heard Mr. Steward say once (you know the ex-

Sherman, in America), well, old homely-hand-  
some Secretary Steward said: "The cleanest man  
is the most comely to look upon; so bathe well,  
eat well, and love well, and somehow or other  
the homeliest will be beautiful." Now, it  
has struck me a thousand times that Mr. Stew-  
-ard, who looks almost as neat and sweet, is  
really a handsome man. The cleanest man is  
the best man—I mean morally and physically,  
not! How many young ladies—and I beg their  
pardon for saying it—look beautiful at a dis-  
-tance; but when you come close to them they  
leave a soiled look. The hair will look greasy,  
and you have no more excuse for putting grease  
on your hair than there is for putting it on your  
hands. You people, I say, who grease your  
hair are just as far from the Camanche  
Indian who greases his face! A gentleman  
will never fall in love with a soiled woman. She  
will never be sweet. Have you never, in so-called  
fashionable society, met a young lady, whose face  
would be improved by a good square washing?  
Now, this is plain, homely talk. European  
court circles do more bathing, ten to one, than  
the bourgeoisie. Indeed, in Russia—in Moscow,  
where you see the sweetest looking women in the  
world—they have four bath houses, each as  
large as the Fifth Avenue Hotel. Once daily  
every man and woman of patrician blood plunges  
all over, head and all, under pure sparkling, re-  
-juvenating water. This makes the hair light  
colored—gives it a flowy, airy appearance, and  
gives to the homeliest something of the angelic.  
I beg pardon again for this plain talk.

**MODERN VANDALISM.**—Paris, now the  
Noblest of cities, has had many of her glories  
and monuments of her genius destroyed by the  
razing of the Communists, but the unreasoning  
zeal of the Communists, in deliberately  
violating the shrine of art and temples of  
science, has never been paralleled in the  
history of the world. The wilful destruction of  
libraries, works of art, and models and speci-  
-mens illustrating all the sciences, which have  
long maintained the renown of Paris as a  
home for all that is best and greatest in art,  
science, and cultivation, is the most unaccount-  
-able exhibition of wickedness of modern times.  
Surely crime never did more dastardly and  
more unworthy deeds than the recent acts of  
violence upon the museums, libraries, and art  
galleries of Paris.

One of the most intrinsically valuable and  
most interesting of all the places ravaged was  
the chateau of Arcueil, which has been plun-  
-dered and its valuable contents wantonly de-  
-stroyed. A collection, made by the great La-  
-place, to whose descendant the castle belong-  
-ed, of rare books, sonnets, and works of art, has  
been devastated and scattered to the winds.  
The author's original manuscript of La Mecque  
-Cade, that wonderful production of the  
greatest of modern astronomers, was thrown  
into the little stream, the Bièvre, which runs  
by the chateau; but the invaluable relic was  
subsequently recovered. The sacking of the  
house of Laplace, and the ruin of the relics of  
his great genius and labors, was accomplished  
by a horde of ruffians from the neighboring  
district of Moulletot.

**HOW A GOOD THING TRAVELS AND  
LIVES.**—Some weeks ago, says the New York  
Express, the story was published of a young  
lady in Newark, who went to a drug-store for  
a dose of castor oil, and asked the clerk the  
best way to take it without tasting it, when the  
clerk proposed to drink a glass of soda water  
with her. When she had finished he said:—  
"You have taken your oil and did not know it."  
"Oh dear," she cried, "I didn't want it  
for myself—it was for mother." Next day the  
same mishap occurred in Troy, and, by return  
mail, we were surprised to see that this same  
girl had met with an equal disaster in Baltimore  
where she became the daughter of a "leading  
merchant." Then she went to Cincinnati,  
Louisville, Memphis, New Orleans, Charleston,  
and all through the South where there was a  
lead paper and a soda fountain. She then  
appeared at Washington, and on the same date  
a Detroit paper stated she was there. Next  
she took her soda water in Chicago, St. Louis,  
and Pittsburg. Then she got out to Omaha, and  
we concluded we would hear no more of her.  
But here comes the Kansas City Bulletin with  
the same story, where she has become a promi-  
-nent actress. The last heard of her by tele-  
-graph was that she is hurrying to Leavenworth  
before the weekly paper comes out.

**THE LITTLE STEAMER "City of Ragusa"** is  
of 20 feet length on deck, 6 feet beam, 2 feet  
depth of hold, and 14 tons measurement.  
She carries fore and mainmasts, and  
when under sail in fair weather, wind fore,  
spreads a jib, square foresail, square main-  
-sail and square fore and main topsails and main  
-masts. A screw propeller of two blades,  
each 18 inches stroke, is so rigged that it can  
be worked by hand, the crank being inside the  
cabin. The City of Ragusa was a wholeboat  
-going to ship which was wrecked on the coast  
of England. The crew were saved in this boat  
and sold it after landing to the present captain.  
He discovered it with a deck and put in a  
small cabin. The little ship has twice crossed  
the Atlantic, and will probably return to this  
country early next summer.
