**BRITISH COLUMBIA.**—North of Washington Territory lies a region of great extent, known as British Columbia, in which England still holds a nominal supremacy, but which can never be brought under the regime of civilization, except under the stars and stripes. This region extends northward to Simpson's river, and from the main axial line of the Rocky mountains westward to the Pacific. Since 1867 Vancouver's Island has been attached to its jurisdiction. It embraces an area of two hundred and twenty thousand square miles, of which about one-third are capable of tillage, a very large portion of the remainder being adapted to grazing. In the river valleys are found extensive alluvions, which offer special inducements to cultivation, containing elements of superior fertility. At the mouth of Fraser's river these deposits are of especial richness and depth, the accumulation of ages of wilderness seclusion. The Fraser's river valley, from ten to fifteen miles wide, presents quite a large productive surface. The valley of the Kootenay is another locality offering a very considerable extent of arable land for future settlement. The climate of this region exhibits the same elevation above corresponding latitudes of the Atlantic coast which are exhibited in California, Oregon, and Washington. Though north of the parallel of Quebec, the winter is almost without snow. The temperature is uniform, showing the same tendencies to equilibrium which mark our Pacific coast climates generally. The mornings and evenings are fresh in summer, and the nights never of oppressive temperature. The climate is one calculated to produce vigorous health and elastic spirits in good constitutions, but it is not fitted for impaired systems. The white population of this region scarcely equals fifteen thousand, of which about one-third reside in Victoria City on Vancouver's Island; another third are located round New Westminster, while the rest are scattered through the country as miners, hunters, &c., but a small proportion being engaged in tilling the soil. There are six thousand Indians within the Territory, with whom a trade in peltries is maintained, more profitable to the whites than to themselves. The lack of the impulse of immigration here causes the white population to assume a stationary character, rather inclining to retrograde in the scale of civilization. The disposition of England to renounce this unprofitable appendage of her empire is becoming constantly more clear. It will then naturally gravitate to the great Republic. —Wash. Chronicle.

**MANSARD ROOFS.**—The French or Mansard roofs, which have become so popular within the last few years, were first used in France, although a modification known as the Gambal has been used in this country for nearly a century. The invention of Mansard arose through the imposition of taxes, which were formerly levied upon each story of a building below the attic. By erecting a Mansard roof, the builders obtained an additional story without a corresponding increase of taxes, and under the skillful manipulation of the French architects they assumed very ornamental forms. The introduction of the French Mansard roof in this country is of a comparatively recent date, but they have been generally adopted for all kinds of buildings and are becoming more popular every year. They are mostly used, however, for country residences, or other small buildings, as they remove in a great degree the flat, stilted appearance that a two-story building mostly possesses. Those with a straight outline are known as the Mansard, but those in which the outline is curved and called French roofs. Both of these styles, however, are frequently combined in the construction of the same roof. These roofs are much lighter than the ordinary style of roofing; they cost about the same but they are much more durable. They have hitherto been built and trimmed with wood, having the space between the windows shingled or covered with slate. A very large proportion of the buildings in Chicago were constructed in this manner, and they proved one of the most fruitful causes of the sudden destruction of that city. In consequence of this, the attention of builders has been called to them, and now metal has almost entirely taken the place of wood, in all their parts. Many buildings in Eastern cities that have been built upon the famous plan, have been entirely changed. The main cornice, dormer-windows, crest-moulding, corner trimming, are now made of galvanized iron, and for an additional protection and introduced a corrugated metal and enameled shingle, which is considered fire proof in all ordinary cases. The principle mouldings for these roofs are made exclusively by recently patented machinery.

**HOW GEN. POLK WAS KILLED.**—An ex-Confederate, working for the Westminister Review, gives the following account of the death of the Bishop-General:  
"The death of the distinguished man occurred while our army lay in front of Kenesaw—Johnston, with a group of officers, among whom was Polk, was making a reconnaissance of the enemy's lines from the summit of the Pike Mountains, a lofty, solitary mount, which jutted out from the range, and formed the apex of an acute angle, on which our line was arranged. The situation was a very hazardous one, being commanded, or rather reached, by guns from any portion of the enemy's lines. The unusual assemblage in such a conspicuous place soon attracted the vigilant enemy. A battery in front immediately fired one shot, which we afterwards found out was but the prelude to one of the most fearful shellings I ever witnessed. The group was standing before young Beauregard's battery and the fifth company of Washington Artillery, Johnston being on the works looking through a field glass."  
"The first shot could not have missed him two feet, but the only attention he paid to it was to turn his glass to the battery that fired it. Polk had, in the meantime, separated from the group and was walking thoughtfully away, with his left side to the enemy, his head down, and his hands clasped behind him. The second shell fired at the crowd struck him in the arm, and passed through the body, tearing out his heart, and then crushing his right arm above the elbow. He dropped on one knee, and I had hardly turned my back when I heard the murmur of horror run through the line, 'General Polk is killed.' Johnston said not a word, but to him a slight light in his arms. Hardly uttered a cry and he rushed forward. He was past all human help. The members of his staff tenderly lifted and bore him from the field."
