LETTERS FROM RICHMOND.

Correspondence of the Alexandria Gazette. RICHMOND, June 14.—The Senate having disposed of the business before it and awaiting the action of the House on the important measures now occupying the attention of that body...

Resolved, That when the Senate adjourns on Friday next it will adjourn until Tuesday next. Should any measure of importance be ready by Friday it is likely the above resolution will be rescinded...

The Senate bill to incorporate the Danville and Salem railroad company, with the amendments proposed by the House, was passed. The following bills were reported: to amend an act entitled "an act to prescribe and define the jurisdiction of the county and corporation courts, and the times and places of holding the same"...

A bill was introduced to amend the act incorporating the Potomac rail road company authorizing the company to make connection with the Fredericksburg road at some point between Fredericksburg and Aquia Creek...

The following bills were passed: to incorporate the Hanover Junction and West Point railroad company, with the amendments; to amend an act to amend and re-enact section 13 of chapter 141, relative to binding persons jointly by judgment, bond, note or otherwise...

The bill authorizing the construction of a rail road from Hanover Junction to West Point at the head of York River, thus continuing the Chesapeake and Ohio road to navigable water; to provide for the removal of causes, judgments and papers from the court of hustings of Harrisonburg to the county court of Rockingham; continuing the payment of interest and dividends to the incorporated colleges, and other seminaries of learning in this State...

The Senate bill vesting the power of filling vacancies in township and county offices, in the judges of county or corporation courts, was passed with an amendment providing that writs of election of the county or corporation by the judges of the county or corporation in which such vacancies occur, so that the same may be filled at the next election after such vacancy occurs...

In the House of Delegates, the bill concerning the pay of the Attorney General, was discussed and \$2,000 per annum as agreed upon by the Senate fixed as the salary, but for want of a constitutional majority the bill failed to pass...

Mayor Elyson has been summoned by telegraph to Washington, with several witnesses to testify in the Woods case. The bill to incorporate the Farmers' and Mechanics' Savings Bank of Alexandria has passed both branches of the Legislature...

A bigamy case is reported here—Richmond. The report that the friends of Major Sutherland had in view the exaltation of that gentleman to the gubernatorial chair is incorrect; the Major is spoken of by the U. S. Senate, as successor to Judge Johnston and not for Governor, and as a Senator is to be elected at the next session of the General Assembly, candidates are already being taken out...

RICHMOND, June 15.—In the Senate, today, among the bills passed was one to incorporate the Potomac and Manassas railroad company. It is proposed by the bill, (which having been amended so as to require the beginning of the work within two and its completion within six years, acts back to the House) to construct a rail road from Manassas Junction to West Point, passing north on the projected Alexandria and Fredericksburg road. This road is in time, it is said, to be connected with a road to be constructed from Manassas to Berlin, and to be united with a Pennsylvania road that is to supply Virginia with anthracite coal, &c.

The Governor having signified his objections to the bill amending the code in reference to granting injunctions, the bill has been requested to be returned in order that the objections may be removed. The House of Delegates has also been requested to return to the Senate the joint resolution providing for a recess of the General Assembly, in view of a bill which will probably pass Congress, reappropriating representation and which will make it necessary for the Legislature to be in session on 1st October...

The following bills were advanced to a third reading: in relation to binding persons jointly by bond and otherwise; amending the act prescribing and defining the jurisdiction of county and corporation courts, &c., authorizing judges of corporation courts in cases when they cannot sit, to exchange with other corporation judges, but not with county judges; authorizing the auditor to sell the State's land scrip; for the relief of the Merchants' bank of Lynchburg; in relation to the payment of money and delivery of property in the hands of fiduciaries...

Among the bills passed were the following: Senate bill amending certain sections of the general election law; Senate bill authorizing councils of cities to appoint harbor and dock masters; Senate bill providing for an election in towns of less than 500 inhabitants. The Court of Appeals bill as amended by the House was referred. A report declaring it inexpedient to legislate upon a resolution requiring sheriffs when their terms of office expire to settle all fiduciary accounts was concurred in. House bill extending the time for repair of the rebuilding of mills destroyed during the late war, with the disagreement of the House to the amendment of the Senate was taken up and the Senate receded from its amendment and the bill passed. The bill to establish an insurance bureau was made the order for to-morrow.

In the House of Delegates among the bills relative to the calendar were the following: relative to removal of causes in courts of Rockingham county; relative to the appointment of penalties for hunting certain game; incorporating the Rockingham Home Mutual Fire Insurance company; incorporating the Lynchburg Banking Insurance company. The Senate bill providing where the Court of Appeals shall sit, &c., was taken up and the motion to insert Lynchburg having failed, the bill being otherwise variously amended was passed. The Governor sent in a claim of Randolph Rogers for storage and insurance for certain statues and allegorical figures, made by him for the Washington monument. The tax bill again failed to pass for want of a constitutional majority. The license bill was considered till adjournment.

Capt. W. L. Maul, deputy grand master A. F. M. died here this morning. Dr. Daniel Connor of Winchester has been appointed physician to the Central Lunatic Asylum at Howard's Grove near this city. The salary is \$3,000 per annum. The many friends of the Doctor will be glad to hear of his appointment.

J. M. Lowell has been appointed by the Governor inspector of flour for Richmond. The "harvest dinner" at the "Cloverdale" farm of Maj. W. T. Southerlin, in Halifax county, yesterday, surpassed anything of the kind that has taken place in Virginia within the memory of any of the present generation. An old English custom, it is doubtful whether our ancestors in their palmy days witnessed a sight equal to that presented at Cloverdale.

ALEXANDRIA MARKET, June 16.—The market for Flour is active. Wheat is unchanged; offerings of 558 bushels red, with sales at 137, 143 and 145. Corn is very active; offerings of 544 bushels, with sales of mixed red and white at 112, 113 and 114; a lot of inferior "blue-eyed" sold at 108. Rye is steady, with light offerings; sales at 111.
