The Will of Charles Dickens.

The will of Charles Dickens is published in full in the London papers. A provision of the interest on eight thousand pounds for life is made for Mrs. Dickens. To Miss Hogarth he gives eight thousand pounds and all his personal jewelry, except his watch, ("the gold ring presented to me at Coronary," which with "the chains and seals and all appendages," he bequeaths to John Forster, who is also the legatee of such of the manuscripts of his published works as remained in his possession at the time of his death. To his eldest son, Charles, he bequeaths his library of printed books and all his engraving and prints. For the other legacies, "Miss Ellen Lawless Ternan, late of Houghton Place, Amptill Square, in the county of Middlesex," receives one thousand pounds, and all the servants who have been in the family for one year have nineteen guineas each. In a codicil, the property in "All the Year Round" is given to "Charles Dickens, the younger," a designation of his son which would seem to imply that he desired this gentleman to assume such a title, rather than "Charles Dickens, Jr.," in like manner with the younger Coleman. After having fully expressed his intentions in legal technicalities, Mr. Dickens concludes his last will and testament as follows:

"And lastly, as I have now set down the term of words which my legal advisers assure me are necessary to the plain objects of this my will, I solemnly enjoin my dear children always to remember how much they owe to the said Georgiana Hogarth, and never to be wanting in a grateful and affectionate attachment to her, for they know well that she has been through all the stages of their growth and progress their ever useful, self denying and devoted friend. And I desire here simply to record the fact that my wife, since our separation by consent, has been in the receipt from me of an annual income of six hundred pounds, while all the great charges of a numerous and expensive family have devolved wholly upon myself. I emphatically disclaim and strictly private manner, that any public announcement be made of the time or place of my burial; that at the utmost not more than three plain mourning coaches be employed, and that those who attend my funeral wear no scarf, cloak, black hat, long hatband, or other such revolting absurdity. I direct that my name be inscribed in plain English letters on my tomb without the addition of "Mr." or "Esquire." I enjoin my friends on no account to make me the subject of any monument, memorial, or testimonial whatever. I rest my claims to the remembrance of my country upon my published works, and to the remembrance of my friends upon their experience of me; in addition thereto I commit my soul to the mercy of God through our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ, and I exhort my dear children humbly to try to guide themselves by the teaching of the New Testament in its broad spirit, and to put no faith in any man's narrow construction of its letter here or there. In witness whereof I, the said Charles Dickens, the testator, have to this my last will and testament set my hand this twelfth day of May, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixty nine.

SOCIAL SCANDAL IN NEW YORK.—A letter from New York says:—The prudent prudes of first-class society are averse for the beginning of the suit for divorce soon to be commenced by the daughter of Colonel Lasalle, of the Courier des Etats Unis. It is expected to interest and gratify scandal-baiting testes beyond any similar case tried in New York for many years. The plaintiff is still young and almost as captivating as at the time of marriage, a few years ago, when she was one of the belles of Gotham. The ground of divorce—marital inconstancy. The offense began, it is said, shortly after the wedding, and was continued recklessly and in a promiscuous sort of way. Before her marriage the plaintiff was one of the most popular and beautiful young ladies in New York society. Her husband is a naval officer, and their wedding was one of the chief fashionable events of the day. The suit for divorce will be commenced in a few weeks, and the social standing of the plaintiff promises to give it an interest that is not often attained by cases of this class.

A NEW SWINDLE.—An old man, of very respectable appearance, has of late been swindling the storekeepers of this city in a novel manner. It is his custom to ask to be accommodated with a \$5 bill for that amount in currency, as he wishes a bill to send in a letter to his son, who is at school in the country. He has the letter already directed, and a stamp on it. In counting the currency it is usually short ten cents. The old man is very sorry, but as he passes the store almost every day will hand it in, which he never does, and thus makes ten, fifteen, or twenty five cents, as the case may be, out of each storekeeper who may be generous enough to give him the \$5 bill.—N. A foolish fellow, named Thorne, alias Comstock, jumped from the roof of an elevator into Buffalo creek, New York, on Wednesday, a distance of 135 feet. When about two-thirds of the distance down he lost his balance and fell on his side causing serious injuries. He was taken into the elevator and medical aid rendered.
