Tobacco for the Wounded.—If there be one fact that has been more frequently stated than another, it is that the soldiers engaged in this war—well or wounded—seek the solace of tobacco. The inhabitants of every nation manifest similar instincts, and one of the strongest is the desire to seek out some substance, the use of which may stimulate or soothe the nervous system. There is no excessive smoker feels so much as the loss of tobacco; but soldiers of all nations, especially of the French and German nations, smoke it. It was a standing injunction of the first Napoleon that his troops should have tobacco, and they found it of the greatest advantage in the retreat from Moscow. We have been accustomed to look upon the German as fond of hard intellectual toil for its own sake; and we find of abstraction and imagination, if we judge from the prevalence of the practice of smoking among them, unquestionably appear to find an aid in tobacco. But the manhood of Germany has risen like a giant refreshed to undergo any physical exertion and hardship that may be required, and this war has taxed the physical energies of the strongest. The soldier, wearied with long marches and uncertain rest, obtaining his food how and when he can, with his nervous system always in a state of tension from the dangers and excitement he encounters, finds that his cigar or pipe enables him to sustain hunger or fatigue with comparative ease. Explain it as we may, this is psychologically true, and medical officers would not be sorry to see the issue of a "spirit ration" discontinued, are compelled to allow that the moderate use of tobacco by soldiers in the field has several advantages. For the wounded it is probable that tobacco has slight anodyne and narcotic properties that enable the sufferer to sustain pain better during the day and to obtain sleep during the night.

Suicide of a Dog.—A correspondent in France writing to the Pall Mall Gazette, describes the suicide of a dog. He says: "I was walking by the banks of the Loire, when I perceived a dog, something of a setter, trotting up and down by the water's edge. He went and came with uneven steps, sometimes hastening his movements, sometimes stopping short, as if he were pondering some weighty matter. His proceedings roused my curiosity, and concealing myself behind some trees, I determined to watch him. The dog, who was old, thin, and to a certain extent deprived of the use of his hind legs, went on in the same manner for more than a quarter of an hour; then approaching the edge of the river bank at a steep place, he sat down and looked sadly at the water. Presently, having finally resolved on his course, he raised himself on his poor paralyzed paws, made a spring, and threw himself into the Loire. I ran to the place from whence he fell, and saw him carried off by the stream without making the slightest resistance. As he came near the bank, I called him gently, and held out my cane that he might take hold of it. He made no sign. I tied my handkerchief to the end of my cane and threw it to him; he turned his head away sadly and drifted off. I lost sight of him at the end of a few minutes. He must, no doubt, have sunk. Feeling persuaded that this unfortunate dog had actually chosen death by a deliberate act of his will, I mentioned the circumstance to several persons, and inquiries were made which led to the fact that the poor animal had belonged to a gardener, who seeing him infirm and useless, had pitilessly driven him from his home. He had wandered for a whole month in the field and about the farms, receiving more blows than crusts, till he preferred a violent death to his miserable existence."

FOUND OUT.—"A fool," says the proverb, "will pass for a wise man if he will only have his tongue." We remember, however, to have met somewhere with a very amusing anecdote designed to show that this is not always the truth.

A very intelligent lady, goes the story, had the misfortune to be joined to a husband so foolish that he could not open his mouth without betraying his stupidity. Having been invited on one occasion to dine in a company of very distinguished scholars, the wife, fearful of being mortified by some display of her husband's incapacity, charged him not to say a word during the whole evening, "and then," said she, "they won't know you're a fool." The good man promised compliance, and stuck to his promise most faithfully; for being seated at the table between two strangers, each of them courteously addressed some remark to him, to which he vouchsafed no reply. After this had been repeated two or three times, one of them annoyed at his apparent impoliteness, pronounced him "a fool." "Wife! Wife!" cried out the poor fellow, "I haven't said a word, and they've found me out."
