**THE COST OF LIVING.**—Some of the New York and Philadelphia newspapers are discussing just now the cost of living in their respective cities. One correspondent in New York writes that with an income of ten thousand dollars per annum and a house of his own, and while living very inexpensively, too, and with no children, he cannot save anything. A gentleman who has only five thousand says so far from being able to save, he is in debt, "growing out of the high prices for articles of daily consumption." To come lower down in the scale and from the ranks of the married to the single, an unmarried man asserts that he can live comfortably on twelve hundred dollars per annum, "because he has not the expensive luxury of a wife." For this horrible doctrine and ungallant remark he is taken soundly to task by a "married Yankee," who says that "it is a common mistake with young men to regard wives as luxuries—that while there are undoubtedly women who look upon marriage as merely a means of being well provided for, the greater portion of American girls are willing to be helpmates to the men they love."

The New York Times, in commenting on those and other facts, gives it as its opinion that a family in New York embracing four children and two servants, and keeping as good a table as American families are accustomed to keep, and giving their children a good education, and without the luxury of horses or a carriage, cannot save anything on an income of five thousand dollars a year. The same journal says that a house cannot be obtained in a decent neighborhood for less than one thousand or fifteen hundred dollars rent while apartments in good houses are even more expensive.

The Philadelphia journal, alluding to the statements of its contemporary, says that the same comforts and accommodations which cannot be obtained in New York for less than five thousand dollars can be procured in the City of Brotherly Love for from three to four thousand dollars. Rents, it says, are lower. A good house can be obtained for eight hundred dollars per annum, while the markets are proportionately cheaper than in New York. It further gives it as its opinion that there are families of education and culture in Philadelphia who, with incomes of say two thousand dollars a year, are really in better circumstances than those who find it hard to get along on five thousand every twelve months.—*Wash. Rep.*

**A CHINESE WEDDING.**—Le Yueck, the chief Chinese manufacturer of cigars in Portland, Oregon, recently imported a wife from his native country, and wedded her with great display. After the ceremony had been performed at the Joss House, the bride and her waiting maids were driven to the residence of her lord and master, on First street, where her husband who had preceded her, received the party by firing a feu de joie, composed of a quantity of crackers of the largest size. The bride was at once disrobed by her attendants and put to bed, while the groom received his friends and entertained them in a becoming manner, causing them to smoke cigars, eat sweet meats, and drink wines and sam shuey. In the evening a feast of roast pig, duck, game, and all the delicacies known to the Chinese cuisine, was served in the chamber of the bride, and reclining on her elaborate robe de nuit, and reclining on her couch, received her guests with a bland, languid smile. Down her cheeks the groom was doing the agreeable to his guests after they had been dismissed by the lady of the house. He wore a happy, don't-care-for-the-expense sort of a smile, and would every few minutes fire off a cracker. The festivities were kept up until a late hour of the night, and then, with the bursting of another bunch of crackers, the guests were dismissed and silence reigned.

**SHAMMING BOOTS AND SHOES.**—A new field of enterprise, and one which will surely bring its reward, is now open to the honest and independent boot and shoe manufacturer, who dares make a really good, honest article, fit for real wear. For a long time there has existed dissatisfaction at the miserable manner in which too many of the boots and shoes in our market are put together, causing them to be cast aside long before the stock has been worn out. Children's shoes in particular are the most slighted, being hastily put together with small rotten thread, the buttons imperfectly sewed on in a large number of instances, and the boot and shoe perhaps embellished with gewgaws of no use to the wearer. Consequently, long before the leather has exhausted itself by wear, the stitching rips out, the buttons fly off, the heels are all askew, and the structure is a wreck. To be sure, "cobblers" do not object, but parents, who have in charge the supplying of those goods, do object, and are clamoring for some change to be made that shall remedy this shoddy state of things. Let some public-spirited manufacturer take this matter in hand and advertise the first in the field to advertise Blank's boots and shoes thoroughly made in every particular, warranted not to rip, buttons not to come off, counters to hold, and the demand he will have will surprise him.—*Boston Bulletin.*
