**A MAN WITH NERVES OF STEEL.**—Young Donaldson, the daring aeronaut, who made a balloon ascension at Reading, Penn., on the 30th of August last, and performed a series of trapeze feats when a mile or more from the earth, repeated his thrilling performance in Norfolk on Monday last. There was no basket to the balloon, but its place was supplied by a trapeze similar to those used by circus performers, and above the trapeze was placed a hoop, secured to which was a suit of heavy clothing to be used by the aerial voyager when he encountered the cold currents. The Norfolk Journal in describing the ascension, says that when the balloon was released from its moorings and reached a great altitude Donaldson suddenly and apparently with little effort thrust himself into a sitting posture on the bar, kissing his hand to the crowd below. Suddenly, pretending to lose his balance, he fell backwards, sliding head downward until he caught by his toes on the side ropes that suspended the trapeze bar. In this perilous position he swung to and fro several seconds—a time which seemed an age to the awe-stricken crowd below. It was curious to observe the varying emotions of the crowd—as varying as the disposition of each individual. Some were thrilled with admiration of the courage of the daring man and kept their eyes riveted on him. Others shuddering with horror turned away with pallid faces and beating hearts and covered their eyes with their hands to shut out the dreadful sight. Faint shrieks were heard from the ladies, and some turned to leave the spot, but true to the characteristic of their sex—curiosity—concluded to take one more look, and looking once, looked again. Throwing himself back in his seat on the bar the aeronaut sat astride the same. Then began a series of gymnastic evolutions—balancing himself on his back; turning over and "skinning the cat," by the side ropes, &c. Upward gradually and steadily rose the balloon, cleaving the air like a mighty bird. At length it looked like a mere speck in the clouds. Opera glasses and telescopes were brought into requisition, and by their aid Donaldson could be seen still performing his gymnastic feats. After rising to a tremendous height the balloon hung for a few moments seemingly suspended in mid air, and then sailed off in a southerly direction. When the balloon was a mere speck in the distance, invisible to the naked eye and almost through powerful telescopes, the man with nerves of steel and the heart of a lion repeated his daring trapeze feat of hanging head downward, suspended by his toes. Such a scene was never before witnessed in Norfolk, and seldom anywhere in the world. The description of such a scene reads like a romance, but the reality far surpasses the most vivid powers of "word painting," and we desire from the vain effort to depict it. When the aerial ship had reached an altitude of about half a mile, and struck the colder current of air, the aeronaut was observed to climb up to the hoop, and get his suit of thick clothes. Descending to the bar he dressed himself, and then resumed the gymnastic display—exercising himself to keep warm. Those who were fortunate to have telescopes saw the balloon gradually descending. Occasionally the aeronaut would throw down a bag of sand to enable the balloon to rise—the country probably not being suited for a descent. Late in the evening it was rumored that Donaldson had descended safely near Kempsville, in Princess Anne county.

**AN EXTENSIVE THIEF.**—West Baltimore has in the past few days developed a female thief in the person of Louisa Moore (colored), who ranks among the most dangerous known to the calendar of this phase of crime. Her thefts were conducted in the following way:—She would go to a house where she knew there was a domestic need, and by her attractive manners soon gain a home. After she had been at the place a few days, always selecting those of persons well-to-do for her operations, she would seize upon whatever happened to come within her reach, and feigning to be dissatisfied leave. This scheme was practiced in many of the first houses in the city, and with considerable success, until she was arrested Monday by Officer Flannery, charged with stealing clothing valued at \$30 from Mrs. Laura Shakelford of No. 187 north Carey street, and also of stealing a lot of silverware valued at \$50 from Mrs. Elizabeth Brown, No. 209 north Carey street.

Upon both of these charges she was committed for the action of the grand jury. She was not sent to jail, as is customary in such cases, but kept at the station house, on account of the probability that more charges would be made against her. Yesterday Sergeant Cadwalader started upon a tour of search through the western section of the city, and found goods that had been sold by the prisoner in various shops, and belonging to the following-named persons, who preferred charges against her at the Western station house yesterday afternoon: Mrs. Sophy Ditty, No. 234 Lanvale street, a lot of clothing and jewelry valued at \$34; Mrs. Ellen Proctor, of No. 182 Lafayette avenue, a lot of wearing apparel valued at \$25; Mrs. Julia Johnson, No. 687 west Fayette street, a silver soap ladle valued at \$10, which the prisoner sold for twenty-five cents.

She was committed upon all these charges by Justice Bell for the action of the grand jury. The officers say that it is thought her robberies have gone further than have been made known, and she will be detained at the station house a few days longer. The station house yesterday afternoon presented the appearance of a pawnshop. Wearing apparel was scattered about the benches in large quantities as evidence against the prisoner, and jewelry and silverware spread upon the desk in a profusion that was somewhat novel to look upon. —*Baltimore American.*

Messrs. Emanuel, of Bond street, London, recently purchased the jewels of the Empress Eugenie for \$400,000. The London Standard says the collection is remarkable in many ways. That of the Prince Esterhazy was more valuable, but for taste and workmanship, combined with historical interest, it is not much to say that nothing like it has been offered for sale in England within living memory, if at all. A correspondent thinks that Eugenie is going to use this money in intrigues to recover her throne.
