THE CABBAGE WORM.—We learn from sev-
eral raisers of vegetables that a new worm
has made its appearance in their cabbage beds.
It first makes its appearance upon the under side
of the leaf, near the stalk, where it is prob-
ably hatched, and although at that time it is
almost too small to be seen with the naked eye,
it grows so rapidly that in a day or two it is
at least fifty times its original bulk. Of course
with the growth of the worm the cabbage dis-
appears, and the result is apparent in the per-
forated leaves and drooping appearance of the
plant. This pest is not the common cabbage
worm that eats into the heart, for its depre-
dations are confined generally to the outside
leaves, and the tighter the inner leaves are
folded together, the less damage is done. In
some instances entire beds have been destroyed
or the cabbage so far rotted as to put them
beyond use.—Hagerstown (Md.) Telegraph.

A young man hardly twenty years of age
was recently sentenced in the Superior Court
in Boston to three years in the State Prison
for burglary. This precocious hero, his lawyer
urged, should have a light sentence on account
of his tender years; but the District Attorney
showed from the record that since the lad was
thirteen years old, he had been arrested twice
for malicious mischief, twice for violation of
city ordinances, twice for larceny, once on sus-
picion of breaking and entering, once for dis-
turbing a public school, three times for disor-
derly conduct, three times for burglary, three
times for assault and battery, three times for
minor offences; and that once he had been
sent back to his native Ireland but wouldn't

RHUBARB VINEGAR.—The process for ten
gallons will be—take twenty five ordinary sized
stalks of rhubarb; pound or crush them with
a piece of wood in the bottom of a strong tub;
add ten gallons of water; let this stand twenty-
four hours; strain off the crushed rhubarb and
add eighteen pounds of sugar free from molasses,
and a teaspoonful of the best brewer's yeast;
raise the temperature to sixty five degrees or
sixty-eight degrees, and put your browns into a
twelve gallon cask; place it in a position where
the temperature will not fall below sixty de-
grees. In a month strain off from the grounds,
returning it to the cask again, and let it stand
till it becomes vinegar.
