A TALKING MACHINE.—For some time past (says "The Observer") the London public have been informed that the mechanism and invention have at last accomplished a task which has been unsuccessfully attempted by men of science in different countries for many years. We refer to the talking machine of Prof. Faber, which has been exhibited on the Continent with great success, and is now to be seen in London. It certainly sustains in every way the qualities its inventor claims for it as it not only distinctly articulates in English, French and German, but laughs and hisses in the most approved fashion. The structure of the speaking apparatus, and the bona fide character of the results, are such as to remove the doubts of the most skeptical on these points.—The machine consists of a bellows, supplied with wind by a pedal, worked by a lady, who also manipulates certain notes, through whose agency the sounds are produced, which form the attractions of the work.—These sounds are emitted by means of a mask, resembling the human mouth, with lips tongue and throat complete, and in articulating letters and syllables the movements of these organs of speech correspond with those of the human subject. Without going further into detail, the principal upon which the instrument is constructed will be manifested, and great credit is certainly due to the invention of so delicate and astonishing an instrument. Upon the principle of the apparatus now exhibiting, others of course, could be constructed, and although the results obtained by the one at present in use are satisfactory, yet one and for an increased degree could be obtained from one on a larger scale.

THE SIEGE OF STRASBURG.—The horrors of the siege of Strasburg will never be fully told. Day after day of incessant bombardment, reducing the French earthworks to heaps of rubbish and mounds of mud, are but feeble strokes in the terrible painting compared with the scenes in the streets as described by an eyewitness. Unhappy families forced to care for their sick and dying and even wailing infants, mewed like rats in underground vaults and cellars, with nothing to remind them of the upper air but the steady booming of the German guns; desperate wretches keeping up a devilish revelry in cellars with the excitement of liquors and zambing to smother the realization of the situation; a Pompeii of living men, where maddened drunkards fought and yelled in their despair; an occasional gleam of heavenly radiance as where a brave, pure girl for thirteen days watched and tended, unaided and alone, five desperately wounded men and only asked help at last to bury one; the burning theatre with its 3000 inmates who had fled thither for safety, and of whom a few escaped while the rest were choked, roasted and consumed together; houses reduced to ruins; works of art destroyed, thousands slain, beggared and rendered homeless, these are a few only of the scenes that go to make up the horrible picture. Well may we join the correspondent's aspiration:—The Lord deliver the earth from war from this time forth for ever. Amen!

PERFECT COFFEE.—A correspondent of the Independent travelling in Sweden was intensely delighted with the coffee served on the steamboats and hotels. "As Uppsala," he writes, "we determined to find out how they made such perfect coffee as we had just drunk, and stepped into the neat kitchen of the little hotel, and this was the report:—Take any kind of coffee pot or urn, and suspend a bag made of felt or very heavy flannel, so long that it reaches the bottom, bound on a wire just fitting the top; put in the fresh ground pure coffee, and pour on freshly boiled water. The fluid filters through the bag, and may be used at once; needs no setting, and retains all aroma. The advantage of this over the ordinary filter is its economy, as the coffee stands and soaks out the strength, instead of merely letting the water pass through it. "Do you boil it?" inquired learner. "No a a a," said the maid, in simple astonishment that any one should be so wasteful as to send the precious aroma away in steam, should rob that price of food of that evanescent something which constitutes his nobility, and reduce him to mere aliment. As soon would one think of throwing away that drop of sunshine, charged with all the summer's gold, which lies at the throat of a bottle of Johannisberger."

THE CHANGES IN VIRGINIA.—Death is rapidly removing from amongst us the prominent men who have figured in public affairs in Virginia. One after another is passing away, and new men are taking their places. The last ten years have done the work usually allotted to a quarter of a century. The war swept off much of the best material of the Commonwealth, while the five years that succeeded have, with their cares, trouble, vexations, losses, mortifications and humiliations, borne to their graves a number of those who hitherto participated actively in public affairs, and to whom we were accustomed to look for counsel and guidance. Much has been said in Northern circles about displacing those who formerly directed affairs in the South, and giving the reins to new men. Time and death are rapidly solving this question for us in Virginia. We sincerely hope that those now coming on the stage of action, and to whom the destinies of Virginia will be committed, will prove equal to the responsibilities they will have to encounter, and worthy of the ancient Virginia character. Reversing the past, they must still look to the present and the future, and make Virginia a living and prosperous Commonwealth.—Rich. Whig.

THE IMPENDING ROYAL MARRIAGE.—The proposed marriage of the Princess Louise Caroline Alberta, fourth daughter and sixth child of Queen Victoria, to the Marquis of Lorne, eldest son of the Duke of Argyll, has attracted attention to the English Royal Marriage act of 1772, which forbids the descendants of George II. from marrying without the approbation of the reigning monarch, signified under the great seal and declared in council. The issue of princesses married into foreign families are excepted from the provisions of the act. The descendants of George II. after passing the age of twenty-five may marry without the royal consent, provided they have given the Privy Council twelve months' previous notice of such marriage, and provided that both Houses of Parliament have not within that time declared their disapprobation. This marriage law was passed in consequence of the desire of George III. to interfere with the marriages of his brothers with subjects of Great Britain.
