BLUNDERS OF TYPOS.—The amusement afforded by ludicrous typographical errors will be inexhaustible while printers are fallible and editors write with abominable indifference to legibility. One of the most astonishing blunders of this kind was committed some years ago in an editorial in the Bulletin. The writer who had cautioned his readers against "casting their pearls before swine," was amazed and grieved to perceive that the compositor had warned the public against "carting their pills before sunrise." This was corrected in the proof; but the reporter who declared of a certain new store that it had "sixty fancy windows," was even more indignant than the store-keeper when he saw in his paper the statement that the establishment contained "sixty faded widows." And then there was the poet in Muncy, who sought to soothe the wounded feelings of a bereaved family by publishing in the local paper a poetical tribute to the deceased daughter, Emily, in which he declared that "we will hallow her grave with our tears." He was pursued next morning by Emily's exasperated brother because the printers insisted that "we will hallow her grave with our tears."

The poets suffer most deeply. Nothing could be worse for instance, than the misery of the bard who asserted, in his copy, that he "kissed her under the silent stars," only to find that the compositor compelled him to "kick her under the cellar stairs." A certain Jenkins, also, was the victim of an aggravated assault, because when, in his report of a wedding, he declared that "the bride was accompanied to the altar by eight bridesmaids," the types made it that "the bride was accompanied to the altar by tight bridesmaids." These things are peculiarly unpleasant when they occur in remarks upon death; as in the case of the editor, who, while writing a sympathetic paragraph, observed that "Mr. Smith could hardly bear the loss of his wife," only to find that the printer had made it "Mr. Smith could hardly bear a boss for a wife."

THE LATE WM. C. RIVES.—At Walker's Church, in Albemarle county, a beautiful marble tablet has been erected to the memory of this eminent Statesman and noble son of Virginia, which bears the following inscription: IN MEMORY OF one of the Founders of this Church WILLIAM CABELL RIVES, LL.D. Statesman, Diplomatist, Historian, born 4th May, 1798. Died 25th April, 1868. Uniting a clear and capacious intellect, a courageous and generous Temper, with sound Learning, and commanding eloquence, he won a distinguished place among the foremost men whom Virginia has consecrated to the service of the Country; while he added lustre to his talents, by the purity and dignity of his public career, and adorned his private life with all the virtues which can grace the character of Husband, Father, and Friend.

PROPHETIC IN THE BRITISH PEERAGE.—It is inconceivable that in the present condition of political affairs in England, when the abolition of the House of Lords is seriously discussed and the very continuance of the monarchy is in danger, the aristocracy should still present instances of wasteful folly as well calculated to disgust the people as the worst excesses of the French noblesse before 1789. What a weapon in the hands of Sir Charles Dilke, for example, is the conduct of Lord Courtenay, the eldest son and heir to the title of the Earl of Devon! Lord Courtenay has recently gone into the bankruptcy court with debts amounting to the astounding sum of \$234,306, or more than \$4,000,000. This criminal prodigality was not the result of youthful madness, like that of the late Marquis of Hastings or the present Duke of Hamilton, who squandered vast fortunes in a few months of fast life; it was the culmination of years of ruinous extravagance, for Lord Courtenay is thirty-five, and has been mounting up to this height of infamy ever since his coming of age. With recent warnings beyond number of the end of such a course, with Odger and Boales haranguing the people against a privileged class, the younger generation of which has not yet been traced, that the gods first deprive of reason those whom they wish to destroy.—N. J. Post.

A BOILER INSPECTOR.—An ingenious office holder in Chicago, Mr. Fred Metzke, city boiler inspector, on being asked to tell what he knew about boilers, promptly answered, "Nothing at all." He explained that he had not, from his observation of previous office-holders under the city government, been led to suspect that a boiler inspector was required to know anything about boilers. He knew that the chief requirements of a successful candidate for office were to be a good fellow, to have a snug phalanx of voters whom he could handle on election days, and to be ready always to stand by the aldermen and others to whom he should be indebted for his office. Metzke has no doubt been reading that hatchet story, and expected Chicago's G. W.—which his name is Medill—to embrace him, and exclaim: "Good boy!" I would sooner every boiler in the city was blown up than my Metzke should tell a lie. But it didn't turn out that way. Metzke is a martyr to his love of truth. He has been allowed an opportunity to resign in favor of some one who may not perhaps be any better "up" in the boiler business, but who, at least, is not so artless.—Washington Star.
