DEFERRED ITEMS.

The British steamer Nestorian, on her last voyage from Liverpool, landed at Baltimore, among many other passengers, 150 from the agricultural districts of England, who at once started to Nebraska, the intention being to form a colony near Lincoln in that State. It is said that during the winter months the emigration agents of the State of Nebraska, and the agents of a railroad company who possess extensive land grants in the State, have traveled through various parts of England, especially through the agricultural districts, and have got together the Englishmen who arrived in the Nestorian.

The Washington police have struck a rich vein, which says the New York Journal of Commerce, if thoroughly worked, might pay off the National debt. They have taken to arresting people for profanity and for loud talking, and about half the business of the Washington Police Court is harvesting fines from the profane and vociferous. One day's report mentions five persons held before that tribunal for swearing, and mulcted in sums from one dollar to three dollars—the amount being adjusted probably according to the number of syllables in the oaths.

The bill introduced by Mr. Wood in the House of Representatives intended to prevent a stringency or contraction in the money market, either from designed or accidental causes, provides that the Secretary of the Treasury shall set apart from the coin in the treasury the sum of \$20,000,000, and issue legal-tender notes of the denomination of one thousand dollars to the amount of \$25,000,000, to be distributed at the principal cities, &c., for loan.

The Baltimore Sun says:—"While the dry goods trade has been active in Baltimore, New York merchants complain that it has been largely below a reasonable average, attributed to the backwardness of the season in the interior. Stocks are reported full, and buyers cautious in taking up further supplies from manufacturers. Owing to the high prices of wool there has been a run on cheap shoddy woolsens by the clothing manufacturers."

Mr. Speer, of Pennsylvania, has introduced in the House of Representatives a bill providing that hereafter no person unsuccessfully contesting the seat of a member or senator shall receive any allowance whatever as costs, counsel fees or expenses. The bill was referred to the committee on the judiciary. In the event of the passage of a bill of this character quite a saving would be made to the treasury.

Says the New York Express:—"Speculators are reported as purchasing in all the principal cities of the West, with the view to run up the price in Philadelphia, New York and Boston. It is the old game of buying and holding all the wheat and flour which come to their hands. This is the meanest kind of stock gambling. It is said in the Washington Chronicle that in the course of a year the Treasury Department and its branches made use of nearly fifty tons of writing paper, about six thousand gross of pens and one thousand gross of pencils.

The attention of all the politicians is now directed to "coming events" in Cincinnati.

A STRANGE DISCOVERY.—Last Friday night at eleven o'clock the conductor of the freight train on the Northern Central Railroad was very much surprised to see on his train with the rest of the freight a box of the most elegant workmanship. It greatly excited his curiosity, owing to the extravagance, as he thought, of placing it among such a rough lot of freight. If he was surprised at its appearance he was almost terrified, when the train arrived at Woodberry, and became still, to hear the cries of an infant proceeding therefrom.—At first he could not believe it, but placing his ear to the lid he could almost feel the breath of the little prisoner upon his cheek, crevices having been left for air. Hammer and chisel were speedily availed of, and in a few moments a chubby faced, blue eyed, dimple cheeked little boy, not a month old, was revealed to the astonished spectators. It was placed in the hands of a lady living near by, who promises to rear it, and it is proposed, if the conductor will give his consent, to have it named after him. The same evening before the train started from the depot, a well dressed man was seen lurking about the place, and it is supposed that he was the owner of the infant.—Balt. American.

WILD BIRDS TAMED.—The Saint Augustine (Fla.) Press has the following:—"We witnessed a novel, interesting and beautiful sight, a few days ago, at the farm of Mrs. Hildreth, situated on the North river, about two miles above the city. Mrs. Hildreth, in the course of a few months, has succeeded in taming the wild birds that fly about the place. While we were in the house, Mrs. H. went out to the door and called to the birds, which were then, in the middle of the day, in the adjoining forest. In a few moments a dozen or more blue birds and mocking birds came flying around her. She then came into the house and handed each of our party a raisin, which we were requested to hold out in our fingers. We remained still for a few minutes, when the birds hopped in at the door, flew upon our hands, and picked and raisins from our fingers."

VALUABLE INFORMATION.—Arrangements have been completed between Mr. Kawage and other members of the Japanese embassy and ex-Governor Army, of New Mexico, for an exchange, through the Smithsonian Institution, of information in regard to the habits, manners, and customs of the Inos, or aborigines of Japan, and the Indians of New Mexico. It has been ascertained by these gentlemen, from several interviews that they have had, that there is considerable similarity in the Indian tribes of New Mexico and the Inos of Japan, and they have agreed to give more attention during the coming summer to their respective tribes, especially in regard to their ethnology and philology, and thus ascertain as far as possible the present condition and past history of these tribes of Japan and America, as also to ascertain, by a uniform system, a collection of words of the various Indian languages of New Mexico and the aborigines of Japan, how far they resemble each other, &c.
