SUDDEN DEATH.

In announcing the decease of Dickens, the
Rev. Henry Ward Beecher seized the occasion
to give his views upon sudden death. They
are quite as peculiar as his notions upon one
of the Commandments. As to that, he held
that a man on his side in politics, a "loyal"
man, as he phrased it, was entitled to wide
indulgence from a "loyal" clergyman, which
Mr. Beecher showed by solemnizing an adulterous
marriage at the death-bed of an unrepentant
sinner! Truly, a sudden death were for
less or worse than one that left time only for
such ministrations! His late remarks, about
Dickens, as we find them reported, were as
follows:

"He has passed off the stage as one, I think,
might wish to die. One moment in the full
enjoyment of his faculties, and in the next
moment gone. I still cling to that heresy
against the Episcopal prayer-book—"Deliver
me from sudden death." I should never pray
that God would keep me from sudden death.
I do not want to be like an old harness tied
up with strings and always breaking, and
always up for repairs, and always good for nothing.
He has gone at the full of life. Every
year must have let down the tone of his mind
and his work. He has died at the right time
for himself and died at the right time for the
world."

Now, here, Mr. Beecher, whose rhetoric is
always better than his logic, begins by confounding
two different things—an early death and a
sudden death. We have often heard people
speak of their vigor and usefulness; though,
being the judge, we doubt if the limit of their
lives would ever be reached. But whether a
man die in youth or old age, the manner of his
death may or may not be sudden. Few men,
we venture to say, do sincerely desire to die
suddenly. The language of the Episcopal
service to which Mr. Beecher alludes, "from
sudden death—good Lord deliver us!" is taken
from very ancient liturgies, and is the expression
of a natural and general feeling. Duty
may constrain a man to expose his life; and
death, in fact, is not wholly unexpected where
the possibility of it has been strongly present
to the mind. But, surely, few men would
hope or pray to receive the sudden stroke of
death at the festive board! It is an aggravation
of his horrors, as Shakespeare paints
them:

"He took my father grossly, full of bread;
With all his senses full blown, as flash as May;
And how his audit stands, who knows save
heaven."

Mr. Beecher may see the force of this, since
it comes from a play book instead of a prayer
book. Should he have leisure to look into
the Bible, he will find throughout the Psalms
and the Prophecies that to be cut off suddenly
is a fate deprecated by the righteous as frequently
as it is denounced against the wicked.
For instance, "Oh God, take me not away in
the midst of my days." Verse 24. We are particu-
lar in citing scripture for Mr. Beecher's
information for we remember that he preached
a sermon in New York upon the re-occupation
of Fort Sumpter, in which he spoke, with
some elaboration, of Good Friday as the day
of the resurrection! The most extraordinary
blunder, perhaps, ever made in the pulpit.
It is, indeed, to be regretted—as he is a
preacher—that his engagements, literary and
political, have withdrawn him so much from
Scriptural studies. But apart from religious
considerations few men really hold Mr. Beecher's
opinions upon sudden death. Few are
ready for death, even in their temporal
concerns. Few would willingly forego the
last words of affection, perhaps of reconciliation,
with kindred and friends. We think the Rev.
Mr. Beecher has "improved the occasion,"
as he too often does, to utter a startling
phylisry in opposition to wiser doctrine. It is
this frequent resort to clap-trap that has made
Mr. Beecher a charlatan in religion and
morals, as his efforts at momentary effect
often make him but a buffoon in the pulpit.
Quoted by this last utterance, his own
faculties might seem to be scudding to him the
signal for retreat. But, in his own case, this
signal probably, not the self-conceit in
which he is muffled; though he pronounces
ex cathedra that it would have been a
bad thing for Dickens' fame for him to have
lived any longer.—Phil. Age.

MISCELLANEOUS.—The Treasury authorities
do not imagine that the preparators of the
recent bold robbery from the office of Treasurer
Spinner will be captured; the robbery was too
well planned and too successfully carried out.
Technically the loss falls upon Gen. Spinner,
in whose custody the money according to the
strict construction of law, was, at the time the
robbery was made, and as the Department has
no authority to cover such losses, it will require
the passage of a resolution by Congress to
relieve the treasurer from this loss. There is no
doubt that this will be done.

The Vermont Constitutional Convention, by
a close vote, has adopted the policy of biennial
sessions of the Legislature. This rule is general
in the Western States and on the Pacific
coast, and has also been incorporated into the
constitutions of a number of the reconstructed
Southern commonwealths.

Lieut. Col. Leo Lloyd, of Liberia, addressed
the board of trade in Philadelphia on Monday
night, and informed his audience that on
hearing the news of the passage of the fifteen
amendment in this country, the Liberian legis-
lators at once resolved to expunge an article in
the constitution of their republic which allowed
the right of suffrage only to citizens of African
descent.

The bill to reduce the army has been signed
by the President, and is now a law. After
July 1st, 1870, under this act, the standing
army will contain no more than 30,000 men.
Army officers cannot enter civil office or remain
in it without resigning their military commis-
sions.
