WHARF AND RIVER NEWS.—The wharves leased by the American Coal Company from the city are to be repaired in time for the resumption of business there next spring.

AN OLD CONVICT.—The Sheriff of Warren county passed through here last night on his way to Richmond, having in charge a colored man 89 years old, who had been an inmate of the Poor House of that county for the last five or six years.

FROM WASHINGTON.

CONGRESS.

WASHINGTON, January 18, 1872. To the Senate, Mr. Trumbull reported adversely upon the petition of certain women to be heard at the bar of the Senate upon the question of Woman Suffrage.

After some further debate, Mr. Carpenter took the floor on the Amnesty Bill, and spoke at length.

The House of Representatives was engaged the entire morning in debating the notorious case in the person of Mrs. Banker, the object being to prevent the calling up of the Cesna contested election case which is to follow the disposal of Mrs. Banker's case.

From Mexico.

NEW YORK, Jan. 18.—A Mexican dispatch states that there is great rejoicing at Matamoros over the success of the government forces, who have captured besides Oaxaca the city of San Luis Potosi.

The anniversary meeting of the Young Men's Christian Association takes place to-night at the M. E. Church, South, exercises commencing at 7 o'clock. It is confidently expected that this will prove to be a large and most interesting meeting.

A city of Mexico dispatch states that Mr. Bliss, American Secretary of Legation, having investigated the affair of the bark Brothers, says the statements of the American captain are confirmed.

From Kansas.

LEAVENWORTH, Jan. 18.—The annual meeting of the Kansas and Missouri Associated Press was held here yesterday. W. P. Baker, of the Topeka State Record, was re-elected President and George F. Prescott, of the Leavenworth Commercial, Secretary and Treasurer.

AN ERROR.—In the debates of the City Council at its last meeting on the question of reducing the price of gas, it was stated among other items of expense to the city that the gas used by the Young Men's Christian Association was not charged for. This is an error.

ANNAPOLIS, Md., Jan. 18.—The court met at 10 o'clock. The room was then crowded, fully two hundred ladies being present, and when the train from Washington and Baltimore and the steamer arrived, at 10:30, it was impossible for many to gain admission.

NEW YORK, Jan. 17.—A Salt Lake special states that Attorney Bates' return to Washington is to secure the removal of Governor Woods, Judge McKeon, Marshal Patrick, and Secretary Block.

NEW YORK, N. C., Jan. 18.—A fire on Pollock and Craven streets this morning destroyed Berry's drug store, Hohn's bakery, Hall's book store, Eaton's jewelry store and Agostine's confectionery store. Loss about \$9000; one third insured.

HARRISBURG, Jan. 18.—A fire at Mount Joy, Pennsylvania, to-day destroyed the following property: Bradley & Sons, edge tool factory; Bradley Bros., malleable iron works, and Beckweyer, Miskey & Co's, foundry. Loss \$20,000; insurance \$10,000.

ROBBERY.—On the night of Monday last, the cooper's shop of Mr. Joseph Cawood, corner of Princess and Water streets, was entered by a thief and robbed of a pair of blankets, a box of sugar, and a bucket containing a knife, a spoon and a file.

LONDON, Jan. 18.—The Queen yesterday received deputations from the inhabitants of Osborne who presented addresses congratulating Her Majesty and expressing their joy at the recovery of the Prince of Wales.
