FUNNY CONGRESSMEN.—[Washington Cor. Cincinnati Commercial.]—But constituency which sends a buffoon to Congress, deliberately and with knowledge, does a most thoughtless, disgusting and hurtful act. It was very funny to see and hear Mullens, of Tennessee, get up and bawl out: "Mister Speaker, I want a pint of oster just here," or to hear him speaking of an Arkansas member, who had been killed by Ku-Klux, as he did speak in his most sorrowful and bewailing manner: "Mister Speaker, he has gone down to his last grave, wrapped in the peaceful soliloquy of his blood." It may be funny for the boys in the gallery to see a member put his big dirty boots upon his desk, slide down in his chair until he sits on a spot between the small of his back and his neck, and go to sleep and snore during the proceedings of the House, as an Illinois member used to do in the Forty first Congress. Perhaps it was amusing to the colored gallery to see a member get to his feet by the strong exertions and the help of his neighbors, so drunk that he could not stand, and insist upon quarrelling in an incoherent manner with the speaker, until his voice was drowned by the deafening strokes of the mallet. This exhibition was given about a year ago by a Pennsylvanian, who is still a member of the House. Perhaps the sight of three or four members during the session stretched out full length upon the sofas in the space back of the circle of seats, all sound asleep and sweating like a bull's nose in winter, is an inspiring view from the reporters' gallery. Perhaps it looks well to see a Congressman squirting tobacco juice in quantities ranging from a tea-spoon full to a quart all over the snow-white marble of the stairway and besmearing costly carpets. It may be among the prophecies for a down-East Senator to smoke a five cent cigar in a hundred thousand dollar room, as I have seen Haunli do in the unequalled and superb marble room of the Senate. And it may be the right thing to do for two members of the present House, who pay about twenty or thirty dollars a month for board in the Washington lath houses, to bring lunch of some kind and at a certain hour in the day go into the room marked "exclusively for members" and eat their luncheons in happiness. I may say, however, that this room, notwithstanding its character, is the cleanest, brightest and purest room in the Capitol, but I submit that it is hardly the place to eat a greasy sandwich.

The things I have described may be funny, amusing and laughable to the witless herd who go through life for no other purpose than to find things to laugh at, but such Congressmen as I have alluded to are a positive injury to any district. They have no influence here and no acquaintance; they come here with the same narrow notions they had at home, serve out their term, draw their pay, their mileage and their stationery, and go home to the same cramped sphere. Of course, when I speak thus, I do not mean all who chew tobacco or smoke five cent cigars, for many very good and useful Senators and members would thus be unjustly included, but I except no other class. It is folly to say that such men make as good Congressmen as others nobody believes it who stop to think. As a man is known by the company he keeps so is a district known by the sort of a man it sends to Congress.

THE CARE OF LAMPS.—The easiest way to clean petroleum lamps is to wash with thin milk of lime, which forms an emulsion with the petroleum and removes every trace of it, and by washing a second time with milk of lime and a small quantity of chloride of lime, even the smell may be so completely removed as to render the vessel thus cleaned fit for keeping beverages in. If the milk of lime is used warm, instead of cold, the operation is rendered much shorter.

The best time for cleaning them is the morning, for reasons of safety, if not convenience. Scarcely a week passes during the winter months, but we read accounts of frightful accidents from kerosene lamps exploding and killing or scarring for life women and children. A simple knowledge of the inflammable nature of the fluid would probably put a stop to nearly all the accidents. As the oil burns down into the lamp, a highly inflammable gas gathers over its surface, and as the oil decreases the gas increases. When the oil is nearly consumed, a slight jar will often inflame the gas, and an explosion is sure to follow, dealing with it death and destruction. A bombshell is not more to be dreaded. Now if the lamp is not allowed to burn more than half way down, such accidents are almost impossible, and always if your lamp in the morning, then you never need fear an explosion.—*Rural Home.*

NOT CONTAGIOUS.—A Kansas paper says: The following interesting little story is told at the expense of a young lady school teacher, who does not live one thousand miles from this city. She has been very properly anxious in regard to the prevention of small-pox in her school, and therefore strictly enforces the rule that whenever a case of sickness is reported in the family of one of her pupils the pupil must bring a certificate from the family physician stating that the disease is not contagious, failing in which the pupil must remain away until the danger is over.

A few days since she was informed that one of her pupils, a little girl of Teutonic extraction had sickness in her family. On being questioned, the girl admitted that she "had sick at her house," that her mother was sick, and that she "had marks on her face." She was accordingly sent home. She returned, however, in a few days, and reported that her "father was sick." She was again sent home, with orders not to come again without a certificate from the family physician.

The next day she returned to school, with her finger in her mouth and her little bonnet swinging by the string; she said: "Miss— we've got a little baby at our house, but my mother told me to tell you it isn't catchin'." The teacher said she was very glad it was not "catchin'," and told her pupil to take her seat.
