the current
about a mile, and lodged in a thicket. The
storm and flood are represented as frightful
beyond description.

A GOOD STORY is told of John W. Crockett
and Jim Gibson, both of them able lawyers,
and in full practice in the early days of Jack-
son in Hickman county Ky. On one occasion they
were employed on opposite sides in an ejectment
case before a magistrate. Crockett was
reading the law to the court, and when he got
through Gibson asked for his book, saying that
the statute just read was new to him. Crockett
refused to give it to him on the ground that
it was his own private property, and if Mr.
Gibson wanted the benefit of law books there
were some for sale. The court ruled that the
book was private property, and that Gibson
had no right to see it, except with Crockett's
consent. Gibson was puzzled, but being a man
of resource he fell upon a plan which completely
upset Crockett's calculations. He stepped
back and found under a desk an old copy of
Nash's Webster's spelling book, and in addressing
the court he read from the speller:—"Bet it
enacted by the General Assembly of the Com-
monwealth of Kentucky, that all laws hereto-
fore passed (here fitting Crockett's law) be,
and the same are hereby repealed." Crockett
sprang to his feet with, "Let me see that
book." "No you don't," said Gibson, "this
book, sir, is private property, and I'm not
in the habit of packing law books round for
the benefit of others." It is needless to say
Crockett lost his case, Gibson having the last
say on him.

LAND SLIDE AT MEMPHIS.—The Memphis
Avalanche, of the 2d instant, says:—"Nearly
an acre of our landing, at the foot of Poplar
street, plunged into the river yesterday. For
some time this portion of our landing has been
yielding to the solicitation of the Father of
Waters. The sudden slide yesterday lashed
the old Mississippi into a terrible race. The
waves swamped four barges and endangered
all those below the scene of the accident.
Several boats immediately below were forced
from their moorings as the mighty waves
passed on across the river.
