THE DEATH OF POE.—The following is from the pen of Eugene L. Didier, in Appleton's Journal:

The true story of Poe's death has never been correctly told. It is this: In the summer of 1849 he left New York for Virginia. In Richmond he met Miss Elmira Shelton, whom he had known in his youth, renewed his acquaintance, and, in a few weeks, they were engaged to be married. He wrote to his friends in the North that he should pass the remainder of his life in Virginia, where the happiest days of his youth had been spent. Early in October he set out from Richmond to fulfill a literary engagement in New York, and to prepare for his marriage, which was to take place on the 17th of the month. Arriving in Baltimore, he found that he had missed the Philadelphia train which he expected to take, and would have to wait two or three hours for the next train. He went into a restaurant near the depot to get some refreshments. There he met some of his old West Point friends, who invited him to a champagne supper that night. He accepted the invitation and went. At first he refused to drink but at last he was induced to take a glass of champagne. That set him off, and in a few hours he was madly drunk. In this state he wandered off from his friends, was robbed and beaten by ruffians, and left insensible in the street all night. The next morning he was picked up and taken to the Maryland hospital. He was delirious with brain fever. He was well cared for by the physicians of the hospital, but he was beyond the skill of the doctors. He lingered two or three days, and died on Sunday, October 7, 1849, in the thirty-eighth year of his age. His funeral was attended by Hon. Z. Collins Lee, Dr. Snodgrass, Nelson Poe (his cousin) and Henry Herring (his uncle).
