**HERNDON STATION**, is the fifth station on the Washington and Annapolis road, and about twenty miles from Washington. It is one of the best places in Virginia, and equal Herndon in improvements during the past three years. At the close of the war, only eight dwellings could be seen from its depot, now between thirty-five and forty can be counted, and most of these have recently been erected, and many of them are fine cottages on well cultivated farms. About thirty families from New York, Maine, New Hampshire, Vermont, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, and Canada have recently purchased and settled here. And what is still more gratifying every one is pleased with the location, quality of the land, and delighted with the climate. A gentleman from Lower Canada, below Montreal, left behind him four weeks ago, about two feet of snow and the same thickness of ice on reaching his new home in Herndon, found himself suddenly transferred to fields of green, and others dry and ready for the plow, the garden for the spade, the weather warm and vegetation as far advanced as a Canadian June. He was charmed with the great change, and immediately commenced writing to his ice-bound, snow-buried friends, advising them to form a colony and come to Virginia at once. Success attend his praise-worthy efforts.

J. H. Barker, of Washington, owns thirty acres in front of the depot, which he has laid out in half-acre lots and numerous streets. These lots are now in market, and, no doubt, will soon be taken and improved.

A fine lot has just been purchased on which will be erected the present season a church for the Congregational Society.

Messrs. Clarke & Co., have here a large and valuable steam saw mill, to which is connected playing and mortising machinery for manufacturing doors, sash, and other building material. Also a grist mill for grinding corn and feed. A foundry and spoke factory will soon be added, and other improvements made.

Mr. Gilbert, from Pennsylvania, has a valuable farm of 196 acres, and a fine residence, for which he paid \$12,000.

Mr. Downing, from Vermont, owns a fine dwelling and forty acres of excellent land, for which he paid \$30 per acre. He will make fruit growing a specialty, and already has five hundred grape vines, and a large variety of other fruits. Of course this enterprise will be a success.

Mr. Ballou, from Massachusetts, has a splendid farm of 180 acres.

An enterprise worthy of particular notice is the erection of an extensive stove factory, within three miles of the depot. Mr. Hyatt, from the State of Maine, has purchased 1,100 acres densely covered with fine oak timber, at \$15 per acre, for the purpose above stated. The stoves or shocks will be shipped to the West Indies for a market. This factory will contain the best machinery that can be procured, and propelled by an eighty horse power steam engine. The estimated cost of building and machinery is \$10,000.

The farmers of Herndon propose, and even at this early day, are making arrangements for holding an Agricultural Fair next October. Truly, a remarkable instance of agricultural thrift, energy, industry, and progress.

The citizens of Herndon have already erected two commodious school houses for white and colored children, both well filled and making rapid progress in education.—Home and Office.

**UNSETTLED WAR CLAIMS.**

Under the head of quartermaster are included hay, straw, wood, rent of houses and lots, grain, horses and mules, &c.—As commissary stores for the purpose of feeding hogs, flour, corn meal, &c. As yet the rules which will be adopted by the commission concerning proof of loyalty and the furnishing of supplies are unknown. It is very necessary, however, that all claimants should have their claims presented at once, so as to have whatever benefit may result from priority of application, if any.
