LOCAL NEWS.

YESTERDAY.—The weather yesterday was damp, cloudy and disagreeable, and the attendance at the churches was consequently smaller than usual, and but few persons were on the streets. Rev. Dr. Sparrow preached in Christ Church, and President Elder Wilson in the M. E. Church South, but with these exceptions, the pulpits of all the churches were occupied by the resident clergy. The following is a report of the work done during the day, by the Young Men's Christian Association: "The Alms House services were unusually interesting; a full corps of workers were on hand, and a good attendance notwithstanding the inclemency of the weather. The Jail services were held as usual, with the same interest that has marked this activity for the last three months. The Sunday prayer meeting in the Baptist Church was, by the weather, well attended; the services were as usual very fervent in their character. The speakers upon the occasion were very earnest in their appeals to the young to make the new year the season for giving themselves to Jesus. Special prayer was again made for the outpouring of the spirit upon the churches." A meeting next Sunday will be held in the Methodist Church South, will be held at the M. E. Church was numerously attended, and the services, conducted by Rev. Mr. Hennevey, were of the most interesting character. Just as the congregation was dismissed, the clouds, which had been lowering all night, broke away and the moon and stars shone out brightly—a happy augury for the new year.

After the transaction of the usual business of the Society, the meeting adjourned to re-assemble on Sunday evening, the 7th inst. at 7 p. m.

CHICKEN THIEF KILLED.—A colored man, who has long borne the reputation of being a chicken thief, was shot and killed last Friday night, while "plying his vocation" at the farm of Mr. Sypow, near Carlin's Springs. At a late hour that night a young Mr. Terrett, who slept in the building adjoining the chicken house, heard some one attempting to obtain an entrance into the latter, and aiming himself with a pistol went out to see what was the matter. The thief finding that he was detected ran off, and was in the act of climbing over a fence near by, when he fell dead. Mr. Terrett having fired with fatal effect. A coroner's inquest was held upon the body the next day and a verdict rendered of justifiable homicide.

COUNTY COURT.—Judge R. H. Cocke presiding.—The January term of the County Court commenced to-day. A grand jury was sworn, but the Commonwealth's Attorney having nothing to present the jurors were discharged. The rule issued at the instance of the Commonwealth, at December term, 1871, vs. Wm. Arnacross, to show cause why his license to keep an ordinary should not be withdrawn was docketed and continued till next term. Court adjourned until 10 o'clock to-morrow.

ROBBERY.—The house of Mr. Charles Guy on Columbus street, just north of the "Brick Row," was entered last night during the absence of the occupants, who were at church, and robbed of one hundred and six dollars in gold and forty odd dollars in silver. The money was contained in a mahogany box which was in a carpet bag that hung on the wall behind a bedstead. It is thought that a colored servant woman committed the theft and a warrant has been issued for her arrest.

FUEL THEFT.—The yard of the house of Mr. William Pruitt, on Princess between Patrick and Henry streets, was entered about eight o'clock last Saturday night, and robbed of a quantity of wood and coal. Mrs. Pruitt heard the thieves, but in the absence of her husband became so much alarmed that she made no outcry, contenting herself with bolting all the doors to keep them out of the house.

ALEXANDRIA MUSICAL ASSOCIATION.—The regular meeting of the Alexandria Musical Association will occur to-morrow evening, at the Christian Association rooms, for the purpose of completing the organization. Mr. Evans, of Harrisburg, a gentleman of high musical attainments, will be present, and from the reputation he bears, those who attend may expect to be highly entertained.

POLICE REPORT.—There were no cases of a criminal character at the Mayors' or at either of the Magistrates' offices this morning.

NIGHT REPORT.—Night cloudy and misty, with, however, a clear sky about twelve o'clock. There were no disturbances, nor any arrests. One lodger was at the station house, but no prisoners were there.

RIVER NEWS.—The ice is gradually disappearing from the river and navigation is consequently being resumed. A large fleet of oyster boats left here to-day, and when this item was written the steamer Virginia, of the Maryland ferry line, was getting up steam preparatory to resuming her trips.

NEW YEAR'S DAY.—A large number of the young gentlemen of the city and those from whom the adjective young has been dropped, paid annual visits to their lady friends to-day, and the toast "a happy new year" not only returns was frequently drunk—but not many in coffee or beef tea.

Local Brevities. The January term of the U. S. District Court, Judge Underwood presiding, commenced this morning, but adjourned until to-morrow.

The meeting of the Stockholders of the Alexandria and Washington Turnpike, to have been held to-day was postponed for want of a quorum.

The sale of the brick yard of Lucas & Tucker, to have taken place to-day, was postponed until next Saturday.

Arrangements for a large ball were made at West End last week, but when the night came no ladies were present. Great complaints are made about the condition of the street crossings in various sections of the city. The Christmas festival of the M. E. Church South will be held to-night.

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TELEGRAPH NEWS.

From the Pacific Coast. SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 30.—Judge Lake in the municipal court pleaded guilty to-day to an indictment for assault and battery with a pistol upon Charles DeYoung of the Chronicle, and Judge Stanley fined him \$300.

Frank White, former clerk to Secretary of State Nicholas, and Edward Hall, both steady young men have disappeared from Sacramento under circumstances leading to the belief that both have been murdered.

The robbery of the steamer in Sonora county last week has been traced to a Digger Indian boy 16 years old, who was armed with a red-wood stick instead of a gun. He got no plunder, the express box being empty.

Seven eastern mails have arrived. All mails from this point passed east of Ogden, there being no obstruction west of that point.

J. W. Barker, wife and two children were murdered at Blue Water station, near Tucson, Arizona, it is supposed by outlaws, driven out of Sonora.

The storm in California, Oregon, and Nevada is unabated. It is raining almost incessantly and the n rivers everywhere are overflowing. Mails, telegraph and travel are interrupted.

LATER. The storm is abating. The valley country is generally flooded. The steamer Montana, from Panama, has been telegraphed outside.

A dispatch from San Bernardino says: The Arizona Apaches have left the Verde and Camp McDowell reservations and demand a camp at Old Fort Reno. You may look for an Indian war in Arizona. The people have been too much oppressed to listen now to any Colyer policy.
