Miscellaneous Items. On Friday the Philadelphia police arrested eight men, all colored, on the charge of conspiracy to violate the election and registry laws of that city.

Moses McLean, an ex member of Congress, died at Gettysburg, Pa., last week. For several years he has been president of the board of trustees of Pennsylvania College.

The Roman Catholic Bishop of Batang, on the confines of Thibet, China and Burman, sends to India a terrific account of an earthquake in that region affecting an area of one hundred and eighty by ninety miles, and causing great destruction of human life.

Mr. Charles White, the secretary of the President to sign land warrants, died at Providence Hospital on Wednesday, in the seventieth year of his age, of an attack of enlargement of the liver.

The by-laws of the Grand Lodge of Masons of Illinois which prohibited colored persons from admission into Masonic lodges in that State, have been repealed.
