HIGH CHARGES AT SOME SPRINGS.—The Philadelphia Telegraph has opened its batteries upon the extortionate charges of the hotels at some of our summer resorts. It says, commenting upon the proverb that few men know how to keep a hotel, that "if this art implies the bona fide supply to guests to such accommodations as they have a right to expect, for a reasonable sum of money, it must be confessed that first-class hotel-keepers are exceedingly scarce. It is easy enough to find speculators who attempt to make a fortune in a few seasons by overloading popular places of resort, and charging enormous prices for inflicting a host of discomforts upon a victimized public; and so many people have submitted to these exactions heretofore, that the genial, genuine and conscientious hotel-keeper who renders a fair equivalent for every item in his bill is rapidly becoming, in popular apprehension, a mere relic of a better era."

SUMAC grows abundantly in Virginia, and in no other State can it be found so pure and so near like that grown in Sicily. Sumac bushes should be protected by every landowner, and the gathering of the leaves should be encouraged. In July and August, when there is so little work for the farm hands, the sumac should receive attention, and be taken care of like any other products of the farm. In this way many who idle away their time may be profitably employed.

UNSETTLED WAR CLAIMS.

AT ITS LAST SESSION CONGRESS, as an amendment to the army appropriation bill, directed the President to appoint a commission to ascertain and adjust the claims of all loyal citizens in the South for Quartermaster and Commissary supplies furnished to the United States during the year. Under the head of quartermaster included hay, straw, wood, rent of houses and lots, grain, horses and mules, &c.—As commissary stores are included cattle and hogs, flour, corn meal, &c. As yet the rules which will be adopted by the commission concerning proof of loyalty and the furnishing of supplies are unknown. It is very necessary, however, that all claimants should have their claims presented at once, so as to have whatever benefit may result from priority of application, if any.

The undersigned will receive and promptly attend to all claims of parties who are entitled to compensation under the above act of Congress.
