**A Missing Man Discovered.**

The Cumberland News clears up the Barton mystery in the pleasantest possible manner. It says:  
A strange combination of circumstances has existed during the past four months at Barton, in this county, giving rise to a vast deal of comment and many surmises by the people of that region, as also in other parts of the country. A brief and truthful narration of the affair we herewith give:

In the early part of last winter a man about sixty years of age named Daniel Beall was employed as a laborer at and about the mines in the vicinity of Barton. Being an unmarried man he boarded at a boarding house near Barton, at Morrison's Mill, kept by John B. Swauger. It was generally supposed and talked about that Beall had several hundred dollars in his possession, which he always carried about him. He was steady in his habits, and a peaceable and quiet citizen. On the morning of the 27th of January last Beall was missing from his boarding house. He had retired to his bed on the night previous as usual, but in the morning his place was vacant, and no person knew how or when he left or was taken from the house. No appearance of the man being made that day or the next, inquiries were made as to his whereabouts, but no person knew anything about him later than the evening he retired to bed in Mr. Swauger's house. A week and more having passed and still no trace discovered of the missing man, the people began to entertain suspicion of foul play, which gradually strengthened and fastened on John B. Swauger as having secretly made way with the man Beall for the sake of his money. At last Swauger was arrested by a posse of citizens, who charged him with having murdered Beall; but the arrest was decided illegal because the body of the suspected murdered man had not been described, and consequently Swauger was released, but a strict watch was kept upon all his actions. Mr. Swauger most indignantly denied the charge and demanded of his accusers some proof before charging him with so heinous a crime as murder. But the imputation of the crime rested upon Mr. Swauger to the great trouble and regret of himself and family, the latter maintaining with him his entire innocence of the crime. In the meantime the public mind was "convinced that a murder had been committed, and that Mr. Swauger knew more about it than he chose to tell."

Search was made in all directions in the neighborhood of Swauger's house for the body of the missing man. The creek was dragged; the water was withdrawn from the mill dam; the stable flooring was removed; the woods were searched; rocks removed; every spot of freshly dug earth examined—but still no trace of the body could be found. At last the manure pile at the stable was removed, "stained with blood," as it was thought, but an examination made by persons who knew what blood stains were pronounced the discoloration upon the clothes to be from the ammonia and other substances in the manure heap. After weeks of searching had elapsed, and every place examined wherein it was supposed the body of a man could be hid, the fruitless task was abandoned and Swauger left alone in his "guilty conscience," as most people supposed.

The charge of this dreadful crime was galling to Mr. Swauger—it was mortifying to his honor and uprightiness—it was an injury to his business—boarders left his house, people seemed to shun him, and the matter was harassing in the extreme. Mr. Swauger, believing that the man was alive, determined to find him out, and sought every means to do so. A few days since, learning that a man not more than twenty miles distant, at Messrs. West's saw mill, answered the description of the missing man, and that he was also called Beall, Mr. Swauger immediately took the cars and went to that locality. Approaching on seeing the veritable Daniel Beall quietly at work, all unconscious of the trouble and anxiety felt as to his whereabouts. Upon informing Beall of the nature of the affair, and his supposed murder, he promptly agreed to return with Mr. Swauger to Barton and show the people that he "was still in the land of the living," well and hearty.

We had the satisfaction of meeting Mr. Beall in this city on Tuesday, and hearing from him that he had quietly left the house of his own accord on the night he was missing, and walked over the mountain to West's mill, where he had been steadily at work ever since. He assigns as a cause for leaving, some dissatisfaction with other boarders in the house, and he thought he would leave them, and so quietly and suddenly left the premises. Of course Mr. Swauger is rejoiced to so successfully clear himself of the heinous charge, and re-establish his former good name and standing.

"FASHION" OF FUNERALS IN NEW YORK.—The present innovation is to lay the body upon a couch, dressed in its accustomed clothing, with a pillow under the head. The position is usually that of the right or left side, and the hands are arranged in some natural and easy position. If the dead is a lady, a handsome shawl is thrown over the figure, and if a man, an Afghan or silk quilt serves for a covering. Flowers are in the room; but not in such obtrusive abundance as to make the odor of these beautiful things hamper you forever afterward. The funeral is announced, and the friends and acquaintances are invited, through the public prints, to be present and take leave of the departed. No hearse and no coffin affront the sight and chill the blood with those traditional sentiments which afflicted our childish years. As many days afterward as the condition of the remains will permit, a few of the nearest and dearest are invited to assist in the sad ceremony of burial. Loving hands lift and lower the casket, and tender ones strew the earth softly above it with flowers, and perhaps some favored wrappings of the dead are added to lie between the dust which usually falls so heavily and harshly upon that other dust that is so dear. No strange eye witnesses this last sacred attention to the departed, and no memory of a thoughtless jar or heavy tread comes back to embitter the remembrance of the sorrowful event.—Chicago Times.
