**A BEE STORY.**—We have the following particulars of an incident which happened in Prince George during the early part of the week at the house of Mr. Thomas H. Daniel: He was visited in the morning by Mr. Peter Birchett, who had barely tied his horse to the rack when the animal was attacked by swarms of bees, issuing from Mr. Daniel's hives, five in number. His whole body was covered in a few minutes. The bridle reins being very strong, it was some time before he could break loose; and when he did he ran into the fields, and when his owner found him he was still literally covered with bees, from every one of which he probably received a sting. Mr. Birchett had to take him to a swamp to get the bees off by washing. He then bathed him in salt and water, but in the course of a few hours death came to his relief. He was a fine animal and worth \$150. Shortly after Mr. Birchett's horse ran off, Mrs. Sallie Birchett drove up to the house in her carriage. Her horses also were badly stung, which caused them to run off likewise and to break the carriage. A pair of mules hitched to a wagon were also assailed. In the meantime the whole premises were swarming with bees. Mr. Daniel thought the contents of all the five hives were emptied on the occasion. We are assured that this is a veritable bee story.—*Richmond Whig.*

**SEX POPULATIONS.**—In eight states of the Union, according to the census of 1860, the female population was in excess of the male. These states were New York, New Jersey, Maryland, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, North Carolina, Connecticut and Rhode Island. Of these states, Rhode Island showed the greatest proportional excess in female population, it containing 88,355 females to 82,294 males. This result is probably due to the great number of foreign born female operatives who have found steady employment in the Rhode Island factories. What is worth noting, perhaps, is that in the Atlantic states, where the population is about equally divided, or where the females are in a slight preponderance, woman's suffrage gets the cold shoulder; but in the inland states, like Kansas, Wyoming and Nevada, where the males are in great numerical majority, not only is woman's suffrage either conceded or on the point of being conceded, but women already fill a good share of the public offices of honor and profit.—*Philadelphia Record.*

**A PERILOUS RUN.**—A railroad train coming from Toledo to Dayton, last week, accomplished a desperate feat safely. When near Ann's station two immense stacks of wood on each side of the road were discovered to be on fire, the flames shooting high up in the air and lapping each other across the track. None of the passengers were aware of the danger ahead. The train moved at fearful speed, and the passengers wondered at the rapidity at which they were going. But the situation was soon made plain. For an instant, as the train passed through the roaring flames, the heat was so intense, the flames licking the sides of the cars and lapping over the train. The fright at this daring feat occasioned among the passengers lasted but a moment, and joy was seen depicted on every face when the danger was passed. The train slackened up its speed then and arrived safely at Dayton.

**CHRISTINE NILSSON.**—The verdict of the public which has extended to every concert a most cordial and hearty welcome to this sweet singer, is unanimously in her favor. The high praise with which her coming was heralded was scarcely judicious. It was not wise to say that she is better than Jenny Lind and superior to any artist who had ever visited these shores. She has not such a voice as Jenny Lind's, but she has one of marvelous sweetness and flexibility, and a pathos which is exceptional. There is a depth of feeling in her execution which awakes at once a like sympathy in her hearers. The artist is lost in the earnest woman, who pours out from a full heart her sentiments in song. Her manner is easy, graceful and pleasing—witnessing some people call it—which puts her at once in rapport with her audience.—*N. Y. Star.*

**PRIZE FOR THE "BEST BABY."**—We make the following extract from the proceedings of the Executive Committee of the East Tennessee Agricultural Society, as reported in the Knoxville Press of Thursday:

**FRIGHTFUL DEATH.**—Mrs. Margaret Swift, widow of the late James Swift, of Albany, N. Y., who was sent to the Utica lunatic asylum a short time ago, met with a terrible death on Thursday. She managed to procure some matches and when confined to her room, died, and after retiring, deliberately set fire to the bedding. Smoke being discovered in the hall by the matron she hastily opened the door, and was horror-struck at the sight that met her gaze. Mrs. Swift lay literally roasted in the flames she had kindled. The fire was extinguished and every attention paid to the unfortunate woman, without avail, as she died shortly after, in the full possession of her senses.

**REMARKABLE.**—The Dorchester county (Md.) News publishes a story of a remarkable change of sex. The daughter of a Mr. Stock, of Fredericksburg, in that county, suddenly disappeared in male attire and went to Philadelphia, but has since returned, insisting that he or she is a man, and refusing to don any other costume. A moustache attests the truth of these claims to a masculine nature. For twenty years this singular person has passed for a girl. We can hardly credit the story.

Mr. Charles Vinson, who is in his 90th year, is now the oldest clerk in the Treasury, and probably the oldest man in the employ of the government. His name is on the rolls of the third auditor's office, to which he has been appointed as a clerk, for many years.
