THE SOLDIER AND HIS HORSE.—The soldier who rides to the front falls in love with the horse that shares with him the hardships of the camp and the dangers of the field. On the showy parade the noble animal, like his master, feels a thrill of pride in his veins, and then he is so impractical as to spurn the ground with his feet. He learns to keep time with the music of horns and the beating of drums; and he does not shrink back in alarm when cannons belch forth their thunder. With sublime courage he goes where the hand of his master guides him. He may suffer fatigue, privation, but he does not cower in the face of danger unless a cruel savant upon his back. The power of will is great, and the man who is resolute and bold in thought and action will infuse a great deal of his spirit into the animal that carries him day by day. On the battlefield, you scarcely know which is most admirable, the courage of the horse that is not appalled by the unearthly whisperings of balls, the bursting of shells and the grim presence of death, or the resolution of the man who keeps his seat in the saddle and rides into the thickest of the storm. The two constitute a striking picture of heroism. The generous and brave hearted soldier is certain to love the horse that has shared with him the trials and dangers of war. Together they have passed through the whirlwind of battle, and neither can forget while the memory of the whirlwind lasts.

At Point-a-Mousson the French officers had to dismount in order to continue their journey by rail; and they were obliged to leave behind them the horses that served them so well. Buyers were scarce, and many excellent Barbets sold for a mere song. Herr Wickede told us: "Many officers parted unconcernedly from the horses which had faithfully borne them through the fatigues and dangers of the war; but others tenderly caressed their horses, and appeared to be pining for them. One actually embraced his charger, putting his arms around its neck, stroking and caressing it, and speaking to it in all kinds of endearing terms. The horse seemed to understand his rider, and was very winning and affectionate in his ways, as is frequently seen in the East. At last the officer, after an inward struggle, snatched his sword from its sheath, and plunged it into the horse's heart, killing it on the spot; then, without troubling himself about saddle or bridle, walked away and entered the railway carriage with his comrades." A tragic act; but who shall say that it was not born of love. And there was sublime courage as well as love in the breast of the man who could fordle his steed in the parting hour, shower kisses upon it, and then with his own hand stab it to death. He could not take the horse into captivity with him, but he could carry with him inside of prison walls the memory of his faithful charger; and he would have the memory painted brighter and in more lasting colors with the warm life blood flowing from the heart. Rather than surrender his idol into the hands of an enemy, rather than give so courageous a steed up to a life of oppression and common drudgery, he would shatter and completely destroy it before turning his back upon it forever. And with Othello he could exclaim:

"I kissed thee, ere I killed thee."

Do not call this Quixotic, but rather think of it as bearing some relation to the earnest affection with which the Arab regards his horse. The horse trusts the man, and the man trusts the horse, and they unite their strength and courage. Were the truth known, we venture to say that there was not a more gallant or a braver soldier in all the armies of France than the officer who surrendered with Napoleon at Sedan, and who parted from his war horse with a kiss, and who plunged his bright sword into the quivering heart.—*Turf, Field and Farm.*

GERMAN EXPORT OF KINGS.—The thrones of the world are filled to-day by Germans. Scarcely a drop of English blood has been left in the royal family of Great Britain by the intermarriages of ages. The house of Hanover has made none but German marriages since the children of the Electress Sophia ascended the British throne. The Royal houses of Prussia, Austria, Bavaria, and Saxe-Coburg have all preserved the pure Gothic blood. The Crown Prince of Italy is cousin to the Crown Prince of Austria. The King of Greece is a Danish prince of German descent. The King of Portugal is a German of the house of Coburg, the Heavy Patrons of Europe Spain wanting to be in the fashion, ordered a Teutonic king to be sent by express to Madrid, but Louis Bonaparte, who is a Dutchman, objected and in consequence has been driven from his throne, to make room, perhaps—if Orleans intrigues succeed—for the Comte de Paris, who is a son of a Princess of Mecklenburg, and a German by blood, temperament eyes and hair. If we look to Russia, not only the royal family, but most of the higher nobility are Teutonic. When Peter the Great formed his kingdom, and wished to introduce it into the family of nations, he found he had nobody to use as ministers or ambassadors. So he imported from the neighboring nation a lot of enterprising and clever men, who could read and write, and who knew how to wash their faces and comb their hair. These founded the great office-holding families which have held ever since a very tight hold upon public affairs. The names of Stackelberg, Budberg, Benckens, and Nesselrode are conclusive proof of the genealogy of these distinguished diplomatists. The princes have invariably married wives of German races.

MEN noted for genius, such as George Stephenson, the eminent English Engineer, and James Watt, the noted English inventor, like many of those famous in literature, science, and government, leave no children to perpetrate their names. Shakespeare, Milton, Bacon, Newton, Harvey, Pope, Mansfield, Goldsmith, Coleridge, Hume, Bishop, Fuller, Locke, Hobbes, Adam, Smith, Bentham, Davy, Sir Joshua Reynolds, Sir Thomas Lawrence, Byron, Lord Clyde, and others well known to fame in British annals, have no lineal representatives now living.
