RADICAL CONVENTION.—Pursuant to notice the delegates appointed by the different wards and townships, of the city and county of Alexandria, for the purpose of electing delegates to the State Radical Convention to be held in Richmond on the 17th inst., met in the U. S. Court Room at noon to-day. Mr. E. E. White had a collation prepared for the delegates in an adjoining room, which was partaken of with much gusto. The Convention was called to order by E. E. White, and several nominations were made for temporary Chairman. John Seaton moved to waive election by ballot and elect by a rising vote, which was lost. At this point considerable excitement was occasioned by a wordy altercation between L. O. Neal and John Seaton, in which the latter was called a thief and the former a sucker, and which, at one time, it was thought, would terminate in blows—if nothing more dangerous. The balloting then proceeded, resulting in the election of W. L. Penn temporary chairman, who, upon taking the chair, addressed the Convention. G. C. Thorpe was elected Secretary. On motion of W. A. Row a committee on credentials was appointed by the Chair, composed of L. O. Neal, 1st Ward; Richard Miles, 2d; Hannibal King, 3d; Chas. Seals, 4th; V. P. Corbett, Arlington Township; C. H. Linsky, Washington Township; W. A. Row, Jefferson Township—county. A committee to draft rules and regulations, composed of Thomas Brown, E. Beckley and Geo. C. Hewes was appointed, who retired to accomplish the work assigned them. In the absence of the retired committees, on motion of Thos. I. Edelin, John Syphax, colored, of the county, was invited to address the Convention, which he declined to do. R. D. Beckley was then called upon, who responded in a few brief remarks, deprecating the disintegrating elements that were beginning to appear in various localities among Radicals. The Committee on Credentials having completed the work assigned it, reported the following delegates in attendance—1st Ward: L. O. Neal, Ed. Evans, G. C. Hewes, G. L. Seaton, Jas. Tancil, Robert Jenkins; alternate, Thos. Ashton. 2nd Ward: Richard Miles, Jno. Gray, L. D. Harmon, Larkin Patton. 3rd Ward: W. L. Penn, Thos. J. Brown, Hannibal King, E. E. White, T. J. Edelin, Jno. Fields, Henry Ditcher, A. J. Lumpkins. 4th Ward: Jno. A. Seaton, Lewis Baldwin, F. M. Van Auker, Wm. Miller, Edgar Beckley, Charles Seals, Lewis Henley; alternate, Wm. Harris. Jefferson Township: W. A. Row, N. Wormley. Washington Township: C. H. J. Linsky, J. D. Mitchell, Arlington Township: Henry Jackson, V. P. Corbett, Jno. Syphax. After considerable debate, in which, amid much excitement, the rejection of the report was urged by John Seaton, upon the ground that Carroll and not Harmon was a delegate from the 2nd Ward, he having received 11 votes and Harmon only 4. A motion to suspend further proceedings until the report of the Committee on Rules was acted on was made and carried, and that report being presented and adopted. A motion of E. E. White that Judge Bramall be invited to take a seat in the Convention being objected to was withdrawn. The question of the adoption of the report of the Committee on Credentials was then resumed and the report adopted by a large majority. T. B. Penn, a regular delegate from the 4th Ward, appearing after his place had been filled by an alternate, put in his claim for the position, which elicited many comments, pro and con by Seaton, Row, Ditcher, Beckley, King and others, all under excitement. The matter was finally settled by the alternate abdicating in favor of Penn. (During the squabble upon the above Chas. Seals charged Penn, by innuendo, with selling out.) On motion of T. J. Edelin, the temporary officers were declared permanent. A motion that an informal ballot be proceeded with and that the greatest commotion, and motion upon motion followed rapidly, and a vote of two delegates to represent the county in the State Republican Convention. The following is result of the 1st ballot: E. E. White, 22; Jno. Syphax, 19; R. D. Beckley, 12; Lewis McKenzie, 11; Westel Willoughby, 2; Geo. L. Seaton, 1. Regular nominations were then ordered, but the balloting was suspended for the purpose of giving John Seaton, Hannibal King and others an opportunity to press the claims of some of the candidates, especially Lewis McKenzie, whom John Seaton pronounced the man of all men for the position. At the conclusion of his speech William Miller also praised the life and character of Mr. McKenzie, but he was interrupted so frequently that he had to desist. John Syphax, of the county, and one of the candidates, made a short speech, which had a silencing effect, and the balloting was proceeded with the following result: 1st regular ballot—E. E. White 22, John Syphax 15, R. D. Beckley 12, Lewis McKenzie 12. Seventeen being necessary to a choice, E. E. White was elected. A second ballot was ordered and resulted in no choice, and Mr. McKenzie's name was dropped. On the third ballot R. D. Beckley having received 17 votes was declared elected. Edgar Beckley offered a resolution that the delegates to the State Convention be instructed to cast their votes for such delegates to the National Presidential Convention as will support U. S. Grant. Mr. Corbett moved to amend by adding Schuyler Colfax for Vice-President. John A. Seaton moved to amend by inserting John F. Lewis. Mr. Beckley thought such suggestions might embarrass the action of the delegates in the Convention. He endorsed the claims of Grant, but thought that the question of candidacy for vice President, should be left to an open claim. He spoke, however, in complimentary terms of Mr. Corbett upon the amendment of Mr. Corbett for the endorsement of Schuyler Colfax being submitted to vote, was lost. The question upon the amendment of Jno. A. Seaton for the endorsement of Jno. F. Lewis, being submitted was also lost. The Convention adjourned in a hurry, without appointing any alternates whatever. It is rumored that poison has been detected in the stomach of the last of the Lloyd children in Leesburg.

PUBLIC SCHOOL REPORTS FOR APRIL.—The following is a synopsis of the reports made to me from the public schools of the city of Alexandria, for the month ending March 28th: White Schools.—On the rolls, 448; boys 275, girls 173. Average number belonging, 408; boys 261, girls 147. Average attendance, 377; boys 240, girls 137. Percentage of attendance to enrollment, 84; male schools 87, female schools 79. To number belonging, 92, male schools 92, female schools 93. Entered, 17; boys 8, girls 9. Dropped, 9; boys 6, girls 3. Best attendance in Washington School No. 1, taught by Theodore H. Ficklin, 93 per cent. Colored Schools.—On the rolls, 225; boys 108, girls 117. Average number belonging, 210; boys 104, girls 106. Average attendance, 207; boys 101, girls 103. Percentage of attendance to enrollment, 91; male schools 96, female schools 88. To number belonging, 99; male schools 100, female schools 97. Entered, 14; boys 5, girls 9. Dropped, 13; boys 7, girls 6. Best attendance in Snowden School No. 3, taught by Carrie Claggett, and Hallowell School No. 1, taught by Sarah A. Gray, each 97 per cent. Compared with March 1871, the enrollment in white schools has increased 56, and the average attendance 37; while in colored schools the enrollment has decreased 42, and the average attendance 33. James Furness, for disorderly conduct, and for falling through the show window of Cox's book store, was fined and discharged. Ellen Clements and Edwina Cave, two abandoned girls, for wandering about Fishtown, were discharged with an admonition. Andrew Welsh, white and Milton Watkins colored, boys, for fighting, were discharged with an admonition. Lewis Manley, colored, committed to jail last January for threatening to shoot some people of his color, was released upon security to keep the peace. NIGHT REPORT.—Night clear and cool. There were no disturbances after ten o'clock, and the streets were as quiet as usual. Four prisoners were at the station house. DEATHS.—Under the obituary head of today's Gazette will be seen notices of the death of Lewis Bailey, esq., of Fairfax county, and of Mrs. Elizabeth Monroe, of this city, two of the oldest residents of this section of the State. Mr. Bailey was a native of New York State, but for the last thirty odd years has been a respected and influential citizen of Fairfax county. Mrs. Monroe was the wife of the late Daniel Monroe, esq., and was a lady respected by all who knew her.

HARNESS THEFT.—A colored man named Williams, yesterday, met on one of the county roads another colored man riding a horse belonging to Mr. Crane, and knocking the rider off, stole the harness and turned the animal loose. Constable Burnett arrested the desperado this morning, and he is now lodged in jail to await an examination. It is supposed that he is implicated in all the late harness thefts that have lately been committed in this city. GOOD TEMPLARS.—Belle Haven Lodge of Good Templars had a very agreeable meeting last night. Addresses were delivered by Rev. Mr. Hemenway, and by Messrs. W. L. Penn and I. C. O'Neal, and Mr. G. P. Berkeley read "Old and New Things." Appropriate songs were sung, also, and all present spent a cheerful evening, and returned to their homes strengthened in their determination to fight the battle of temperance.

THE LIBRARY.—At the meeting of the Board of Directors of the Library Company, last night, after the transaction of some routine business of no interest to the public, the question of applying to the City Council for a room in the new Market House building, for the use of the Library, was mooted by Mr. French and discussed by the members of the Board present, but action deferred until the next meeting.

SALTED FISH.—Owing to the light receipts of Potomac fish and the consequent high prices which have prevailed, salters have been restricted in their operations. The first salted fish of the season were, to-day, turned out from the establishment of Mr. James E. McGraw for Messrs. Shinn & Co., and shipped by that firm to Staunton, Va. The first salted fish last season were shipped on the 24th of March.

ALARM OF FIRE.—The alarm of fire about ten o'clock this morning was caused by the burning of the chimney of a framed house on the east side of Pitt street between Duke and Wolfe, occupied by Mr. Robert Morris. The fire department was speedily on the ground but its services were not required.

QUICK WORK.—The lady of this city who was married last September to Mr. John Enoch, of Washington, but divorced from that gentleman on Thursday of this week, noticed in the Gazette of that date, was married again the same evening to Col. Boone.

TELEGRAPH NEWS.

From New York. NEW YORK, April 6.—The Judiciary committee yesterday heard further testimony against Judge McCann. Among the charges examined was the allegation that the Judge had corruptly disposed of some twenty-six thousand dollars of Fenian moneys. The government stone cutters have not yet been re-instated though it is announced that the President has granted them the eight hour privilege. Last night a number of influential citizens of Lower Manhattan took preliminary to indict the Mayor of that place on the ground that he was guilty of bribery at the election. The District Attorney says that it will be some time yet, owing to the pressure of his business, before he will be ready to bring on the Stokes case to trial. The voluminous bill of exceptions put in by the counsel for the prisoner have hardly yet been digested, by the District Attorney. Miss Manfield has not visited Stokes since his arrest, but will appear as a witness on the trial. Stokes is said to be anxious to have his case brought on, when it is said starting revelations will be made of the Eric race and matters connected therewith. At a meeting of the Central committee of the German Reform organization, last night resolutions were adopted favoring joint action with the council of Political Reform in the selection of candidates at the forthcoming municipal election. It was also decided to have the practical work of the campaign conducted in conjunction with the committee of seventy.

Foreign News. PARIS, April 6.—The Council of War, sitting at Versailles, has sentenced the Vicar of Saint Eloi to two months' imprisonment for causing the arrest of a number of persons by illegal means. MADRID, April 6.—The election for electoral colleges in the town of San Lorenzo, Catalonia, were accompanied with serious disorder. A mob attacked a building wherein voting was in progress and completely stopped the election. The urns containing the ballots were completely demolished and the poll lists were scattered throughout the town. Several persons were injured during the attack, but no fatal results are reported. There was also considerable excitement in the town of Santiago, Andalusia, caused by a priest appearing at the polls, and attempting to vote with a revolver in his hand. He was arrested with the excitement subsided. Senors Rivera and Moret who were candidates for the Cortes were defeated.

From New Orleans. NEW ORLEANS, April 6.—Aristide de la Vigue, a well-known cotton merchant, a native of France, aged 33, fell into the river from the ship Canebo last night and was drowned. William Callen Bryant has arrived here from Havana and is stopping at the St. Charles Hotel. There was a hard rain last night and the Metairie races have been again postponed. The third day's races are now announced for Tuesday.

Riot. NEW YORK, April 5.—A Columbia, S. C., dispatch says a riot took place there Thursday night, the provocation being the firing of a pistol shot into a republican procession in celebration of the Mayoralty victory. Troops had to suppress the mob.

Weather Report. WAR DEPARTMENT, OFFICE CHIEF SIGNAL OFFICER, WASHINGTON, April 6, 10 a. m. Synopsis for the Past Twenty-four Hours.—The barometer is highest from New Jersey to North Carolina. It has fallen from the Lakes to the Gulf the lowest being probably central over eastern Kansas. The area of rain has extended eastward into Iowa, Illinois, southern Indiana, Kentucky, Tennessee and Alabama, with fresh to very brisk easterly to southerly winds, and a southeast gale is now reported from Cairo. Easterly winds, with partially cloudy weather, are prevailing over the South Atlantic States; southeasterly to southwesterly with partially cloudy weather over the New England and Middle States. Clear weather with brisk winds, cloudy weather and light rain at San Diego, with brisk and high westerly winds. Probabilities.—The low barometer over eastern Kansas will probably move northward over lower Michigan as a severe storm. Brisk and high easterly winds are probable for the upper lakes this afternoon to night gradually veering to northerly and northwesterly. Brisk and high southeasterly winds are probable for the lower lakes this evening and to-night veering to southwesterly. The area of rain will extend eastward over southern Wisconsin, lower Michigan, Lake Erie, Virginia, and the South Atlantic States by this evening, and over the Middle States and southern New England by Sunday morning. Rising barometer, northwesterly winds and clearing weather will extend eastward over the Mississippi valley during to-night.
